Explanations, and Principal Articles of the Calendar for 1874.

EXPLANATIONS.

All the calculations are reduced to local mean time for Charlottetown, with the exception of the Sun's right ascension and declination, and the equation of time, which are given for the instant of apparent noon.

The various phenomena of the Moon's motions and the Tides, are given to the nearest minute. The bearings—true, not compass—of the Moon at the time of its changes, are given for the purpose of assisting or testing the truth of weather forecasts. The days of expected atmospheric disturbance are those on which the Moon, in its orbit crosses the equinoctial line, or attains its greatest North or South declination. When these days fall on or close upon—within two days—the time of a Moon's change or Perigee, or both combined, the disturbing influence on the atmospheric tides is proportionally increased. These cases are marked ** or *** according as two or three of these influences are combined, and the more closely these times agree, the stronger and more certain is the disturbance likely to be.

In addition to the general local disturbance on these days, it sometimes happens that the effect of a storm generated within the tropics, may be propagated so as to arrive within two or three days, it having been ascertained that the average rate at which the centre of such storms travel is about sixteen miles an hour.

ECLIPSES.

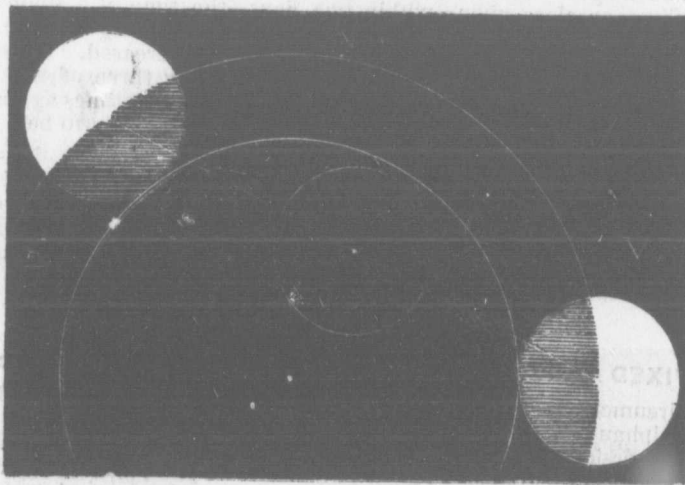
There will be four Eclipses during the year: two of the Sun and two of the Moon, of which only one will be visible in Charlotetown.

I. A Total Eclipse of the Sun. Greenwich mean time of conjunction, April 16, 1h. 17m. 3.7s.

II. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, May 4. Greenwich mean time of opposition, 4h. 31m. 14s.

III. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, October 9. Greenwich mean time of conjunction, 22h. 10m. 11.4s.

IV. A total Eclipse of the Moon, October 24. Greenwich mean time of opposition, 19h. 38m. 39s. Visible at Charlotetown, commencing 31 minutes past midnight. Ending 36 minutes past 5, a. m., Oct. 25.



TOTAL ECLIPSE OF MOON, OCTOBER 25.

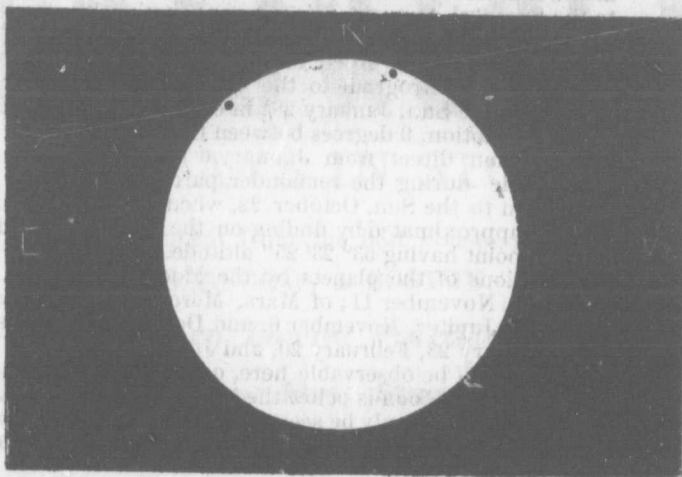

PLANETS.

MERCURY. Apparent motion alternately direct and retrograde between the following dates, when he is stationary either to the East or to the West of the Sun: March 8, E.; March 31, W.; July 11, E.; August 4, W.; November 4, E.; November 20, W.; being a morning star while to the westward, and an evening star when to the eastward of the Sun. He will be in inferior conjunction with the Sun, on March 18, July 25, and November 14; in superior conjunction on May 24, and September 8.

VENUS. Apparent motion direct til November 18, then retrograde to the end of the year. In superior conjunction with the Sun on February 23, after which she will re-appear as an evening star until the time of her inferior conjunction, on December 8, on which occasion she will pass across the Sun's disc, this the most important astronomical event of the year,—indeed, of the century—can only recur at alternating intervals of 105 and 8 years. It has only been as yet observed on three occasions, viz: by Horrocks, in 639, by Cook, Wrangel, and others, in 1761, and in 1769, the next Transit will be in 1882. In the present instance the time of conjunction of Venus and the Sun, will be 16h. 59m. 7.8s., G. M. T.—46m. 38s. past midnight, Ch'town. The accompanying cut represents the course of the Transit as it would be observed from the earth's centre, or what is the same, the place on the earth's surface, where the Sun is vertical at the time: that is along a line about 32 miles north of the tropic of Capricorn, from the east coast of Australia to a point in the Indian Ocean, nearly due south of Ceylon.

The reason of the importance of a transit of Venus in an astronomical point of view is, that from it, if accurately observed, alone is to be deduced the true distances of Venus and of the Sun, and from thence, of the rest of the planets, their relative distances being already well established. Simultaneous observations being made at places as far asunder as practicable. The more northerly the place of observation, the lower down on the Sun's disc, will be the course of the planet, and the longer chord described—and the further south the shorter will be the chord. The exactitude with which the distances can thus be determined being dependent on the accurate measurement of the distance between the observation stations.

MARS. Motion direct throughout the year. He will be a morning star during the first half, in conjunction on the fifth of July, after which he will re-appear as an evening star.

JUPITER. Motion direct till January 16, retrograde till May 19, after which direct to the end of the year. In opposition to the Sun on 17th March; coming to the meridian at midnight; in conjunction with the Sun on the 5th October. His range of motion about 26° in the constellation Leo.

SATURN. Motion direct till May 24; retrograde till October 11; afterward direct to the end of the year. In opposition to the Sun, 3rd August. His range of motion $12\frac{1}{2}$ degrees in the constellation Capricorn.

URANUS. Retrograde till April 13, then direct till November 20; after that retrograde to the end of the year. In opposition to the Sun, January 28; in conjunction, August 3. Range of motion, 9 degrees between Cancer and Leo.

NEPTUNE. Motion direct from January 6 to the 4th August. Retrograde during the remainder part of the year. In opposition to the Sun, October 22, when his whereabouts may be approximated by finding on the meridian at midnight, a point having $53^{\circ} 23' 25''$ altitude.

Of the occultations of the planets by the Moon, there will be of Venus, November 11; of Mars, March 19, Nov. 4, and Dec. 3; of Jupiter, November 6, and December 4; of Neptune, January 23, February 20, and June 10.

None of these will be observable here, occurring either in the day time or when the Moon is below the horizon. That of Mars, on the 4th Novem., will only be seen as a near approach, about 8° from the S. W. limb. That of the Moon, at 5 o'clock, a.m., Nov. 5.

FRENCH ROLLS.—Warm 1 oz fresh butter in a gill of milk, add a large table-spoonful of yeast and a little salt. Sift 1 pound flour into a pan, pour in and stir well the milk, and let the dough rise in a warm place, covering it with a thick cloth. When light, knead well, and form into rolls. Put these in a well-floured pan, in a warm place to rise, and bake in a quick oven.

CHEAP AND GOOD PUDDING.—Six figs, $\frac{1}{2}$ lb butter, two eggs, one table-spoonful of brown sugar, one of whiskey, and two of flour. Chop the figs small, and beat them up well with the eggs, butter, and sugar, then add the flour and whiskey, and bake in a quick oven twenty minutes. Serve with white-wine sauce.

BROWN SOUP.—Take equal parts of Carrots, turnips, onions, and celery; cut them all in the shape of very small dice. Put a good piece of butter in a saucepan, with a little pepper and salt, a tea-spoonful of powdered lump sugar; toss the carrots in this until they begin to take colour; then put in the celery, after a little time the turnips, and then the onions. When all the vegetables are equally coloured, add as much stock as you want soup, and set the saucepan by the side of the fire to simmer gently for a couple of hours. Then skim and serve.

STEWED PIGEONS.—Clean thoroughly four pigeons; mince the livers, and add to them two table-spoonfuls of chopped parsley and 2 oz butter; put this mixture into the insides of the birds; truss them with the legs inward, and put them into a stewpan with a few slices of bacon; add sufficient stock to cover them, and let them boil gently for nearly three-quarters of an hour. Dish them, strain the gravy, thicken them with butter and flour; add a table-spoonful each of ketchup and port wine; let it boil up, pour it over the pigeons, and serve.

MARLBOROUGH PUDDING.—Beat $\frac{1}{2}$ lb butter to a cream; add $\frac{1}{2}$ lb powdered lump sugar and four eggs well whisked. Beat all well together; then line a dish with puff-paste, spread over a layer of any kind of jam that may be preferred; pour in the mixture, and bake the pudding in a moderate oven for nearly three-quarters of an hour.

MEAT PIE.—Cut up some pieces of good, tender raw beef or mutton, season with pepper, salt, and if liked, one finely-minced onion; boil a half-dozen good-sized mealy potatoes, mash smooth and wet with enough milk to form a dough to make the crust, salt to please the taste, roll out full half an inch thick, and line a buttered dish large enough to hold the meat; lay in the meat, add a teacup of water, or less, if the pie is to be for a small family, then roll out a thick crust of the potato, covering the top of the pie at least an inch thick, and bake about an hour and a half.

FRICASEE OF PARSNIPS.—Boil in milk till they are soft, then cut them lengthwise into bits 2 or 3 inches long, and simmer in white sauce made of two spoonfuls of broth, a small piece of mace, half a cupful of cream, 2 oz butter, and some flour, pepper, and salt.

SWEETBREADS.—Trim a couple of sweet-breads, soak them for half an hour in tepid water, then parboil them for a few minutes, and lay them in cold water; when quite cold, take them out, dry them, and lard them quickly with fine strips of bacon. Put a slice of fat bacon in a stew pan with some onions, carrots, a bundle of sweet herbs, pepper, salt, and spices to taste, and a small quantity of rich stock; lay the sweetbreads on this, and let them gently stew till quite done, basting the top occasionally with the liquor. When cooked, strain the liquor, skim it of superfluous fat, reduce it almost to a glaze; brown the sweetbreads with a salamander, and serve with the sauce over them.

PREPARED CODFISH.—Soak or boil the codfish sufficiently to free it from salt, and then pick it into flakes. Mix it with mashed potatoes and hard boiled eggs; chop it all together very fine, and bake it until it is well done. Serve it with egg sauce.

RECIPE FOR CLEANING BLACK MARBLE.—Equal parts of soft-soap and pearlsh; rub it over the marble with soft flannel, and let it remain a few minutes; then wash off with warm water, and a second time with cold spring water; and when quite dry, polish with paraffine oil.

OYSTER FRITTERS.—Drain the liquor from the oysters, and to a cupful of this add the same quantity of milk, three eggs, a little salt, and flour enough for a thin batter. Chop the oysters and stir into the batter. Have ready in the frying-pan a few spoonfuls of lard, or half lard and half butter; heat very hot, and drop the oyster batter in by the table-spoonful. Try a spoonful first, to satisfy yourself that the lard is hot enough, and that the fritter is the right size and consistency. Take rapidly from the pan as soon as they are done to a yellow-brown, and send to the table very hot. Some fry the oyster whole, enveloped in batter, one in each fritter. In this case the batter should be thicker than if the chopped oyster were to be added.

OYSTER PIE.—Strain off the liquor from the oysters, and put it on to boil, with some butter, mace, nutmeg, pepper, and salt. Just as it boils, stir in a thickening of milk and flour, put in the oysters, and stir until they are sufficiently stewed, then take them off. When cold, add the yolks of two eggs well beaten. Line a shallow dish with puff-paste, fill it with a thick slice of bread to prevent the top crust falling in, put on the top paste and bake. When done, remove the top crust carefully, take out the bread, and pour in the oysters. Replace the top crust, and send the pie hot to table.

HAM OMELET.—Take about two table-spoonfuls of finely-minced lean ham, and fry in butter for two or three minutes. Beat the yolks of six and the whites of three eggs until very light, add the ham, with 2 oz butter broken into small pieces, and a seasoning of pepper, and stir all well together. Put about 2 oz butter into a small frying-pan, and when it begins to bubble whisk the eggs, &c., briskly for a minute or so, and pour into the pan. Stir it with a spoon (one way) until it thickens, and when the whole is set, fold it over so that it assumes an oval form, and when it is firm, and nicely brown on the under side, it is done. Serve very hot and quickly, without gravy.

WAFFER GINGERBREAD.—Half a pound of flour, half a pound of the coarsest sugar, one-quarter of a pound of butter, one desert-spoonful of allspice, two of ground ginger, the peel of half a lemon grated, and the whole of the juice; mix all these ingredients together, adding half a pound of treacle, so as to make a paste sufficiently thin to spread upon sheet tins; beat it well, butter the tins, and spread the paste very thinly over them. Bake it in rather a slow oven, and watch it till it is done. Withdraw the tins, cut it in squares with the knife the usual size of wafer biscuits, and roll each around the fingers as it is raised from the tin.

GERMAN FRITTERS.—Cut some slices of bread half an inch thick, without the crust, and soak them in milk; beat up two eggs, pour them over the bread, fry in butter, then strew powdered sugar over, and serve hot.

CALF'S-HEAD STEW.—Take the pieces of meat from the soup-pot and chop them fine, put them into a saucepan with some of the gravy, and stew it. Pick the brains and mix them with grated bread, pepper, and salt, and work them into small cakes with the yolk of an egg; fry them, and put them into the soup after it is placed into the tureen. Put paste around the stew that is baked separately; put that in a dish, and add ketchup and a few boiled eggs.

Gingerbread.—Rub one pound of butter well into three pounds of flour, then add one pound of powdered sugar, one pound of molasses, and two ounces of ginger, pounded and sifted very fine; then warm a quarter of a pint of cream, and mix all together; you may add carraways and sweet-meats if you choose; make it into a stiff paste. and bake it in a slow oven.

Queen Cake.—Beat one pound of butter to a cream, with some rose-water one pound of flour dried, one pound of sifted sugar, beat all well together, add a few currants washed and dried; butter small paps of a size for the purpose, grate sugar over them they are soon baked.

Muffins.—Mix a quart of wheat flour smoothly with a pint and a half of lukewarm milk, half a teacup of yeast, a couple of beaten eggs, a heaping teaspoonful of salt, and a couple of tablespoonfuls of lukewarm melted butter. Set the batter in a warm place to rise. When light butter your muffin-cups, turn in the mixture, and bake the muffins till a light brown.

Honey Cake.—One pound and a half of dried and sifted flour, three-quarters of a pound of honey, half a pound of finely pounded loaf sugar, a quarter of a pound of citron, and half an ounce of orange-peel cut small, of pounded ginger and cinnamon three-quarters of an ounce. Melt the sugar with the honey, and mix in the other ingredients; roll out the paste, and cut it into small cakes of any form.

A CHEAP FAMILY PUDDING.—One pound of flour, one pound of suet, chopped fine, three-quarters of a pound of treacle or sugar, one pound of carrots and potatoes, well boiled and mashed together, half a pound of rasins, three-quarters of a pound of bread-crumbs; spice flavoring, and peel optional. Mix the whole together with a little water; it must not be too stiff, and certainly not too moist. Rub a basin well with dripping, and boil for eight hours.

Cider Cake.—Cider cake is very good, to be baked in small loaves. One pound and a half of flour, half a pound of sugar, quarter of a pound of butter, half a pint of cider, one teaspoonful of pearlash; spice to your taste. Bake till it turns easily in the pans.

Superior Sponge Cake.—Take the weight of ten eggs in powdered loaf sugar, beat it to a froth with the yolks of twelve eggs, put in the grated rind of a fresh lemon, leaving out the white part; add half the juice. Beat the whites of twelve eggs to a stiff froth, and mix them with the sugar and butter. Stir the whole without any cessation for fifteen minutes, then stir in gradually the weight of six eggs in sifted flour. As soon as the flour is well mixed in, turn the cake into pans lined with buttered paper; bake it immediately in a quick but not a furiously hot oven. It will bake in the course of twenty minutes. If it bakes too fast, cover it with thick paper.

Bread and Butter Pudding.—Butter your pie-dish well, and strew the bottom with currants and candied peel; then place alternate layers of bread and butter in rather thin slices, and the peel and currants, until the dish is nearly full, observing to have currants at the top; then pour over, slowly and equally, a custard of sweetened milk and two or three eggs, flavoured to taste, and bake in a moderate oven for about twenty minutes.

Inflamed Gums.—A drop or two of camphorated spirits, rubbed on the gums, will allay inflammation.

SMALL PLUM-PUDDING.—Pour half-pint of milk over 1 lb fine bread-crumbs, and let them remain half an hour: then beat in 4 oz sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. suet, chopped fine, $\frac{1}{2}$ lb raisins, chopped, and 1 oz candied-peel cut fine. Beat all well up with four eggs, and boil in a mould for five hours.

QUAKING PLUM-PUDDING.—Take slices of light bread, spread thinly with butter, and lay in a pudding-dish layers of the bread and raisins, till within an inch of the top. Add five eggs, well beaten, and a quart of milk, and pour over the pudding; salt and spices to taste. Bake it twenty or twenty-five minutes, and eat with wine sauce. Before using the raisins, boil them in a little water, and put it all in.

YULE-TIDE CAKE.— Place 1 lb fresh butter in a pan; keep it near the fire till melted; stir into it 1 lb powdered loaf sugar, a good table-spoon-full each of beaten allspice and cinnamon: by degrees put in the yolks of ten eggs and their whites separately, whisked to a froth; add 1 lb candied citron-peel, sliced thin. 2 lb currants, cleaned and dried. 2 oz blanched sweet almonds, 1½ lb flour, and 4 oz brandy; mix all well together, and bake it for three hours.

Cream Cake.—Sift some double-refined sugar, beat the whites of seven or eight eggs, shake in as many spoonfuls of sugar, grate in the rind of a large lemon, drop the froth on a paper, laid on tin, in lumps at a distance, sift a good deal of sugar over them, set them in a moderate oven; the froth will rise; just color them; you may put raspberry jam, and stick two bottoms together; put them in a cool oven to dry.

Almond Cake.—Blanch half a pound of sweet and three ounces of bitter almonds, pound them to a paste in a mortar with orange-flour water, add half a pound of sifted loaf sugar, and a little brandy, whisk separately for half an hour the whites and yolks of twenty eggs, add the yolks to the almonds and sugar, and then stir in the whites, and beat them all well together. Butter a tin pan, sift bread raspings over it, put the cake into it, over the top of which strew sifted loaf sugar. Bake it in a quick oven for half or three-quarters of an hour.

Plum Cake.—One pound of dry flour, one pound of sweet butter, one pound of sugar, twelve eggs, two pounds of raisins (the sultana raisins are the best), two pounds of currants; as much spice as you please; a glass of wine, one of brandy, and a pound of citron. Mix the butter and sugar as for pound cake. Sift the spice, and beat the eggs very light. Put in the fruit last, stirring it in gradually. It should be well floured. If necessary, add more flour after the fruit is in. Butter sheets of paper, and line the inside of one large pan, or two smaller ones. Lay in some slices of citron, then a layer of the mixture, then of the citron, and so on till the pan is full. This cake requires a tolerably hot and steady oven, and will need baking four or five hours, according to its thickness. It will be better to let it cool gradually in the oven. Ice it when thoroughly cold.

Bannock or Indian Meal Cakes.—Stir to a cream a pound and a quarter of brown sugar, a pound of butter; beat six eggs, and mix them with the sugar and butter, add a teaspoonful of cinnamon, stir in a pound and three-quarters of white Indian meal, and a quarter of a pound of wheat flour (the meal should be sifted). Bake it in small cups, and let it remain in them till cold.

Biscuits.—A pound and a half of flour made wet with equal quantities of milk and water, moderately warm, made stiff, and rolled out very thin; cut them to any size you please, prick them, and bake them in a moderate oven on a tin. No flour to be put on the tins or biscuits.

CHRISTMAS PLUM CAKE.— Put 1 lb butter into a pan, with 1 lb powdered sugar, a little grated nutmeg, the rind of a lemon, grated, and half a tea-spoonful of salt. Beat them well together with the hand until forming a smooth cream. Then add, by degrees, ten eggs, beating it for ten minutes after. Now add 1½ lb sifted flour, beat till it is thoroughly incorporated, then add 1 lb raisins, stoned and chopped, 1 lb currants, 6 oz mixed peel, and a glass of noyeau. Stir it lightly, put it into a well-buttered mould, and bake in a moderate oven between three and four hours. A sure method of ascertaining if the cake is done, is to put a skewer down the centre. If the skewer comes out clean, the cake is done.

Sponge Gingerbread.—Melt a piece of butter of the size of a hen's egg, mix it with a pint of nice molasses, a tablespoonful of ginger, and a quart of flour. Dissolve a heaping tablespoonful of saleratus in half a pint of milk, and strain and mix it with the rest of the ingredients, add sufficient flour to enable you to roll it out easily, roll it out about half an inch thick, and bake it on flat tins in a quick oven.

Dough Nuts.—A pound and a half of flour, three eggs, half a spoonful of pearlsh, two ounces of butter, six ounces of sugar, one cup of milk. Spice to your taste, and fry in lard.

The two following provisions are found in the Customs Act of 1871:—

The Governor in Council may, from time to time, transfer to the list of goods which may be imported into Canada free of duty, any or all articles (whether natural articles or products of manufactures,) used as materials in Canadian manufactures; and any such materials mentioned in any Order in Council in that behalf, shall be free of duties of Customs from the time therein appointed for that purpose.

The Governor in Council may authorise the admission, free of duty, of any machinery to be used in any Canadian manufactory, on satisfactory evidence that like machinery is not then manufactured in Canada.

TABLE OF PROHIBITIONS.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars together with a forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz:

Books, Drawings, Paintings, Prints, and Photographs of an immoral or indecent character.

Coin, base and counterfeit.

THE FOLLOWING

Under Regulations and Restrictions to be prescribed by the Minister of Customs.

Carriages of travellers, and carriages laden with merchandise, and not to include circus troops and hawkers.

Locomotive and Railway passenger baggage and freight cars, running upon any line of road crossing the frontier, so long as Canadian locomotives and cars are admitted free under similar circumstances in the United States.

Menageries, horses, cattle, carriages, and harnesses of Travellers' baggage.

The last day of issuing summonses for the monthly sittings, is the Monday week previous to the first said Wednesday. The Act gives jurisdiction to the extent of £20 in cases of debt and trover, and to £5 in slander, detinue and replevin.

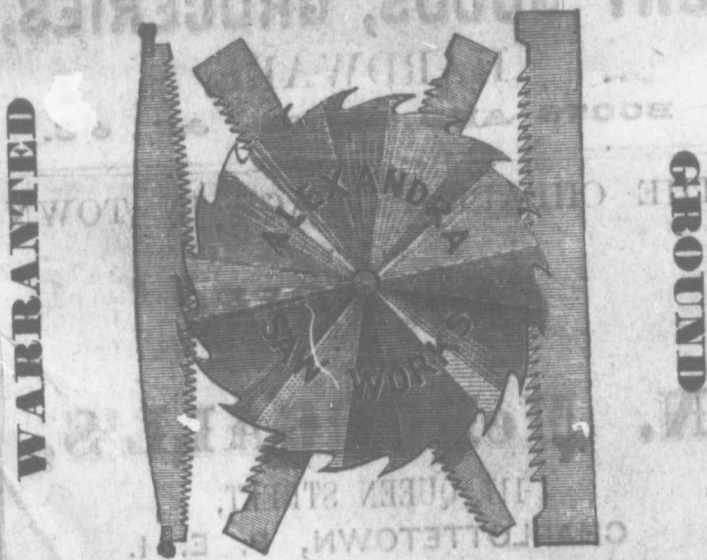
