## LORD MAYOR OF CORK MURDERED BY SINN FEIN COMRADES AFTER EXPULSION FROM INNER CIRCLE

### MacCurtain, Along With Six Others, Doomed To Death Following Disclosures in Letters Found in Mail When Van Is Robbed—Three Have Been Killed, While the Sinn Fein Death Sentence Hangs Over Heads of Remaining Four.

London, March 30.—Lord Mayor MacCurtain, and six other prominent men who were expelled from the inner circle of the Sinn Fein and condemned as untrustworthy to the cause they had vowed to support were doomed to death, in a field at Limerick. Of these seven, Lord Mayor MacCurtain was the first to be killed. Another, Professor Stockley, was shot at four times, but escaped with his life. A third man, whose identity has not been disclosed, was found wounded, bound and shot to death, in a field at Limerick. He held in his hand a rosary. The remaining four are still alive so far known to the public. "It appears," the newspaper declares, "that the Sinn Fein inner circle organized an attack on a mail van in Dublin on March 19, and the men sent to do the

### Hamilton Clergyman Praises Russian Bolsheviks; Roundly Denounces Irish Sinn Feiners

Quotes Returned Factory Superintendents To Show Bolsheviks Honest and Fair—Says Sinn Feiners Are Only Bluffing.

Praise and kind words for the Russian Bolsheviks, but ridicule and denunciation for the Irish Sinn Feiners, were the predominant keynote of an address on the Russian and Irish situations by Rev. Dr. S. Banks Nelson, Presbyterian clergyman of Hamilton, speaking in King Street Presbyterian Church last night.

"We were bamboozled about Russia; we are now being re-bamboozled," said Dr. Nelson, who made merry at the expense of newspaper editors, who had so long misrepresented the truth about Russia, and pointed out as one of the greatest reforms the Bolsheviks had undertaken the ending of anti-trust laws, papers being forbidden to carry paid advertisements.

After referring to the great inventive genius, the wonderful musical and artistic talent and the quietness of the high literary accomplishments, Dr. Nelson asked whether it would be so very strange after all if such people could invent some improvement on government. He briefly explained the Soviet system and quoted from returned factory superintendents and others to show that the Bolsheviks were steadily honest and fair even to their enemies.

Lloyd George's Dilemma. Sinn Fein, however, was not all right, even if it did mean Ireland for the Irish, republic to spring up at her very doors, but Lloyd George would force home rule on Ireland even if he did not succeed. Dr. Nelson warned that he would lose his political head within a few days if he went home rule.

While Dr. Nelson laid most of the blame for Irish troubles on the Roman Catholic Church, he also pointed out the snobbery of Protestants in Ireland did great harm. The landed and commercial classes had treated the poor as "poor papists," and so the agitators were able to make the people believe that they were only upstarts.

Try It On George. "Holy Mary," said the pope, "what a heavenly smell!" "Well," continued Dr. Nelson, "if you could uncork a bottle of Irish whiskey under King George's nose and get him to make the sign of the cross just once from the toe of Cork to Donegal they would sing 'God Save the King' eternally."

### TURN EAST END TOWN HALL INTO AN APARTMENT

Solution of Housing Congestion Advanced by Alderman.

Relieving London's housing problem by converting the East London town-hall into apartments is a suggestion advanced by Ald. E. R. Seabrook. He believes that this building could be converted at a nominal cost and at least twelve apartments formed above the fire hall and the public library, which are accommodated on ground floor of the building.

### DEFINITE POLICY FOR ST. RAILWAY

Matter "Under Advisement" At Present, Says Ald. Cunningham. A definite policy in regard to the street railway will be laid before the city council within the next three weeks, Ald. C. G. Moorhead inquired at the council meeting last night whether No. 1 committee intended to do anything in regard to service and the paying work which the company would be expected to do this year.

### NO ORGANIZATION OF SINN FEINERS IN THIS DISTRICT

Not Even Local Branch of the Hibernal in This City—Mostly Home Rulers. Sinn Fein in London appears to have no abiding centre of agitation or regularly formed organization, despite the fact that tumultuous applause for Sinn Fein songs in theatrical performances evoked approval and interest from the Sinn Fein sympathizers. Reports of Sinn Fein activities in quarters where reliable information might be expected to be available, however, light the fact that there is not even a local branch of the Ancient Order of Hibernians existing in London at present time.

Home Ruler as an easily-satisfied stumbling block in the way to Irish freedom. Sinn Fein recognizes no lines of color, creed or race. Not long ago a Sinn Feiner in an Orange lodge in Detroit, Windsor and other border points Sinn Feiners and "reds" are rampant in agitation, and London seems to be too far inland to feel more than a ripple of the sea of Sinn Fein. From the Detroit side of the river Sinn Fein and other anti-British sentiment in London appears to be more for Home Rule for Ireland, but not separation from the British Empire. The only exception to this sentiment came from men who were not primarily interested in the Irish question, but believed in Sinn Fein as a matter of course because they belonged to local red factions, or anti-British nationalists. The latter although few in number favor Irish independence as an incidental result of their own ideal of Canadian independence.

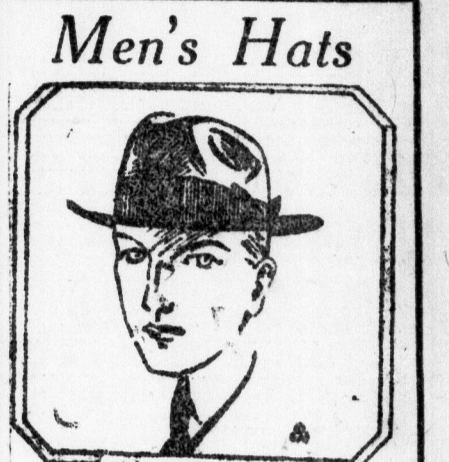

### SOCIALISTS AND TRADE UNIONISTS INSIST ON RETURN OF MINISTRY

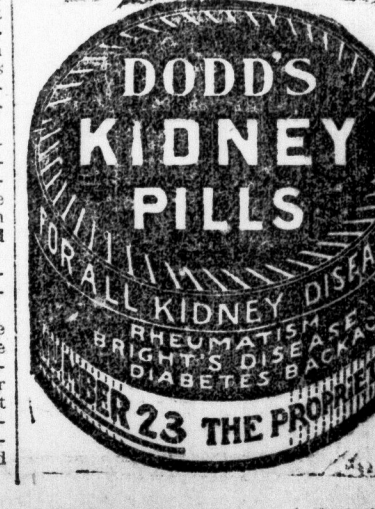
Political Situation in Denmark Reaches Critical Stage. Copenhagen, March 30.—Socialist and trade union representatives who conferred with King Christian last night relative to the political crisis which has arisen in Denmark, demanded immediate reinstatement of the Zorn ministry, an immediate call for a meeting of the Rigsdag and the introduction of more constitutional conditions in this country. Declarations were made that if these demands were rejected there would probably be a general strike. Crowds in the public square up to an early hour this morning were raising cries for the establishment of a republican form of government for Denmark. Slight disturbances occurred while soldiers were occupying one of the squares and cries of "Long live the republic" were heard during the night.

### CHARGES SUSTAINED

New York Assemblers Are Found Guilty. Albany, N. Y., March 30.—The charges preferred against the five Socialist members of the New York State Assembly have been sustained in the opinion of a majority of the thirteen members of the judiciary committee, which investigated the qualifications of the suspended members. In a report submitted to the Assembly today, the majority of the committee states that the Socialists are disqualified from holding their positions in the Legislature, and that the seats to which they had been elected should be declared vacant. Several minority reports were submitted, declaring against the recommendation of the majority. Seven of the thirteen members of the committee favor the expulsion of the entire Socialist delegation, the committee would reseat them, and another recommends the unseating of August Gleason, floor leader of "minor minority," Charles Solomon and Lewis Waldeman, and reinstating Samuel Orr and Samuel A. De Witt.

ENGLISH WOMAN HAS REMARKABLE SUCCESS INTENSIVE GARDENER

Grows Four and Five Crops a Year in Her "Golden Soil."

LONDON, March 29.—A great and growing success has been won as the reward of original ideas by Miss Jones, a woman gardener of Berkshire; and her career is full of promise for like enterprises.

Twelve years ago she started at Thatcham, in Berkshire, an intensive garden, which was visited by hundreds from all parts of England when the astounding feats of French intensive gardeners were first published in the London papers. She grew four and five crops a year in her "golden soil," and was able to supply many big hotels and the best London shops with early forced vegetables, much to her financial advantage.

Garden Has Grown. The garden has grown steadily ever since, and now contains an orchard that promises to be even more lucrative than the vegetable and flower garden before the war. Among feats during the war, Miss Jones managed the better part of the glass houses at Windsor with her pupils, who, as the old Scottish gardener confessed, "made good."

## Union Govt. Is Hanging On With Grip of Death; Opposition Is Confident

### Fifth Week of Session Opens With Gloomy Prospects For Administration — Government Has Given Up Hope of Winning By-elections.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

OTTAWA, March 29.—The fifth week of the session opens with the Government forces determined to sit tight and hang together until by flux of time they are forced to go hence and be no more seen in public life. There is a decided unanimity on that point; there may be some who would like to go back to their old party allegiance, but even these realize that they have stayed too long with Union to be accepted by either of the two former parties, or by any of the new.

So they have made up their minds to hang on together until dissolution finally does come, and the people must be faced. It may safely be predicted that on no important question of policy on which the Government stakes its reputation will there be any considerable number of bolters during the present session, one reason being that the Government on all occasions will compromise where necessary to prevent cleavage, and the other that the number of bolters will always be carefully kept below that number which might endanger the existence of the administration.

### Opposition Is Confident.

The fifth week of the session finds the Opposition, on the other hand, confident and in fighting trim. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Opposition, has, by his masterly and aggressive speech on the address, and his equally masterly and aggressive exposition of Canada's status among the nations of the world, secured the undivided support of the men whom he heads, and has met the test of leadership splendidly. The acceptance by the Government on numerous questions of Liberal doctrines preached and practiced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier during his long career, has been emphasized by him on more than one occasion, and the vindication of the Liberal naval policy through the Jellicoe report has been received with keen gratification by those who were Sir Wilfrid's followers, and who are now led by Mr. King.

Incline to Liberals. Inevitably the members of the new Farmers' party are inclining towards the Liberals. In all matters of importance, so far, they have approved and backed the Liberal contentions, and it is becoming apparent that there is no important divergence of opinion between them and the Liberal party. In fact, it is becoming apparent to them evidently that the Liberal platform framed at the national convention of August, 1919, is for the benefit of all sections of the people, and is national in its scope. It is anticipated, for instance, that the amendment to the budget will be moved by Hon. W. S. Fielding, the Opposition financial critic, and that the members of the Farmers' party will vote for it, and will not themselves initiate an amendment.

### Has Given Up Hope.

The Government has given up hope of winning any of the three by-elections which take place on April 7. Neither in Kamouraska, nor in St. James have they put up a candidate. In Temiskaming there is a Unionist, and his chances, slim at the best, have, it is stated, been irretrievably injured by the presence in the platforms during the campaign of members of the Union Government, speaking in his support. In the meantime, the Maritime Provinces are without a representative in the Government. Messrs. Carvel and MacLean having got out while the getting was good, and Sir Robert Borden, the absent premier, never really having represented any part of the Maritime Provinces in any case. As a consequence the interests of these provinces are being shamelessly neglected. By-elections are no safer for the Government than the regular ones, anywhere else, so a minister cannot be got with a spirit adventurous enough to stand for election in the House.

In addition two and a half millions of people of the Dominion, namely the French-Canadians, are without representation on the cabinet. Hon. P. E. Blondin, postmaster-general, is handling his department from the Senate, since he is unable to get to the different constituencies at the last election he cannot be said to represent his people in the cabinet. Nevertheless the Government has decided to hang on.

### LIBERALS CONFIDENT OF VICTORY IN ALL THREE BY-ELECTIONS

OTTAWA, March 29.—(By Canadian Press).—With the date of three by-elections on the horizon, the Liberals are showing little more than a smug interest in the possible outcome in the constituencies is being shown by the members here. So far the Liberals are claiming that the result of the voting in the three seats will add to their strength in the House. In Kamouraska, Ernest La Pointe's old seat, the feeling appears to be quite general that Adolphe Steen, Liberal, will be returned by acclamation. There has been no serious contention thus far.

In St. James' division of Montreal, where the vacancy occurred through the death of L. A. Lapointe, the fight appears to be between Fernand Rivest, Liberal, and A. Mathieu, Liberal-Labor. In Temiskaming, where the vacancy occurred through the death of Hon. Francis Cochrane, former minister of railways, there is to be at least a three-cornered fight between Major G. W. Patten, Unionist; A. G. Slaight, Liberal; and Angus McDonald, Labor-Unionist. The result of the election in this riding and the result will be in doubt until the last vote is counted.

### BRANTFORD TO HAVE ONLY PASTEURIZED MILK SOLD IN CITY

### Petition For Non-Pasteurized Cream Refused by Council.

BRANTFORD, March 29.—At the special meeting of the city council to-night a petition allowing the sale of non-pasteurized cream was refused. A by-law enforcing pasteurization goes into effect May 1, and four new pasteurization plants have been erected here. The week of April 23 to 30, will be health and clean-up week here.

H. J. Symons was appointed to the housing commission, vice W. Weeks, removed from the city, and Ald. John Hill to the Brent sanitary board, vice E. L. Good, deceased.

### SAYS GOVERNOR OF INDIA IS INCAPABLE; SHOULD BE RECALLED

### Commission Probing Disturbances Scores Officials.

DELHI, Ind., March 29.—The special commission appointed by the national congress to inquire into the recent disturbance in the Punjab, has published its report. It says that the commission finds Baron Chelmsford, viceroy and governor-general of India, incapable of holding his high office and demands his recall.

### WAR STILL ON

OTTAWA, March 29.—(By Canadian Press).—Answering George Parent (Quebec West) in the Commons at afternoon, Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, stated that the proclamation officially declaring that the war with Germany and Austria and their allies has ended will be issued when peace shall have been legally restored with the last of the enemy powers.

# DEATH LIST IN TORNADO NEARS TWO HUNDRED

Thousands Homeless Following Havoc by Palm Sunday Storm. CHICAGO, March 29.—The death list of the Palm Sunday tornadoes stood at 160. Telegraph and telephone service with many isolated communities was in the middle west had only been restored to some extent, and indications were that the storm had done more damage than was known. The known death toll in six central western states numbered 106, while 19 were killed in Georgia and Alabama. The property loss in the Chicago area alone was estimated at \$40,000,000, while in the other states affected the damage there being \$4,000,000. Illinois was the worst of the central states, with 30 dead, more than a thousand injured and two thousand homeless.

# FEDERAL TEMPERANCE ACT APPLICABLE TO ONTARIO, IS OPINION

Department of Justice Says Law Needs No Further Amendment.

OTTAWA, March 29.—(By Canadian Press)—The amended Canada temperance act, passed towards the end of the previous session last year, needs no further amendment to be applied to the province of Ontario, in the opinion of the department of justice. Dr. H. B. Whidden, Brandon, was informed by the department of justice a series of questions which Dr. Whidden placed on the order paper some days ago. In a letter to Hon. N. W. Rowell, Lord Robert Cecil, president of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance, said in part as follows: "I am interested in the intention of the Government that the act should apply to the province of Ontario, and in the opinion of the department of justice, does it apply?"

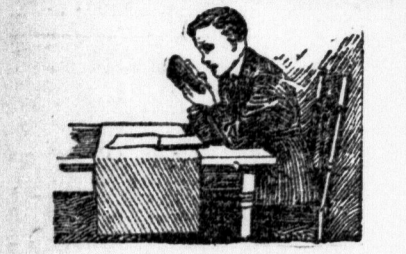

PLUMBING BYLAW SUSPENDED PENDING AN INVESTIGATION

Critics Say It Results in Boosting of Prices.

LONDON BILL APPROVED
Whole Council a Committee To Bring It Before the Legislature.

Suspension of the plumbing bylaw for three weeks; final approval of the London bill and appointment of the whole council as a committee to bring it before the Legislature; and appointment of a committee to deal with the level crossing menace comprised the most important business transacted by the city council last night.

A committee, composed of Ald. O. I. Cunningham, John Bridge, G. B. Drake, E. R. Seabrook, Mayor Little, W. Hyatt, E. Hayman, R. G. Wilson, G. Egbert, B. Noble, C. J. Wright and J. C. McBridge, was appointed to consider the plumbing bylaw during its suspension and make a recommendation as to amending it. A letter from the Chamber of Commerce urged reconsideration of the bylaw and stated that 75 per cent of the plumbers had reported that the new bylaw had increased costs of plumbing as much as 75 per cent.

Ald. Cunningham cited specific instances in which prices of materials had greatly advanced since the bylaw became effective. These were greeted with derisive laughter. A motion for a delegation of plumbers which was in the room.

Similar Complaints.
Ald. F. E. Harley pointed out that similar complaints had been made about the electrical inspection bylaw when it was first adopted. There was no doubt that differences in cost had been caused, but this was not entirely due to the bylaw.

The suspension was authorized by a two-thirds vote of the council. The London bill was taken up in committee of the whole and approved with one amendment by which the committee and the London Railway Commission will be included in computing the debenture debt of the city.

Other Clauses.
Other clauses of the bill were not changed in their original form. A commission form of government for the city, with the consent of the council, to spend \$150,000 for a new Ridout street bridge, \$100,000 for storm sewers, \$35,000 for two motor buses, \$10,000 for a fire truck and four alarm boxes; to spend \$100,000 on a first mortgage to the Women's Christian Association for enlarging the Home for Incurables; to spend \$85,000 for general purposes of the waterworks department, \$80,000 in the electrical department, and \$125,000 on the London and Port Stanley Railway.

Ald. John Bridge moved that the whole council appear as a committee before the private bills committee in the Legislature when the bill comes before that body. Some of the members of the council are opposed to several of the clauses, and said they would oppose them if they went to Toronto.

Ald. Watkinson was one of those. He pointed out that the Ridout street bridge proposition had been voted down by the people, and reminded the council that Charles I. had been beheaded because he refused to obey the mandate of the people. He moved that that clause be struck from the bill. This required a two-thirds vote, and it was lost, as only three members supported it.

In regard to the motor buses Ald. Watkinson said the council might as well put two express wagons on the street to compete with the street railway. He claimed he could tell "something" about the proposal to buy motor trucks if he were not afraid of hurting somebody's feelings.

Ald. Cameron Wilson said the whole thing was ridiculous and moved an amendment that several of the clauses be submitted to a vote of the people. This was defeated.

The Level Crossings.
Ald. Watkinson, Cameron Wilson, G. Moorhead and G. B. Drake were appointed a committee to investigate the possibilities of providing better protection at level crossings. Ald. Moorhead brought in a motion to have the matter laid before the Dominion Government through the member for London. No action was taken on this, as it was thought better to await the report of the special committee.

Ald. Wilson pointed out that the Government would take over the Grand Trunk Railway on April 1, and that the council should be in possession of information to present soon after that time. In the meantime he suggested that the council take all the power to improve conditions by providing better lighting at the crossings, and causing the removal of sign boards and fences which prevent a clear view of the crossings. He also suggested that the railway board be approached at all hours, instead of from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., so that a worker in the question of the type of watchmen might be taken up. It seemed to be a policy of the road to employ men in these positions who were unfit for any other work. He thought this work demanded

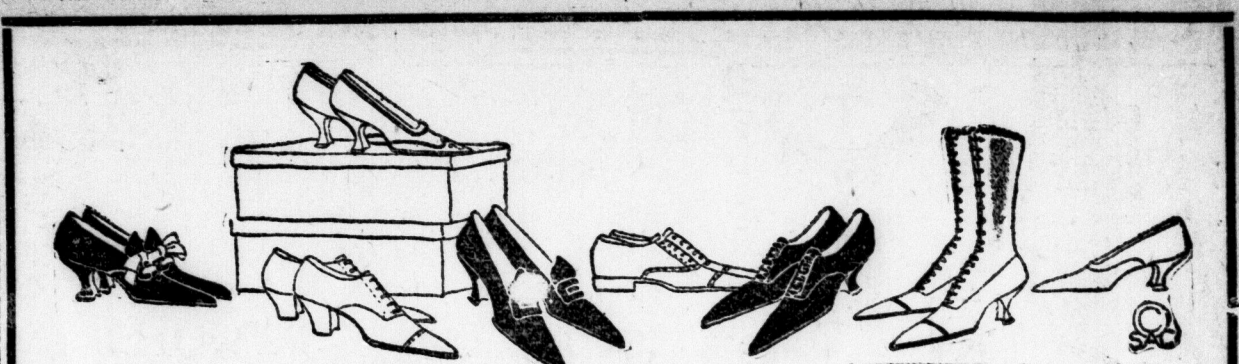
