What is an Adulterant?

Speaking of foodstuffs, an adulterant is not necessarily po or worthless matter mixed with foods.

It may be a perfectly pure and wholesome substance, but a substance which is not wanted in the particular article of diet in which it is found. Pure water, for instance, is a very precious liquid, but if the purest spring water is added to milk the milk is said to be adulterated.

Starch is far from being a worthless substance, but its presence in chocolate is not at all desirable, as it is taking the place of far more valuable foodstuffs found in the cocoa-bean.





The most radical is that relating to

the elections. Under the present system all districts in which several candidates run must continue voting until some one receives a clear major-This process of elimination has been shortened by means of party dickering, but at the cost of the political conscience of the beneficiaries. In the recent elections, for instance, royalists, monarchists and nationalists noticeabley lost ground. The number of their adherents has been steadily dwindling, so much so as to put them almost out of the running as They have enough, however, to turn their rout to advantage, for when they saw from the returns that their candidates had no chance of election they allied themselves with pronounced Socialists. Their combined support gave majoriies to the Socialist candidates.

While bringing about this result the allies made such terms that many Socialist deputies go to the chamber wearing royalist muzzles, which may be removed only to enable them to act with the party of the right, although professedly and by inclination they belong to the extreme left. The situation thus not only irritates the Socialists, but it leaves the Government with less support than the election returns seem to justify. It is dis-
