**PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.**  
FREDERICTON, March 15.

The Order of the Day being moved  
—Supply—on motion of the Pro. Sec'y that  
the Speaker do now leave the  
chair.

Mr. Covert said he had hoped that  
before going into Committee the Sec'y  
would have referred to matters con-  
nected with the items on which the  
House was expected to vote. The  
House had, no doubt expected him to  
say something about the closing up of  
the Law Commission in connection  
with the Consolidation of the Statutes,  
which was a very important matter.  
He spoke advisedly in saying that a  
large proportion of the \$85,000, granted  
a few days ago for Great Roads and  
Bridges, had already been expended,  
and the House had hoped that a  
further sum would have been brought  
down in the Supplementary Estimates  
to aid the Chief Commissioner in  
meeting the demands that would be  
made upon him for the maintenance  
of the Great Roads and Bridges in the  
Province during the current year.  
There were outstanding claims in dif-  
ferent Counties on account of these  
services, still remaining unliquidated,  
and when the Government showed  
such a large balance as it professed to  
have, the Chief Commissioner's hands  
should not be tied up as they were,  
for every member was interested in  
seeing that they should not be, so that  
when they (the members) went back  
to their constituents they would not  
have to reply to their legitimate de-  
mands by saying that owing to the  
false economy of the Government the  
Chief Commissioner of Works was  
not in a position to do what was re-  
quired. That gentleman was obliged  
to withhold moneys that were neces-  
sary and to unduly restrict expendi-  
tures, and he did not see how the re-  
quirements of Supervisors could be  
met without again resorting to over-ex-  
penditure and trenching on the re-  
sources of the country. He was forced to say,  
in the interests of the country, that it  
was disgraceful for the Government to  
leave the Chief Commissioner's hands  
so tied up, and the country should  
understand that it was not the  
"Opposition" who had so circumscribed  
his expenditures in this respect, but  
that their efforts had been directed  
to bring about a contrary state of af-  
fairs. He complained that there had  
been no returns of the People's Bank  
laid on the table, as required by law,  
and that the papers connected with  
the Boston matter, although asked  
for weeks ago, had not been sub-  
mitted, while the papers in connection  
with Kincardine Reserve and  
trespasses in Carleton County had  
only been laid on the table just as  
the House was asked to go into Com-  
mittee of Supply. There was no justifi-  
cation for such discourtesy on the  
part of the Government toward the  
House, and it showed that the Gov't  
would not deal fairly in such matters  
and would not take the House into its  
confidence. There might or might  
not be something in the charges im-  
plied in reference to both the Kincardine  
Reserve and with the Carleton  
seizures matters, but the Govern-  
ment's discourtesy in the matter of  
submitting the papers left the House  
no opportunity for investigation, and  
members were obliged to vote on  
supply in the dark. The same might  
be said of the papers connected with  
the Better Terms delegation to On-  
tario, and although he had reason to  
believe that the Government had in-  
formation that the Eastern Extension  
claim would be paid, they withheld it  
from the House and would not put  
members in a position to vote as in-  
telligently as they ought to have done.  
It was asked that the House re-  
frain from the speaker leave the chair  
without a word of explanation from  
the Sec'y in reference to the items asked  
for. Although the Government might  
force Supply through in this way  
they would remain responsible for  
keeping the House in ignorance of  
matters concerning which it should  
have information, and the country  
would also hold the Government re-  
sponsible for the fact that while it  
claimed to have an overflowing treas-  
ury, the demands of the House for  
more money on the roads and bridges  
were treated with indifference.

Hon. Mr. Kelly said that one would  
almost imagine when listening to the  
hon. gentleman's talk about outstand-  
ing claims that there were a good  
many of them and that they amount-  
ed to a considerable sum. The claim  
business was, in fact, quite a  
light one, and covered a period of  
back a good many years. He as-  
sured the House that all the claims the  
Government was entitled to pay on  
account of Great Roads and Bridges  
had been paid, and there were pending  
and it might be possible that some  
thing would have to be paid to them  
as some time, but he was deter-  
mined to know something more about  
the nature of the claims before con-  
senting to liquidate them.

He thought the money already ap-  
propriated for Great Roads and  
Bridges promised to be fairly adequate  
and that it would provide for those  
services, as fully as could be reason-  
ably expected and that no over-ex-  
penditure would be necessary unless

his hon. friends around him would as-  
sist in squeezing and dragging the  
grant out of the hands of the Depart-  
ment, before the actual necessities of  
the country justified them in doing so.  
He expected, and intended, to observe  
due economy in providing for such  
services during the current year, and  
although the demands of some hon.  
gentlemen had been quite urgent, he  
knew and acted on the fact that it  
would be imprudent just now, to deal  
out the moneys placed
