BRITAIN IS TO REMOVE CATTLE **EMBARGO SOON**

Commission Named To Investigate Returns Favorable Report.

ENDS 30 YEARS' FIGHT

The Canadian Interests Have Waged Steady Campaign Since 1892.

London, Sept. 15.—(Canadian Press Cable).—The British cattle embargo commission reports entirely favorable to the admission of Canadian cattle. It rejects the disease theory, but admits that the removal of the embargo would have a certain prejudicial effect on Scottish and Irish farming interests.

m giving their conclusions regarding the importation of Canadian cattle the embargo commission says: "We are of the opinion that the admission would tend to increase the meat supply of the country to some extent, but it must not be assumed that the increase would necessarily be equivalent to the whole number of cattle so admitted, as some would merely replace store cattle raised here. We think that such admis-sion would cheapen in some measure the meat supply, but we have no data whereou that extent can be accurately assumed that the increase whereon that extent can be accurately gauged. We think in the long run the tendency would be to bring prices to a level somewhat, but not gre than they would be if the embargo was





An Ocean Leviathan.

Few people unaccustomed to ocean travel are aware of the tremendous advance that has been made recent period. The Great Eastern, which in her day was considered a veritable world's wonder, has long been surpassed, and at the present day she can be visualized only as an obsolete hulk, whose only useful there was the ill-fated Titanic and the still more baggy trousers and big feet. tragic Lusitania to represent for a brief space the modern type of vessel; and now there will soon be launched one which in size and equipment will surwith a gross tonnage of about 56,000, and accommodation for 4,000 passengers.

This ocean leviathan will have a length of 956 feet, a height from keel to boat deck of 102 feet, and a breadth of over 100 feet. It is hard for one to realize just what these measurements mean. For example, take the length of this new marine monster; it is considerably greater than a long city block. The height is about equal to that of a ten-story building, and the breadth greater than the average city thoroughfare. Many waves have rolled, and myriads of crystal mountains have been cast loose from the frozen north since Martin Chuzzlewit and Mark Tapley set sail for America in the good ship "Screw," and one has only to read Dickens' masterly description of that voyage to realize what tremendous changes in ocean travel the years have brought.

The Apple Crop.

The apple crop in Ontario this season is only about 60 per cent of 1920. Quebec has not more than 35 to 40 per cent that of last year, and New Brunswick about 60 per cent. On the other hand it is expected that Nova Scotia will have a commercial crop about 10 per cent in excess of that of last year, and in British Columbia prospects point to the yield being twice that of the preceding season.

Owing to the sharp declines which have taken place in many products, especially in those of the farm, fruit growers have been displaying some system as a means of assisting the Government in the anxiety as to whether correspondingly low prices will prevail for apples. Last year Ontario orchardists came off badly in the returns obtained, and hundreds
