The week's fighting apparently has been very desperate on four frontiers, but news over the principal cable The week's fighting apparently has been very desperate on four frontiers, but news over the principal cable has been a succession of unofficial despatches, one contradicting another. It is obvious that Von Hindenburg is somewhat of a fallen idol; his desperate drives for Riga and Dvinsk have been made with his customary disregard of human life. The Russian counter-drives in other sectors of the eastern front have been in keeping with their plan of campaign, to wear down the enemy and keep him from detaching men for other fronts. In Flanders and France there has been little outside of artillery and bomb fighting. The Italians, recently offered a separate place, have been wiping out that insult from Austria by strenuous work. In Gallipoli we have resumed the offensive, the British 52nd Division occurring Turkish trenches on both sides of the Krithia Nulla.

It was principally in Serbia that the most desperate, and at the same time the most vaguely reported fighting of the week. The French and British have shown increased strength, but the resistance of the Serbs is about done.

Rapid progress is being made by the Canadian Pacific Railway in driving the Rogers Pass tunnel in British Columbia. I. November last the record for this tunnel was 817 feet and during January it had advanced to 932 feet.

during January it had advanced to 932 feet.

This remarkable progress, made in a pioneer heading, driven through a mica schist, is accounted for by the steady improvement in the air drills and drill steel used, as well as in the system employed.

As recently as January, 1908, the record for Europe and the world was still held by the Simplon tunnel with a monthly average of 685 feet, and in January, 1908, the record for the American continent of 449 feet was made by the Gunnison tunnel of Colorado, in a heading 8½ by 12 feet, which ultimately reached 824 feet a month when driving through very soft shale.

The Loetschberg tunnel in Switzerland was well under way in January, 1908, but the maximum for one heading by then was only 558 feet. This was, however, far eclipsed later on by the remarkable advance of 1.013 lineal feet in a 31-day month

on by the remarkable advance of 1,013 lineal feet in a 31-day month in the same tunnel through lime-

soft rock on the same undertaking.

It remained for Canada to lead the It remained for Canada to lead the way on the American continent in hard rock tunnels, and the Mt. Royal tunnel, in Montreal, for the Canadian Northern Railway, reached the satisfactory record of 810 feet for June, 1913, in Trenton limestone with dikes of hard rock. Now this record is outdistanced.

In these recent records on the American continent the European system

In these recent records on the American continent the European system of mounting the drills on a horizontal bar, with or without a drill carriage, has been adopted, and as this permits the drills being set up before the muck pile is removed, it is possible for at least two shots to be fired in an eight-hour shift. The nature of that competition may be judged from the fact that, although the market in the Canadian Prairie has never been great enough to take more than three-fifths of our ouput, the Americans have in nearly every year of the past five supplied at least one-fifth of it. Although there is now free lumber into the Unit'd States, only 40,000,000 feet were shipped from British Columbia to the United States during the same period. To find and hold a wider lumber market will tax every resource of both manufacturers and Government through years of effort. There can, however, be no argument about the necessity of making an attempt."



SEA SIGNALS.

How Messages Are Sent From Ship

Means of communication between one ship and another, or between a ship and the shore, of however crude nature, are known to have been in existence from the very earliest days

In many parts of the world watch towers were utilized by night, and the method employed is to this very day practised in uncivilized countries. The strength and utility added to

our Navy by wireless telegraphy can hardly be imagined. At the same time, it has its limitations.

In clear weather wireless tele-graphy is sufficient, but in thick weather, although it can be used for summoning help, it will not give the exact position of the boat in danger, and the rescuing ship may be within a few miles of the wreck, but unable

to locate her for many hours.

Another method of communication is the use of fog-horns, steam-whistles and sirens, but these are not always reliable, for the atmosphe performs some curious tricks

A noise made under water, however, is an extremely reliable guide, and can be heard at a greater dis-tance than the same sound through

air. The best way to recover a watch which has dropped into the water is for the swimmer to be guided by the sound of the ticking.
