DANGER IN ALL.

Chloroform, Ether and Other [Anæsthetics Discussed.

None of These Drugs Are Absolutely Safe.

They Should Not Be Administered in Any Case Without the Greatest Precaution.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

Some months ago I was very much vexed at a patient (then treating for kidney disease) taking ether without my consent in a dentist's office in a neighboring town. Since that time I have repeatedly heard of my patients being tendered ether at a dentist's office in this city. The patients have been told of the alleged safety of this drug, the ease with which a certain physician could be obtained, or his possession of a safe apparatus for administration.

It is right for the public to know that no anesthetic is absolutely safe, and the relative safety of ether and chloroform is a matter of disputed science. So good a surgeon as Gerster had in less than 11,000 ether administrations six deaths, while Kerhad only one death in 37,000 chloroform sadministrations.

administrations.

This does not show that ether is more risky than chloroform, but it goes to show that both may kill, and that, too, without warning. Need I tell of the cases of pneumonia, bronchitis or insanity that occasion ally follow the administration of ether to certain subjects? In all anaesthetic 'administrations the patient's regular medical attendant is the proper party to determine whether one shall be given or not, and to select the kind of arresthetic. Some cases are best "fil for chloroform, others for other, others again for nitrous oxide to mixture," and this fitness is not to be determined by a hasty examination in a dentiat's edice. In conclusion, I would say that no one should take or give an anaesthetic for trivial operations, that the regular medical astendant in the choice of the anaesthetic should never be ignored, and that the anaesthetic should be given at the patient's house, where he or sho would be able to keep the recumbent posture for bours (in some cases much longer) after. 

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

For or five years ago Mr. Johnson had his right leg amputated at the bridge near St. Thomas, while working on the railway and he has since supplied the deficiency by an artificial appendage. A few weeks ago he went to Toronto and bought a brand new cork limb of the most approved pattern; but not content with depriving him of the original, fate has been spiteful enough to even destroy the artificial substitute.

Last evening Mr. Johnsten, flag in hand, was standing on the south track at his crossing waiting for the 6:50 o'clock train from the east. He did not know that behind him three or four freight cars were being shunted by the yard engine. The yardman on top of the nearest car shouled to him to get off the track, but Mr. Johnston heard him not until it was within a foot of him. He dashed to one side, but the process of swinging the colk leg around was too slow. The limb was caught beneath the wheels and ground to atoms. 
