The Toronto Synod and the Dominion

TORONTO, June 12.—At the second day's conference of the Synod of the Diocese of Conference of the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, among the correspondence was a communication from the officers of the Dominion Alliance asking that the Synod appoint four delegates to attend the Alliance meeting in Montreal on Aug. 14 and 15. Col. Robert Denison asked if it was expected that the Synod should pay the expenses of those delegates.

those delegates.
Rev. Dr. Carry, of Port Perry, also spoke with much warmth. "Are these people ignorant," he asked, "of the principles of the Church of England as represented by the C. E. T. S.? They ask us to renounce those principles by giving our countenance to prohibition. I say it is a piece of impertinence." Rev. Canon Allan, Millbrook, took strong ground against the tone of pertinence." Rev. Canon Allan, Millbrook, took strong ground against the tone of Rev. Dr. Carry's remarks. He said: "We must give these people credit for sincerity although we do not believe in their movement. We cannot move with them, just I think it is beneath the dignity of this Synod to insult them." Rural Dean Allen moved that the communication be acknowledged and a courteous reply sent the Alliance.

Rev. J. P. Lewis, of Grace Church, Rev. J. P. Lewis, of Grace Church, wanted the Synod to have backbone enough to state its dissent from the prohibitionists, and state its declination of the Alliance's invitation. "The Church of England," he concluded, "doesn't believe in prohibition, and should say so."

Rev. J. P. Lewis moved an amendment with regard to the Dominion Alliance's communication which, by the withdrawal of Engla Dean Allen's notion, became the

Rural Dean Allen's motion, became

main motion. It reads:
That the communication addressed to the synod by the Dominion Temperance Alliance be acknowledged by the secretaries, and that they be directed to inform the Alliance that this Synod is in deep sympathy with all efforts for the suppression of drunkeness and intemperance, but that it does not approve of the principles of the Alliance.

The last part of this motion roused a protest from Mr. J. A. Worrell and from Col. Bolton, of Cobourg. Mr. Worrell agreed with what was conveyed in the resolution of Mr. Lewis, but there might be members of the Synod and members of the church who did not. The Synod had never considered the question of the principles of the Alliance, and then should not offhand express an opinion of them. The object desired would be attained if the secretaries were instructed to acknowledge the communication, and send the Alliance a copy of functions of the C. E. T. This he

munication, and send the Alliance a copy of the constitution of the C. E.T. S. This he put into the shape of an amendment, which was adopted and the matter dropped.

The rules of procedure were suspended to permit of the Rev. Rural Dean Langtry, giving notice of a resolution in regard to separate schools for Protestants, as follows:

That this Synod petition the Government of Ontario to adopt such legislation as will secure to every Christian denomination in the country the privileges which these ministers evidently thought they already possessed, and will also secure to them equal rights with their Roman Catholic fellow-citizens in regard to the religious education of their children. That this Synod invites the synods and assemblies of the different denominations now meeting or about to meet, to appoint delegates for the purpose of agreeing upon as wide a basis of Christian teaching as may be, with a view of urging the Government of Ontario to make the same a necessary part of the curriculum of every public school in the land.

MILTON, June 12 .- Yesterday afterno MILTON, June 12.—Yesterday afternoon about 2:30 a tornado passed about a mile to the north of this town. About 2 o'clock the clouds gathered dark in the west, and a heavy dash of rain, accompanied by lightning, came up and swept over the county. As the storm was passing a tornado suddenly developed on the line of the C. P. R., near the works of the Toronto and Milton Pressend Ruck and Tarra Cotta Company, tak-As the storm was passing a tornado sudded and denly developed on the line of the C. P. R., near the works of the Toronto and Milton Pressed Brick and Terra Cotta Company, taking an easterly direction, wrecking lences and buildings in its course. The first building touched was William Center's barn on the first line of the township of Esquesing, which was unroofed. About half a mile further the whirling column struck the sheds and barn of Malcolm Chisholm, wrecking the sheds and unroofing the barn. His dwelling house was next attacked, and badly shattered, chimneys being torn down, and windows and doors destroyed. Just across the road from Chisholm's the tornado struck the barn and sheds of Alex. McNab, and made an almost complete wreck of them. Fortunately, his residence escaped. The storm then rushed across the fields for about a mile, further eveling fences and trees in its ccurse, and lhen apparently had expended its force, as to further damage is reported.

THE PATH OF THE TORNADO was about 50 yards wide, and extended for about two miles across the 1st, 2nd and 3rd concessions of Esquesing. The marvel is that there was no loss of life. Although a lad with a team of horses was in Mr. McNab's stable at the time, yet they escaped unhurt. One of Mr. Chrisholm's little girls had her arm broken, but no other casualties are reported. The tornado was plainly visible, during its mad course of destruction, to residents in the town here, who describe the scene as one of appalling grandeur. The roofs and timbers of the different buildings were whirled into the air and dashed to splinters like mere toys.

THE TRIPP CASE.

by a Terrific Tornado.

A Large Number of Buildings Completely Wrecked.

How the Ingersoll Dector Was Suspect

The following dispatch from Ingersoll, dated Wednesday, gives additional particulars of the Tripp case: Dr. Moses E. Tripp, of this town, whose elopement with Mrs. Andrews last February was cut short by the arrest of the party at Detroit at the stance of the outraged husband, returned instance of the outraged missians, to Ingersoll yesterday morning. He was promptly arrested for contempt of court in not appearing to a charge laid against him by Mr. Tim Carroll. As soon as this little matter was disposed of, Detective B. B. Allen, of London, rearrested the Doctor on a Matter was disposed of, Beteror on a charge of poiscning his mother, who died last June, and conveyed him to Woodstock for the preliminary hearing, when he was remanded to jail for eight days. Some years ago Dr. Tripp failed in business and has led a dissolute life ever since. His father, a wealthy farmer of West Oxford, who died two years ago, was induced to alter his will so that the scapegrace son, who had previously been disinherited, might at the option of his mother be appointed at her death to a share of his father's estate. Mrs. Tripp, senior, was an invalid and Mrs. Andrews, the doctor's inamorata, was engaged to nurse her. She survived her husband about a year. Before her death she made a number of wills, but the last bequeathed the bulk of the estate to the Doctor fater her death. The guardian of the Doctor six infant children brought an action to set aside this will on the ground of coercion, and set up death. The guardian of the Doctor's six infant children brought an action to set aside this will on the ground of coercion, and set up another will made a few days before which gave the property to the children. The suit was finally compromised and a division of the property made. From that time forward the Doctor seems to have devoted the greater part of his time to Mrs. Andrews and her daughter until their arrest in Detroit separated them. The Doctor went to live with a distant relative in Detroit named Mrs. Pope, to whom he subsequently conveyed a valuable farm of 200 aeres in West Oxford. Several letters from Mrs. Andrews to the Doctor threatening him with exposure in court unless he made provision for her and her children alarmed Mrs. Pope and brought her over to Canada to investigate them. She had an interview with Mrs. Andrews in Woodstock in the presence of Mr. McMullen, of Finkle, McKay & McMullen. Mrs. Andrews made a statement, which was taken in writing, to the effect that the Doctor frequently tampered with his mother's medicine, that he kept poison in the house and that the medicine which he gave her made her very sick. No direct charge of poisoning was made, but many suspicious circumstances were related. By some means this statement fell into the hands of Detective Allen, who considered it of sufficient weight to have the Doctor arrested.

THE KEMMLER CASE.

The Writ of Habeas Corpus Dismissed by Judge Wallace.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., June 12.— Judge Wallace, on motion of the Attorney-General, has vacated and dismissed the writ of habeas corpus in Wm. Kemmler's case. The Attorney-General appeared for the agent and warden of Auburn Prison. 

DEATH PLANT OF JAVA

Inhalation of Its P. me Produce Torpor and Fatal envulsions.

"A magnificent kall mujah, or death plant of Java, has been recently received in Philadelphia," says the Times of that city, "by Mrs. Madison Black. This specimen, which is the only living one that has ever been brought to this country, was sent Mrs. Black by her brother, Jerome Hendricks, who went out as a missionary to the island. The kall mujah is found only in the volcanic districts of Java and Sumatra, and then rarely. It grows from two to three and a half feet in height, with long, slender stems armed with thorns nearly an inch long, and covered with broad satin-smooth leaves of a heart shape and of delicate emerald on one side and blood red, streaked with cream, on the other.

"The flowers of the death plant are large, milk-white and cup-like, being about the size and depth of a large coffee cup and having the rim guarded by fine, brierlike thorns. The peculiarity of the plant lies in these flowers, which, beautiful as they are, distill continually a deadly perfume so powerful as to overcome, if inhaled any length of time, a full-grown man, and killing all forms of insect life approaching it. The perfume, though more pungent, is as sickingly sweet as chloroform, which it greatly resembles in effect, producing insensibility, but convulsing at the same time the muscles of the face, especially those about the mouth and eyes, drawing the followed by a violent headache and a ringing in the ears, which gives way to a temporary deafness, often total while it lasts. "Other plants seem to shun the kali mujah, which wight be termed the Ishmael of the veget me kingdom, for it grows isolated from every other form of vegetation, though the soil about it may be fertile. All insects and birds instinctively seem to avoid all contact with it, but when accidentally approaching it have been observed to drop to the earth, even when as far from it as three feet, and unless at once removed soon died, evincing the same symptoms as when etherized."


