NOVEL INSURANCE. A peculiar form of insurance is just now in active demand in England. Many persons who have invested large sums in renting windows along the route of the great June procession have minimized their risk out policies on the life of the Queen. A large number of such insurances have been effected at Lloyd's, at the rate of five guineas per cent fo months. Double this percentage is the quotation for "risks" which guar antee the insurer from loss through the abandonment of the procession from any cause whatever. As much as 20 guineas per cent premium has been paid on large sums against the risk of the route being changed.

AN UNTRUTHFUL FLAG.

If ever there was anything in the world that went by contraries, it is the Chinese flag. It will be recalled that it is one of the gayest of national standards. 

On the other hand, the best doc-ors may still be consulted for the ridiculously small fee of five paper drachmas, which, according to the present rate of exchange, is scarcely more than 2 francs. If the doctor is in daily attendance, he seldom receives more than half that sum, no matter what his skill. Few teachers receive 5 drachmas an hour, whereas many are content to give three hours per week for 30 drachmas a month. Stalls at the best theater cost only 6 drach-mas, and that sum is the utmost a table d'hote dinner in Athens or Phalon will cost, exclusive of wines. 
