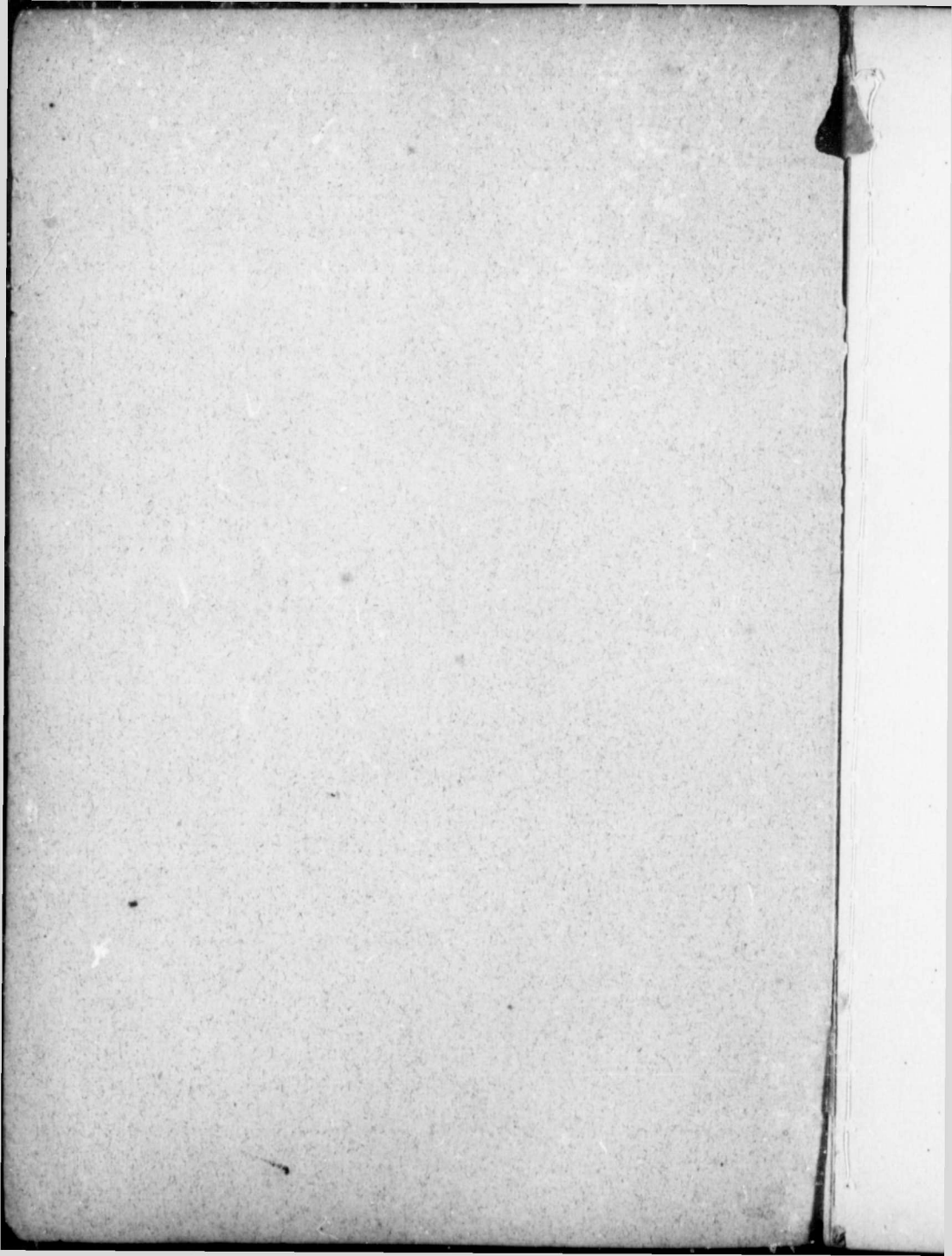

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT, 1883.

---

*To the Members of the Board of Trade.*

The proceedings of the Board have been characterized by much activity during the year. The general meetings, and those of the Council, have been numerous and well attended, and we begin another year with numbers increased during the year from 137 to 155. The interest of the members in the work has been very general and well sustained, and practical results have attended the action of the Board in many instances.

### TRADE SALES.

The Council was successful in obtaining a renewal of the privilege of reduced fare tickets on all the lines of railway centering in Toronto for buyers attending the trade sales of our wholesale dry goods merchants, in the spring, and again in the autumn. The free return tickets issued in the spring numbered 1,500, and in the autumn 1,433 return tickets, at a fare and a third, were issued, although they were then not so much of a boon, in consequence of cheap tickets being issued during September to the general public, in attendance at our Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition.

### INSOLVENCY.

Early in the year the Council had its attention directed to the increasing necessity for legislation in reference to the equitable distribution of Insolvent Debtors' estates.

The Board took up the subject vigorously, and appointed a committee who, in conjunction with a committee from the Hamilton Board of Trade, and with the assistance of Mr. E. R. C. Clarkson, accountant, and Mr. D. E. Thomson, revising counsel, framed a measure, which was printed and

distributed to merchants and lawyers, the various Boards of Trade, banking and other commercial institutions, thus bringing the subject prominently before all those interested, and eliciting public opinion thereon, to an extent which could scarcely have been attained in any other way.

The Montreal Board of Trade having in like manner approved of a similar measure, which was introduced into the House of Commons at its last session by Mr. Curran, Q. C., your Council cordially approved of their suggestion, that a joint committee of these three Boards should undertake the consolidation of the two measures, in order to secure unanimity on the part of these representative commercial organizations.

We had great pleasure in receiving a deputation from Montreal on this mission, and, after much arduous labour, the object was accomplished.

This joint production has this to commend it, that it has been framed by those having a thorough practical knowledge of the subject, and its provisions have been made to harmonize with the common law in each province.

However adequate it may be found to meet the necessities of the case, the careful and laborious efforts of these Boards to secure the needed legislation is amply justified by a recent utterance of the Hon. J. J. C. Abbot, M. P., as follows:—

“I never entertained or expressed the opinion that the present law furnished satisfactory means for the equitable distribution of Insolvent Debtors' estates, believing as I do that the means which the law affords, not only in the Province of Quebec but in the other Provinces, for the distribution of Insolvent estates, are so inadequate, as to be a positive disgrace to a country professing to have any commercial interests worth protecting.”

The Government was earnestly entreated by a deputation representing the Boards of Trade of Montreal, Toronto, and Hamilton, to legislate at the present session of Parliament in the direction indicated. The deputation was most courteously received by the members of the Privy Council, and strong hopes are cherished that the Government will assume the responsibility of the needed legislation. It may be added that the Winnipeg Board of Trade has fully endorsed the views of this Board as to the absolute necessity for some such measure, the absence of which is felt to be productive of great hardships in the peculiar circumstances of that new country.

#### AMALGAMATION WITH CORN EXCHANGE.

Considered in regard to its future career, the contemplated amalgamation of the Corn Exchange with this Board is probably the most important subject that has ever engaged its attention.

The cordial unanimity that has characterised the conferences of the committees of the two corporations charged with these delicate negotiations, indicates clearly, the entire confidence of both that the union proposed will conduce to the influence and usefulness of the amalgamated body. It is earnestly to be desired that these negotiations, which have been so happily brought to their present advanced stage, will be harmoniously completed when the legislation from the Dominion Parliament now applied for is obtained. With a united membership of over 250 representing the commercial and industrial community of this great and growing metropolis, especially when they will include many of our most enterprising and public spirited citizens, members of the Corn Exchange, and the influence that numbers, wisely directed, exert, a career of greatly enhanced usefulness should be in store for this corporation.

#### IMPROVED PREMISES.

The question of improved accommodation for the Board of Trade, Corn Exchange and the Stock Exchange, all under one roof, through the efforts of the Committee charged with the matter, seems to be in a fair way of satisfactory solution. Plans have been prepared for alterations to the north end of the building, in which we are at present meeting, and the amalgamated concern will doubtless find it advantageous to incur the additional expense necessary, to place it in possession of these convenient and creditable premises.

#### STATISTICS.

During the year a commencement has been made in the collection and publication of official statistics referring to the trade of the city, in pursuance of a desire frequently expressed at the meetings of the Council during the past few years.

The monthly returns of Imports and Exports, and Inland Revenue, in detail for 1882 and 1883, have been promptly issued to the members during the year, and have not only proved of great value and interest to many of them, but have been fully published by the city press; they have been asked for by a number of Chambers of Commerce in Britain, and carefully tabulated summaries of them have been found in the British journals, devoted to trade and commerce.

In the Appendix to this report will be found statistics accurately tabulated of the Imports and Exports, Duties, Salaries, Contingencies, cost of collection and percentage thereof, &c., at this Port for every quarter *begin-*

ning in April, 1844, down to the present date, which the Council, at some expense, deemed it in the public interest to acquire for preservation in permanent form, as of great historic and economic value, and it is intended to continue the publication of the like items annually hereafter.

The other statistics appended which need not be here enumerated, but which it is contemplated will be enlarged from year to year, (so as to include the manufacturing and other industrial enterprises of the city, that the outside world as well as those more immediately interested may form some idea of the condition and progress of its industries), are highly significant of the importance of Toronto, as a great, steadily growing, financial, commercial, and industrial centre.

#### IMPORTS.

As illustrative of its growth, as an importing centre, let me direct your attention briefly to the following table:—

#### EXPORTS.

Referring to its exports, as has been pointed out in previous reports, the returns do not include the whole of the produce properly belonging to this Port, only that portion shipped to the United States, being entered at the Custom House here. The remainder going eastward, is not entered at the Customs until it reaches tide water.

It will be noticed, however, from the return on page 28 of the Appendix, that whatever may have been the result of the harvest, or the condition of our other industries which provide a surplus for export, comparing the exports of each year with that of the preceding ten years since 1860, there has always been an increase of from 2%, up to 13%, with the exception of the years 1876 and 1877, when there was a slight decrease.

#### FINANCIAL.

A glance at the Statistics of the Money Order Department of the Post Office, shewing orders issued in 1883, to the amount of \$270,886.59, and the orders paid amounting to \$1,251,436.80; letters numbering 5,877,935



delivered in the city, and letters and post-cards mailed to the tune of 11,207,200; a slight study of the statement of the affairs of the Loan Companies of which there are 28, having their head offices in Toronto, out of a total of 74 in all Ontario, and 106 in the Dominion, the amount on loan by the Toronto Companies being \$43,052,179.98, out of total loans of \$73,141,193.40 by all the Companies in the Dominion; a review of the Government statement of Chartered Banks, of which there are now seven, having their head offices in Toronto, with but three others in the Province having their head offices out of the city, the subscribed capital of the Local Banks being \$16,270,500.00, as against \$63,560,133.67, in all the Dominion—are indicative of the importance of this city as a monetary centre, at which the business of a rich agricultural Province is steadily concentrating.

#### ASSESSMENT.

The Assessment Statistics are also worthy of attention, indicating as they do that a much more equitable and effective method of assessing *personal property* is urgently required.

The present system is objectionable because of its partial, imperfect and inquisitorial character, giving the advantage to those who will make use of any and every expedient to avoid their fair share of the burden of taxation. The returns bear upon their face the evidence of failure on the part of the assessors to follow the natural increase in this class of property, for no one conversant with the subject will contend, that while real estate has increased in value from \$39,000,000 in 1877 to \$54,000,000 in 1884, personal property has only increased from \$7,086,805 in 1877 to \$7,452,980 in 1884, although \$82,675 was added last year through the annexation of St. Paul's Ward alone. In lieu of the present system it would not be difficult to levy a business tax based upon the rental, or upon the assessed value of the real estate occupied,—first grouping into classes, the various kinds of occupants,—that would apply with greater certainty and equity, and at the same time be free from an inquisitorial character.

Whether this is or is not the best remedy, the incidence of the personal property tax in this city is unquestionably capable of improvement, and the subject should be thoroughly ventilated.

#### TRADE PROSPECTS.

At this date it would seem almost superfluous to repeat what has found expression in so many quarters already as to the trade of the past year. We may very well record, however, that the feeling of confidence and

buoyancy which existed at this time last year, in reference to the future, has been replaced by not a little uncertainty and doubt as to what this year and the next are to produce. It seems inevitable, judging from the past, that the development of such a country as ours must be by alternations of expansion and depression, the duration of either being determined largely by the economic use made of the proceeds of our natural sources of wealth, such as our mines, forests, fisheries and farms.

How much of the increase of national wealth derived from these during the past four or five years has been transformed from a floating to a fixed and unproductive form, must necessarily be largely a matter for conjecture; but it is unquestionable that had the money which has been so transferred, remained in circulation, it would have tided us over the effects of one partially deficient harvest, and have probably been available for investment in some of the manufacturing industries, which are at present in so critical a condition for lack of it.

It is fortunate, however, that the present check to our progress, as indicated by the large increase in failures, over production, and lessened demand for labour, has not been altogether unforeseen, and the remedies of lessening imports and economising expenditure on the part of individuals, have already been applied. With even a moderately abundant harvest next autumn, anything like wide-spread disaster should be averted. There is nothing to produce alarm, but everything in the existing condition of affairs to commend the circumspect husbanding of resources, in the management of every mercantile enterprise in the Dominion.

The removal by death of the Hon. John McMurrich, one of our oldest and most esteemed merchants, during the past year, is recorded with deep regret. A suitable resolution of condolence was ordered by the Council to be engrossed, in book form, for presentation to Mrs. McMurrich, and the same was gratefully acknowledged.

The treasurer's report appended will be found satisfactory, and the duties of secretary have been performed by Mr. Wills to the entire satisfaction of the Council.

In conclusion, a plea is made to all engaged in mercantile pursuits in the city, to give their cordial countenance and support to this institution, by at least becoming members of it, and if possible attending its meetings. It can thus be made the instrument of incalculable benefit to all, and at some time its powerful aid may be invoked to the great personal benefit of the members, individually.
