Kent County Bridges. [LETTER No. 3.] To the Editor of the Miramichi Advance SIR :- On the 29th October, 1879, portion of the bridge over the Kouchibou guacsis River was carried away by the high tide. When the Hon. P. A. Landry advertised through the newspapers for the repairs to the Richibucto, North West and Buctouche Bridges, there was no mention made of the Kouchibouguacsis; but some months afterwards hand bills were posted in obscure parts of the County inviting tenders for the necessary repairs to this structure. Careful enquiry has failed to show where more than one handbill was posted in the Parish of Richibucto. and that one only two days before the time for receiving tenders; although a telegram from Fredericton dated March 31st says: "Landry and his officers show advertising by handbills in Kent." It is also worthy of note that one of Hon. P. A. Landry's constituents brought from Fredericton forms of tender which he dis tributed among his intimate friends with the injunction: "Keep things quiet," and "I do not" and being of an enquiring turn of mind, meekly interrogated "Who politician (who affirms that due publicity was given of this contract) did his best to secure the job for a near relative at a fabulous price -but failed in the attempt! On the 3rd of April 1880, Hon. P. A. Landry telegraphed from Fredericton: "A Mr. Lockhart has the contract." Two months have elapsed since that day and not a blow has been struck, nor the slightest effort made towards re-building the bridge, but, mirabile dictu, M. Urbain Johnson, M. P. P., secured for himself in the name of M. Francois Vautour, the ferrying of passengers and teams across the Kouchibouguacsis River at the Government's expense for a very remunerative er, he said, "When does the ADVANCE go rate per diem, Vantour receiving one dollar per day and the balance finding its way into the family purse. This is the version of the ferry transaction as told by "No," in time for the next morning's M. Johnson to one of his intimate friends, a newly appointed J. P.; consequently the longer the bridge remains in its present ndition the more money it will put in the pockets of the Johnson family.
