London, Sept. 5.—The semi-official statement which the Porte has issued in regard to the agreement with Russia touching the passage by the Russian volunteer fleet through the Dardanelles is quickening the British Foreign Office in its efforts to obtain concerted action on the treaty powers in demanding full explanations from the Porte within two days. Lord Salisbury's attitude appears to have changed from one of pretended indifference to one of keen diplomatic activity. From Chateaucecil, where he still abides, he has roused the officials of the Foreign Department here, through whom night and day cipher dispatches pass in a stream to and from the European capitals. A high official of the department takes the view that the Russo-Turkish agreement will make necessary

This allegation was in effect that Commee personally promised one Mrs. Tennent that if she would procure her husband's vote in behalf of the Liberal causes she would be favored with a position as keeper or cook of a boarding, house on the line of the Port Arthur, Duluth and Western Railway, which road Commee was then building as a contractor. This charge was supported by the evidence of Mr. Tennant in person and Mr. Aaron Squier, who last year was mayor of Fort Arthur, and is now president of the local Conservative Association.



THE WESTERN UNIVERSITY. The question of reviving the Western University has for some time past been a matter of conversation in private circles, and we think the time has come for us to give public expression and shape towards definite issue the thoughts which have been stirring in the minds of the citizens.

Two questions lie out on the surface Is the scheme possible? Is it advisable?

The first of these questions has already received practical solution. The extension of its sphere of operations, to which Huron College has been compelled, will have the effect of introducing into the city the professorial staff requisite for the arts course, and it is for the city now to decide whether that staff shall be limited in its operations to the work of training men for the ministry of the Church of England, or be permitted and invited to extend its sphere so as to include general university requirements? Whether it be turned to the advantage

of the city or not, the essential conditions of a university establishment will be fulfilled by the residence within the city of the four professors who will henceforth constitute the working staff of Huron College. The university scheme, therefore, is possible; is it advisable? Our sister city of Toronto will furnish us with an illustrative parallel. The recent census amongst other things shows not merely that Toronto has made an enormous addition to her population during the last decade, but that no other city in Ontario has shown anything like the same ratio of increase. Many reasons may be assigned for this, all falling easily and naturally under the general heading of cen tralization. There is commercial cen-Palization, railway centralization, govrmental centralization, legal centralzation and educational centralization. It is with the last that we are specially concerned at present. Announcements are fre-


