The new water scheme is a spring water scheme. It assures the citizens of London absolutely pure spring water for at least a decade, in the opinion of to, Winnipeg and other Canadian

others. It furnishes 1,300,000 gallons of the best spring water in the country, not | 500,000 gallons, as some critics declare.

It is the opinion of competent engineers that the spring water supply can be increased to 2,000,000 gallons. Engineer Moore, however, declares that he will not figure on possibilities but on the actual flow. It combines the best points on the

Maury and Chipman schemes. An Explanation.

Mr. Maury, in his scheme, did not advocate that the water in the Cronyn and White springs be allowed to run into the river and then filtered. He suggested in his scheme that the Cronyn and White springs be gather ed by mains and kept from the river

altogether. In this manner, 800,000 gallons spring water would not cost anything after the initial cost of collecting. Following up Mr. Maury's reasoning lot of spring water is just as beneficial as a little, and as a result the commission has added Kilworth which will add half a million gallons of water at a reasonable cost.
