> In the proposals he had made to the House he had assumed that the amount of Revenue asked for was required, and if the expense could be reduced it would so far extinguish the floating debt. But that consideration had not influenced him. He had suggested various sources from whence the regired Revenue could be raised upon more equitable principles the duties upon luxuries, or by adding to the luties upon certain articles only partially taxed: but he was not disposed to enter into any great controversy with regard to the articles equired exclusively for ship-building or the heries, and had found that one or two cents tobacco, and one per cent. on all goods would raise amount equal to the Revenue expected to be raised from sugar and molasses. 


