



SERVIA'S KING IS ACCUSED OF PLOT TO SLAY DYNASTY

One of the Conspirators Confesses That Peter Organized Scheme to Obliterate Royal Family.

BUDAPEST, Aug. 31.—An amazing book, the cenfessions of a conspirator, was published here last night. It contains details of a widespread southern Slav conspiracy for the aggrandizement of Servia and the most direct accusation against King Peter of being the erganizer of the bomb plot for the extinction of the Montenegrin

for the extinction of the Montenegrin dynasty.

The volume is entitled "Finale," and the author is George Nastitich, the young Revolutionary, whose revelations at the trial in Cettinje of those concerned in the plot against Prince Nicholas brought the proceedings to a close, and caused sentence to be passed on most of the fifty odd prisoners. Nastitich declares himself appalled by the conspirators' aims, and says he must free his conscience, even at the peril of his life.

He declares that the aim of the conspiracy is to incorporate Montenegro and the Slav provinces of Austria-Hungary under the Servian powed. Slav officers and men in the Austrian army have been won over and the work is steadily proceeding, directed Nastitch declares by King Peter and his son, and the dignitaries of the Servian court.

He gives a list of the heads of the Revolutionary organization and the draft of its statutes. The names include those of the President of the Servian parliament, of Captain Nenadoyitch, a near relative and intimate friend of King Peter, and of a score of well known men in Servia—merchants, army officers and civil corvants. Among them is the director of the Servian State ammunition factory at Krayjevatz. who made the bombs destined to kill the Prince of Montenegro.






