POLES ADMINISTER SEVERE DEFEAT TO BOLSHEVIK FORCES

Reds Withdraw To East Under Pressure of Polish Troops.

TERRITORY RETAKEN

Battle Takes Place Between Two Armored Trains.

REDS READY FOR PEACE. London, March 30 .- George Tchitcherin, the Russian soviet foreign minister, has notified Poland of his willingness to open peace negotia-tions on April 10, as Poland had suggested, according to a wireless message from Moscow today. M. Tohitcherin suggests that the meeting be held somewhere in Esthonia.

Warsaw, March 30.—Russian Bolshevik forces which have been attacking the Polish front in Podolia have suffered severe losses and at points have withdrawn to the eastward, says an official statement issued at army head-quarters here today. Polish troops have pursued the enemy, and have retaken territory which was lost in the savage fighting of last week, it is said. A battle between armored trains took place east of Deranzia, it is said. trains were only 200 feet apart during the combat and soviet forces were obliged to withdraw, having lost several cars and suffered other severe losses.

Stricken communities were emerging today from the wreckage wrought by the storm, and relief measures for the thousands of injured and homeless were well under year. were well under way.

Wire communication in the affected areas was being restored, and this was expected to aid in clearing up the extent of the destruction and the total number of those who lost their lives.

An unverified report that 15 white persons were killed at Stovall, Ga., a village near La Grange, was being investigated. No accurate estimate of the total property damage, which runs into the millions, was available today.



As a result, said Dr. Nelson, journalism was free in Russia. Industries were being operated with a fair percentage for capital invested, and the rest of the profits were divided among the workers. Free use of land was granted the peasants, but no peasant could have more land than he and his own family could till without hiring help.

After referring to the great inventive genius, the wonderful musical and artistic talent of the Rusisans, and their high literary accomplishments, Dr. Nelson asked whether it would be so very strange after all if such people

very strange after all if such people could invent some improvement on government. He briefly explained the soviet system, and quoted from returned factory superintendents and others to show that the Bolsheviki were devotedly honest and fair even to for devotedly honest and fair even to for-

Although the country roads all have the appearance of being hard and dry, and dust is flying on all roads throughout the district, they are decidedly unsafe for heavily-laden motor trucks, safe for heavily-laden motor trucks, according to Charles Talbot, the county engineer. Many heavy trucks have beengineer. come stuck in the soft spots on the roads during the past week. It is almost impossible for heavy loads to travel any great distance before coming to grief. A bad spot has been discovered tween this city and Lambeth, where a stretch of road some thirty or forty feet in length and covering the whole width of the road is a veritable bog. The cause is thought to be a broken tile in drain running beneath the roadbed. Because it is impossible for the light-est car to cross the spot, the road has been diverted for some little distance been diverted for some little distance on to the old traction right-of-way. The ties that have been taken up have been used to build a gangway to and from the roadway. The hard bed of the old electric line has made a good sound passageway.





> PEN PORTRAIT AT THE PEACE CONFERENCE. John Maynard Keynes, who was attached to the British treasury during the war, was its official representative at the Paris peace conference until June 7, 1919; he also sat as deputy for the chan-June 7, 1919; he also sat as deputy for the chancellor of the exchequer on the supreme economic council. In his remarkable book, recently published, "The Economic Consequences of Peace," he gives a serious of remarkable peace conference portraits. Of President Wilson he writes:

"We had quite a wrong idea of the president. him to be very strong-willed and obstinate. did not figure him as a man of detail, but the clearness with which he had taken hold of certain main ideas would, we thought, enable him to sweep through cobwebs. Besides these qualities he would have the objectivity, the cultivation and the wide

The great distinction of language which has marked his famous notes seemed to indicate a man of powerful and lofty imagination. His portraits indicated a fine presence and a commanding delivery. With all this he had attained and with increasing authority the first position in a country where the arts of the politician are neglected. All of which, without excepting the impossible, seemed a fine combination of qualities

for the matter in hand. "The first impression of Mr. Wilson at close quarters was to impair some, but not all, of these and exactly like his photographs, and the muscles distinguished. 

The Government at Berlin has announced a decided repulse of the redarmy before Wesel and south of Munster, according to advices received here.
Following a conference of representatives of the Berlin trades unions

and the communist authorities there were signs of discord in the workmen's army and a conflict between the military and civil leaders of the movement. The conference declared strongly for supremacy of the political leaders. Sent to Conference.

All the parties of the left sent their leaders to the conference from Berlin, and these united in urging peace and the cessation of warfare. The strongest advocate of the communists was Dr. Paul Levy, president of the Communist party of Germany, who was recently released from prison, where he was serving a term for a political offence. Dr. Levy denounced the commander in-chief of the workmen's forces, Herr Leitner, and the army itself in opposing an armistice, as an attempt at military dictatorship.

McBride, was appointed to consider the plumbing bylaw during its suspension and make recommendation as to amending it. A letter from the Chamber of Commerce urged reconsideration of the bylaw and stated that some members of that organization had reported that the new bylaw had increased costs of plumbing as much as 75 per cent.

Ald. Cunningham cited specific instances in which prices had been greatly advanced since the bylaw became effective. These were greeted with derisive laughter by members of a delegation of plumbers which was in the room.

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
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


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
