## NEWS IN A LINE

Voting for or against Prohibition will take place on Thursday, Nov. 4th.

Matthew Fitzpatrick, of Spaniard's Bay, is applying to the Supreme Court for insolvency to be granted him.

Mr. Matthew Petten, of Port de Grave, has been very successful with the fish this summer, having secured between 500 and 600 qtl.

Codfish is very scarce from Brigus Point to Feather Point. The Upper Island Cove fishermen have their berring sets out and are securing a quantity almost daily.

The roads in certain parts of Bishop's Cove and in Upper Island Cove is in a very bad condition. In some places they are almost impassable. Attention should be given them at once.

Miss Bertha Martin, of Harbor Grace, is in town visiting friends.

Mrs. Josiah Gese and Mrs. Arch Crane paid a visit to Mrs. M. A. Russell on Sunday last.

The Sagona reached Makkovik 6.30 Thursday morning, coming south. She went as far north as Nain, reaching there on the 13th. She was held up there for three days by a fierce northeast storm. She is due to arrive Monday evening.

Roumania is expected to enter the war on the side of the Allies soon. Greece will no doubt follow her, and this move will likely force Bulgaria to remain neutral or join the Allies instead of Germany.

Naval Reservists Ralph Barrett and George Snow are on their way home, both being sick.

## Big Losses in Dardanelles

London, Sept. 10.—The officers casualty lists for the fortnight ended August 30, indicate the severity of the recent fighting in Gallipoli peninsula where the bulk of casualties are announced.

They show the British army lost 407 officers killed, 959 wounded, and 136 missing for the fortnight. This number has been exceeded only once in any fortnight since the beginning of the war, 1627 casualties having been announced between May 5th and 18th. The losses of officers since the outbreak of hostilities have now reached a total of 15,840, of whom 4,790 were killed, 9,698 wounded, and 1,352 missing.

During the past fortnight Brigadier-General Caldwell was killed, three other Brigadier-Generals wounded, nine Lieut. Colonels killed, and two reported missing.

The Australian contingent has been the greatest sufferer, having lost 68 killed, 150 wounded and 15 missing.

General Botha on The Germans

(Manchester "Guardian.")

The party in South Africa who have held their Government aloof from the defence forces for an attack on an "inoffensive neighbor" cannot maintain their ground in the face of such revelations as General Botha made. He puts it beyond doubt that Germany reckoned on Boer help to overrun the Union, and guaranteed to Maritz the independence of the old Republic in return for a swift and successful rebellion. Whether the Kaiser would have carried out his promise is more than ever doubtful now that General Botha has found among other interesting evidences of the great plot a map of Africa for 1916, in which the whole of the south of the continent is represented as "Greater Germany" with a small "Boer reserve." In any case it is now proved beyond question that the Union's campaign against the Germans was not only the "great service" to the Imperial cause for which Britain asked at the beginning of the war, but was also very really a defence of South Africa itself. The bitterest Herzogites cannot now represent the attack as a "fighting of England's battles." It was a national campaign undertaken to remove a well-matured menace and frustrate a long-standing menace and frustrate a well-matured menace, and as such it must now appear to every patriotic Africaner. Moreover, Germany has in truth, as General Botha makes clear, forfeited her right to the land by her treatment of its people as much as by the ulterior uses to which she put her occupation. She made a cruel bungle of her relations with the Herrero natives, and when repression had no results but distrust and reprisals she sought to enforce peace by a war of extermination. It is not surprising that the Union troops found themselves hailed as deliverers by the natives in many parts, and it will be with the goodwill of the hundreds of Boer farmers who fled across the border after the South African War that the Union will undertake the administration of her new territory. The remarkable speech in which General Smuts followed General Botha makes it clear, if there could ever have been any doubt on the subject, that the Union will not, unless compelled, relinquish what it has won.

## The Ancient Colony

From British Columbia, in the extreme west, to our eastern outpost, Newfoundland, is a far cry, but there also the prohibition sentiment is a live one. An election is to be held in November, when a vote will be taken on a prohibition bill referred to the people by the last Legislature. Newfoundland already enjoys a large measure of prohibition. Some years ago an Act was passed which gave the people local control over the retail sale of liquor.

The local veto has worked so effectively that outside the city of St. John's prohibition has been adopted in every part of the island. A couple of years ago the "Temperance Chronicle," of London, England, gave some interesting particulars regarding the effects of this measure of prohibition.

The district of Twillingate, with a population of nearly 20,000 people, had then had twenty-nine years' experience of the local veto. There had only been about twenty-five convictions during the whole period, and for a run of several consecutive years not a single complaint had been entered. The thriving town of Carbonear, containing five thousand inhabitants, is a railway terminus, and a shipping port. For the five years preceding the passing of the Local Option law (1874-1882), there were one hundred and fifty-seven arrests for drunkenness.

For five years under local option rule (1894 to 1900), the number of arrests was fifteen. In Carbonear in five years under license there were ten convictions for absconding, that is, selling without a license. In the five years, 1904 to 1909, under local prohibition, there were only four convictions. So much for the statements that are often made that prohibition leads to illicit selling and drinking. The percentage of convictions for drunkenness in Newfoundland is among the lowest in the world.

Excellent as have been the results springing from local option, the people look for better results from complete prohibition. It is expected that the prohibition campaign will be a lively one. Both sides of the controversy are already marshalling their forces. The only danger to the reformers is being too sure. The whole people must be aroused to take advantage of so great an opportunity.—Montreal Witness.

Another passenger ship has been torpedoed by a German submarine. Our enthusiasm over the promise of Germany that no merchant ships carrying passengers would be attacked by submarines until all passengers were placed in safety, has been shattered. Does Germany look upon written promises as "mere scraps of paper?" Last week this nation was rejoicing over what appeared to be an amicable solution of the differences between the United States and the Imperial Government, but the sinking of the Hesperian last Saturday night proves we can put no dependence on Germany's statements. President Wilson is waiting for a full report of the case before taking action. Fortunately but few lives out of the 650 passengers and crew were lost. But that does not mitigate the seriousness of this law less act. The attack on the Hesperian, without warning, should be most rigidly investigated. The German government disavowed the sinking of the Arabic, and is in duty bound to pursue the same course regarding the Hesperian. The commanders of submarines who disobey instructions should be branded as murderers and dealt with accordingly.—The Greenwich (Conn.) News & Graphic.

## Newfoundlanders Win

An interesting event which took place in Halifax Harbor in July last was referred to at the Social Evening on Wednesday night. The captain of the washship Niobe challenged the Admiral of the North American Atlantic fleet to row a race with a crew of 14 men and a coxswain in what is known as a sea boat. The challenge was accepted and the race was rowed over a 5-mile course.

The Niobe's boat's crew was composed entirely of Nfld. Naval Reservists, while the Admiral's boat's crew was composed of Scotch Naval Reservists. The Niobe's crew won the race, beating their opponents by 30 boat lengths.

Anglican Synod At Halifax Demands Prohibition

At the meeting of the Diocesan Synod of the Anglican church held in Halifax in June last, the following preamble and resolutions, after due discussion, were adopted:

"Whereas, our General Synod in Canada, in reference to Ottawa, in 1908, approved of the report of the Committee on Temperance, which declared the bar to be a public menace, and further declared it to be the duty of every man to endeavor to further the effort to abolish the bar; and

Whereas, since that year very great advance has been made in the work of Temperance Reform; and the public conscience has been awakened in a marked degree to the appalling effects of individual and national life resulting from the sale of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes; and

Whereas, the conditions created by the war have furnished an occasion which is demonstrating the great need of restricting the use of alcoholic liquor as a beverage, has also furnished the occasion which justifies the taking of strong measures for its restriction as such."

That this Commission on Social Services of the Synod of Nova Scotia is of opinion that the sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage is productive of untold misery and evil, and that such Dominion and Provincial legislation should be enacted as will provide during the present crisis the fullest possible measure of prevention of the sale and use of alcohol as a beverage;

"And further,— That guided by the experience of all the countries enacting special legislation at this time, in this connection; and also by our own experience, the Dominion and Provincial Governments be urged to continue the same permanently; and as soon as possible to bring about the entire abolition of the traffic in alcoholic liquor as a beverage."

As one of the speakers pointed out, this is probably the most drastic resolution ever passed in favor of prohibition in an Anglican Synod in Canada.

Watch Flanders

During the past three weeks there has been much activity among the British and French forces on the Western front. Everything points to important happenings in Flanders at an early date. Whether the Allies will assume the offensive or await the attack which the Germans must make before very long is a matter of conjecture. But that they are well prepared for either event there is no room for doubt. Their repeated bombardments of the German positions recently would indicate that they are feeling their way before taking the general offensive, and at the same time ready to meet the forward movement of the German army at all points. Everything points to the approach of the greatest and bloodiest battle in history on the fields of Flanders at an early date. The result of it will have a greater effect on the outcome of the war than all the preceding battles during the past year, with the exception, perhaps, of the battle of the Marne and the checking of the German army in front of the walls of Paris twelve months ago.—Herald.





My thoughts will be more than ever with you in these anxious times."

**Meigle's Report**

The biggest kind of codfish are now being taken all along the Labrador side of the Straits of Belle Isle, and the real old time "Labrador" herring are numerous, such is the report brought here by the S. S. Meigle, Capt. Gobbie, which ship reached Carling yesterday morning from the Straits of Belle Isle. Capt. Gobbie reports a good sight of cod from Cew Head to Port au Choix, but bait is scarce. At Porteau and other parts of the Labrador side of the Straits trawlers get from one to two qts. codfish a day, and single hand fishermen at Porteau get as high as three qts. The fish are enormous sizes. The S. S. Bookie took away from Blanc Sablon 8,400 qts. cod. She sailed for St. John's on Wednesday to finish loading for the Mediterranean market, and the same day Bains Johnson & Co's vessel, with 4,000 qts. cod, sailed from Battie Hr. for Gibraltar, this is the first cargo for the season. This firm has another vessel partly loaded, and expects to ship a third cargo. The Meigle reports stormy weather throughout the voyage, and on her trip south found it impossible to handle freight at several places along the coast. A number of fishermen returned by her.—Western Star.

**Passports**

Residents of this Colony, intending to travel out of Newfoundland, are hereby notified that they may be required to produce Passports at various points on their journey. Passports are issued at the Department of the Colonial Secretary, in accordance with Rules and Regulations approved by the Governor in Council, to persons domiciled in Newfoundland, who are—

1. Natural-born British subjects;
2. The wives and widows of such persons, or
3. Persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies, or in India.

A Passport cannot be issued on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission or Consulate. Passports must not be sent out of Newfoundland by post.

Applicants are requested to have their Forms of Application (which can be obtained at this Department), properly filled in, according to marginal instructions thereon, and forwarded to the Department in sufficient time to permit of any necessary alterations being made in the same before the date upon which the Passport would be required.

The charge for a Passport is \$2.50, which covers a period of two years, after which it may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, at a charge of \$1.00 for each renewal.
