DRIVE AT RUMANIA ENEMY'S LAST CARD, STATES TIMES MAN

Checked on All Fronts, Teuton Forces Cannot Get Through To Crush Rumania-Crisis Not Over, But Ferdinand's Troops Have Crippled Gen. Von Falkenhayn's Offensive.

[Canadian Press.] London, Oct. 21.—Von Falkenhayn's offensive against the Rumanians in Transylvania proved to be Germany's last card, says the Times correspondent in Bucharest under Tuesday's date. If, after being checked on all other fronts, they are repulsed here their whole game can be considered lost, he writes. "Still, it cannot be assumed that the crisis is permanently passed," he continues, "although the Ruman-ians now hold the passes strongly and have spread panic among the enemy by rolling down on them from the mountains barrels of slime The Germans and Austrians now have twelve to fourteen divisions on the Transylvania front and pro bably will continue sending reinforcements as long as the weather permits operations in this moun-

The Carpathians have dug the tomb of thousands of the enemy, and the impetuous attacks of the Bavarian highlanders have been repulsed with enormous losses. "German submarines sank in the
Mediterranean the following ships: October 4, the armed British transport steamer Franconia, 18,455 tons; October 10, the armed British steamer Crosshill 5,000 tons, with horses and Serbian grooms; October 12, the armed British transport steamer Sedek, 4,600 tons which was deeply laden. The Crosshi and Sedek were bound for Saloniki.
"On October 16 a German submarine successfully shelled factories and railroad works near Catanzaro, in Calabria"

The sinking of the transport Franconia, a former Cunard liner, was re-ported in an official statement issued by the British admiralty on October 5. The Franconia carried no troops, and twelve of her crew of 302 were reported

The British steamer Crosshill was 400 feet long, and was built in Dumbarton in 1910. She was owned in Glasgow, and was last reported as leaving Liverpool for an unnamed destination

on September 20. The steamer Sedek referred to in the official statement probably is the Brit-ish steamer Sebek, of 4,601 gross tons, and owned in Liverpool. The Sebek and owned in Liverpool. The Sebek was built in West Hartlepool in 1909. and was 385 feet in length.
