
Another detail which is much appreciated by travellers is the thermos safe of food drinking water which is placed in drawing-rooms and compartments. In the drawing room, also as well as in many of the compartments, is a special box in which the occupants may place their shoes at night.

On these trains, each section is equipped with three garment hangers, two in the lower berth and one in the upper, and in the drawing room an additional portable hanger is provided. Garment hangers were first used on Canadian National cars. Window screens in Canadian National cars are of full size, providing an unobstructed view for passengers.

## RESTIGOUCHE RIGHTS MAY NECESSITATE AN INVESTIGATION

Some Steps Will Be Necessary Unless This County Is Accorded Due Consideration—The Vacant Senatorship—No Favoritism Should Be Tolerated—An Opportunity For A Timely Test.

Recently the Graphic has published a number of articles dealing with the question of Restigouche Rights in an endeavor to arouse more interest among people of the North Shore in regard to the way this county is continually overlooked by government officials and by the rest of the province as a whole. In last week's issue of this paper we stated in a brief article that we had decided to make a special effort to have more attention focused upon Restigouche in the hope that our County will not continue to be "left out of things" and repeatedly shelved in the popular estimation. The first essential of course in making or bringing about any move in such a matter is to arouse public interest to the injustice done us through having no representation in the Legislature and no voice in the making of laws which affect us.

Our readers will recall that in our last issue there also appeared an article dealing at some length with one phase of this question—and one which may be truthfully termed a "Restigouche grievance." That is the matter of having a Restigouche County man appointed to the Senate. It was pointed out in that article that every other municipality of this province has, or has had, a local representative appointed to such a post in the Federal House and that never yet has Restigouche, despite her position, and her importance, been accorded that recognition.

### Our Turn

The vacancy in the senate, created by the death of the late Senator Fowler, has not yet been filled. Before a representative of some county of New Brunswick will be chosen for this post and it is clearly our turn. We have men here who can be relied upon to fill this position of trust and honor with credit to our county and our province and there is no apparent reason why this appointment should not fall to Restigouche. No county representation at Ottawa more than we do. In expecting such an appointment we are merely voicing a reasonable and just request and if there is anything to prevent us from having our county itself accorded this well-deserved recognition, our citizens should, without delay, seek—and demand—a satisfactory and sufficient explanation.

### Should Be Tested

Whether ever put into words or not it is taken for granted that every government is devoted to the best interests of every section and county of a province and not merely to the promotion and advancement of any particular district. In the twentieth century there is no room for sectionalism and no government today can be tolerated that perpetuates a system of favoritism in its administration. We do not believe that the present government can be confronted with any such charge but in the matter of Restigouche Rights an excellent opportunity is afforded us whereby we may carry out a test. On the other hand pleas are being made on all sides for greater co-operation and unity in the common cause of promoting the individual interests of all sections and the development and progress of our province as a whole. In the light of our experience it would appear that certain parts of this province have advocated a doctrine which they do not really want to have carried out. Here again we have a splendid opportunity to prove the sincerity of sister counties of this province. If such investigation should reveal that all that is necessary is a timely reminder our case will be most promising and there will be no cause for alarm. But if our interests are being surreptitiously blocked it is much better that we should know it and also that we should discover from whence our opposition comes. In that case our duty to ourselves and to the future of our own county will be clear. It will merely be a matter of clearing the decks for action and beginning a tenacious fight for what we know to be

our rights. Other Phases The matter which we have been discussing is, however, only one phase of this question. There are several other matters which all come under the same heading. These will be dealt with in following articles.

#### FUR ROYALTIES

The Provincial Government collected the sum of \$5,890.70 in fur royalties last year. According to Chief Game Warden Gagnon the catch consisted of 1070 moose, 15,886 weasel, 88 other marten, 4595 skunk, 51 fisher, 16,061 muskrat, 31,78 mink, 66 bear, 6702 foxes and 1488 wild cats. No royalty was collected on wild cats, but on these animals a bounty of \$3 each was paid.

Custom Excise Officer Stewart and Inspector Quartermaster paid a visit to the residence of a man a few miles from Chatham on Friday, and returned with a load of stills, which they had seized. The stills were in operation. Proceedings will be taken under the Inland Revenue Act.

#### BIG GAME STATISTICS

Chief Game Warden Gagnon in his annual report estimates that 1511 moose and 8888 deer were killed in New Brunswick during the open season last year. The number of moose killed in York is given as 114 of which 25 went to non-residents. There were 475 non-resident hunters in the province who accounted for 288 moose and 524 deer.

ate all cooking odours. The work tables in the kitchen and pantry are made of metal which is sanitary easy to clean and will not corrode.

The tourist cars operated on The Continental Limited and The National contain fourteen sections, large toilet rooms and a commodious kitchen, equipped with ranges, sinks, etc., where those wishing to do so may prepare their own meals. Portable tables are provided to be put up in each section. These cars are upholstered in brown Spanish leather and are equipped with aisle floor lights, specially divided berth curtains, air-vent hangers; spacious men's smoking and wash room and ladies' dressing room are similar to those on the first class sleeping cars.

Compartment-observation-library-buffet cars are also operated on The Continental Limited and The National. These contain one drawing room, four compartments and an observation room, equipped with fifteen armchairs upholstered in Spanish leather and a large well-sheltered observation platform supplied with plenty of comfortable chairs. These cars also contain a well-equipped buffet kitchen from which refreshments are served at any time and afternoon tea at four o'clock. The observation room is equipped with a writing desk and writing materials, an up-to-date library and a supply of the leading current magazines. The observation room has large windows which give an unobstructed view in three directions. In this room is also a complete supply of travellers' requisites, such as tooth brushes, tooth paste, shaving cream, shoe laces, safety razor blades, collar buttons, postcards, postage stamps, etc. An efficient valet service is also provided on these trains.

On The Continental Limited all observation cars are equipped with radio receiving sets with loud speaker and head phones for each passenger. On our recent trip across Canada the radio concerts were particularly enjoyable and continued to greatly shorten the evenings spent en route.

On The National, the Colonist car is equipped with a lunch counter, which provides a service for second-class passengers. Excellent food, sanitary conditions and quick service are made possible at low rates through this service.

On The International Limited, The New Yorker-Chicagoan and The Washingtonian-Montrealer the sleeping-car equipment is operated by the Pullman Company. This equipment is modern and of all-steel construction. On The International Limited the observation cars are upholstered in dark blue and the inside woodwork is of Circassian walnut. The observation room is equipped with twelve armchairs, writing desk, supply of current magazines and mail box. The head boards are of the latest telescopic type, designed to give more privacy to each section during the day time. The Parlor cars are of all-steel construction, all mahogany finish inside and equipped with twenty-nine revolving chairs and a smoking room seating ten persons. These cars also carry a supply of current magazines.

The Canadian National's 6000 Series Mountain type locomotives, the largest passenger engines in Canada, are 50 per cent efficient locomotives equipped with boosters and are operated on the International Limited between Montreal and Sarnia, Ontario and on The Ocean Limited and Maritime Express between Montreal and Halifax. ### UNITED STATES TO CUT DOWN TAXES

Outlook For Reduction of Three Hundred Million Dollars in Nation's Assessment Declared to be Now Favorable.

Washington, March 16.—The outlook for a reduction of \$300,000,000 in the nation's taxes for the fiscal year 1926 is "now favorable," Chairman Green, of the House Ways and Means Committee, said today, adding that he saw "nothing to prevent" reducing the maximum surtax to 25 per cent and again lowering of all other income rates.

"It is the intention," he asserted, "to have the new tax law passed in time to apply to taxes payable next year, and if this is done the administration will have the unprecedented record of having reduced taxation three years in succession."

A surplus of \$373,000,000 has been estimated for the fiscal year 1926, he said.





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

VOL. XX, No. 33. FORMER LOCAL BOY KILLED IN ONT. Doctor J. LeBlanc of Maple Green Victim of Fatal Accident Near Port Arthur. Former friend and acquaintance of the late Mr. and Mrs. William LeBlanc of Maple Green, N. B. will regret to learn of his death which occurred on March 18th, near Keego, Ontario, as a result of injuries sustained in an accident while on duty as a brakeman on a C. N. R. train running out of Port Arthur. As far as can be learned, the accident occurred when Mr. LeBlanc attempted to step from the engine of his train into a freight car. His foot evidently became caught in one of the "steps" and he fell on a high bank of snow, sloping toward the tracks. Being unable to prevent himself from slipping under the wheels of the engine, one leg was severed at the hip and his left arm and body badly crushed. The injured man was immediately placed in the baggage car of his own train and rendered first aid. This train was speedily separated from the local train and proceeded toward Port Arthur on fast passenger service. The unfortunate brakeman lived until reaching the city at 2:30 p. m. and the remains were taken to Thomson & Sargent's funeral parlors. The late Mr. LeBlanc was well known here, having been a resident of Maple Green and Alexis of Campbellton. The sisters are Mrs. John T. Wilent of Philadelphia, Pa., and Mrs. J. Brossard of St. Jovite, N. B. The brothers left for Port Arthur as soon as word of the accident was received and attended the funeral which was held in that city on Monday morning.

HEAVY CANADIAN QUAKE PREDICTED May. Come at Any Time, Say Fr. Odenbach—Likely to Reach Ohio. Cleveland, Ohio, March 22.—The next great earthquake may occur in Eastern Canada and probably will affect the northern section of the United States and possibly Ohio, Fr. Odenbach, seismologist, at John Carver University here, predicted Sunday night. "This region of Canada experienced earthquakes almost daily," said the scientist. "A big quake may come any time."
