The Child as a Worshiper

Children instinctively respect skill, as, for instance, what mother's trained fingers can do; they admire the exhibition of power, such as father's strength permits; they respond to the sublime, as seen in a beautiful sunset, or the play of the lightning across the sky. All these feelings are elements in worship. What more natural, then, than that the child should become a devout worshiper of his Creator?

But it rests largely with parents, whether these instincts, founded on awe of that which is greater than self, be developed into reverence, by bringing into the child's life the consciousness of the divine, as revealed in Jesus, or whether they be allowed to degenerate into superstition or that which tends to separate the soul from God. It is easy to people a child's world, at a very early age, with tales of Santa Claus and fairies; and, presented in

the right way, these may be beneficial. The child will as readily respond to the Old Testament stories, and to those about Jesus in the Gospels,—revelations of God Himself which can never be outgrown.

The little questioners afford us endless opportunities to lead their souls Godward; and how quickly they respond to teaching. A child is nothing, if not literal. What mother but can recall proofs of this from the prayers said at her knee, which would oftentimes be ludicrous, were they not so genuine in spirit? Here the child reveals his conception of God, his assimilation of truth and the measure of his communion with God. We may not expect, however, to take, to a degree, a child's spiritual temperature. Even at an early age, some children cannot give utterance to their deepest feelings before another. One little lad of seven, when asked at the close of his prayer, if he did not wish to ask God's forgiveness for a certain offence, said, "I did ask Him, mama, but not out loud".

After noting the effect of music, quieting and uplifting, upon children, their involuntary spiritual response to the sentiment of a hymn, in singing, one can but agree with Patterson Du Bois, who says, "As a direct appeal to the feelings, music has an educative power in worship, entirely apart from words".

Thus, briefly, we have sought to show that a child has within him, that which responds to God; that, when he knows their Source, his heart goes out, naturally, in adoration and worship to the Creator of all things. Acquaint the children with God, that He may reveal Himself to them. Never doubt that these little ones have fellowship with God, because you do not see in them your mature experience. Wait, watch, and nurture these feeble beginnings, laying to heart these words of Emerson's, "In my dealings with my child, as much soul as I have, avails".

One day a little Chinese girl, named Cheu Shin, was carried in a large basket to our mission hospital at Hwai King. She suffered a great deal of pain, and had not walked for over eight years. So long had she lain in bed with her limbs drawn up, that the joints of her knees and hips had grown solid, and she could not even sit up on the brick bed without support. Her mother was very cruel to her at times, because being a cripple, no one wanted her, and she could not sell her at any price.

The mission doctor tried, by cutting the tendons, to straighten out her poor crooked limbs, but was not able to help her very much. Her mother was very angry when she found her daughter would never be able to walk again, and said, "I'll straighten you out myself, you useless, crooked thing", and she would pull her about and try by brute force, to straighten out those poor, aching, stiffened limbs; and many a sleepless night did Cheu Shin pass because of her mother's cruelty.

She was a bright girl and able to work with her hands, and while in the hospital, supported herself by sewing. Though she had never been taught at home, being only a girl, in the hospital she soon learned to read, and after some weeks, she had read the whole of the Catechism, and a good part of St. John's Gospel, and could sing several hymns.

She became a bright Christian, and was always happy when she had a chance to tell the other girls and women in the hospital about her Saviour.

When the New Year season came, she went

home for some weeks and took with her enough sewing to keep her busy all the time. But when she returned to the hospital, we found her work had scarcely been touched. We soon found out the reason why. When she went home, her girl friends came to see her and asked her about the foreign hospital. She told them about the hospital and the patients, and told them, too, about the gospel, and how she had learned to read. They begged of her to teach them, and so her sewing was laid aside. And then the women came to hear and to be taught also, and the men came, as well, to listen to the new story of their Saviour. So all day long, and often long into the night, did little Cheu Shin work with her pupils.

Not long afterwards, a missionary on his tour came to the village, not knowing that Cheu Shin lived there, and was very much surprised to have the whole village turn out to welcome him. They set apart a large room for a preaching hall while he was there, and many men came, both by day and by night, to hear more of that wonderful story. And all this was the result of the work done by one poor little crippled girl, whose heart the love of Jesus had touched and who could not keep from telling the good news to others.

AN ORDER OF SERVICE

FOR PRIMARY CLASSES OR THE HOME LESSON

First Quarter, 1909

I. Singing. Hymn 256, Book of Praise, vs. 1, 2.

II. PRAYER. Children repeating the words, sentence by sentence, after the teacher.

III. Singing. Hymn 580, Book of Praise, vs. 1-3. (These are the first three verses of the Supplemental Hymn for the Half Year. The verses should be learned one by one. As the little ones sing them Sunday after Sunday, they will soon come to know them by heart.)

Jesus, from Thy throne on high, fra above the bright blue sky, Look on us with loving eye:

Hear us, holy Jesus.

Little hearts may love Thee well, Little lips Thy love may tell, Little hymns Thy praises swell:

Hear us, holy Jesus.

Little deeds of love may shine, Little lives may be divine, Little ones be wholly Thine: Hear us, holy Jesus.

IV. REPEAT IN CONCERT Ps. 34: 13, 14.

Keep thy tongue from evil, and thy lips from speaking guile. Depart from evil, and do good; seek peace, and pursue it.

V. Offering. To be taken by two or more of the children; the collectors to stand before the teacher, while she asks ϵ blessing on the offering. Then all sing with bowed heads:

God of heaven, hear our singing,

Only little ones are we; Yet, we come our off'ring bringing

Jesus, it is all for Thee. (Tune 565, Book of Praise.)

VI. Supplemental Lesson. Learn and repeat Scripture Memory Passage. For those under six, The Good Shepherd, Psalm 23. For those under eleven, The Ten Commandments, Ex. 20: 1-17. (A pretty Certificate in colors is awarded for the correct recitation of all the verses in the List of Passages For Those under Six; and a larger Certificate for the correct recitation of the complete List of Passages For Those under Eleven.)

VII. SINGING. Hymn selected by the little ones.

VIII. THE QUESTION ON MISSIONS FOR THE DAY. (See each Lesson.) The very little ones will not be expected to learn this by heart, but it may be repeated several times over, and any needed explanation given.

IX. Singing. Hymn 561, Book of Praise.

X. LESSON FOR THE DAY.

XI. SINGING. Lesson Hymn. (See each Lesson.)

XII. Closing. Prayer by the teacher. At the end, children sing, with bowed heads, Hymn 575, Book of Praise.

XIII. DISMISSION. After distribution of papers, cards, etc., children march out singing Hymn 262, Book of Praise.

Lesson I.

THE ASCENSION OF OUR LORD

January 3, 1909

Acts 1: 1-11. Study Acts 1: 1-14-*Memory Verses, 8, 9.

Golden Text—It came to pass, while he blessed them, he was parted from them, and carried up into heaven.—Luke 24:51.



1. The former treatise have I made, O Theoph'ilus, of all that Je'sus began both to do and teach,

2 Until the day in which he was taken up, after that he through the Holy Ghost had given commandments unto the apostles whom he had chosen:

3 To whom also he shewed himself alive after his passion by many infallible proofs, being seen of them forty days, and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God:

4 And, being assembled together with them, commanded them that they should not depart from Jeru'salem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which, saith he, ye have heard of me.

5 For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence.

6 When they therefore were come together, they asked of him, saying, Lord, wilt thou at this time restore again the kingdom to Is'rael?

7 And he said unto them, It is not for you to know the times or the seasons, which

the Father hath put in his own power.

8 But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you : and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jeru'salem, and in all Judæ'a, and in Samar'ia, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.

9 And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a

cloud received him out of their sight.

10 And while they looked stedfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel;

11 Which also said, Ye men of Gal'ilee; why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Je'sus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Luke, one of Jesus' disciples, who was a doctor, had written to a friend named Theophilus the story of Jesus' life on earth. After a time, Luke wrote again to this friend, telling him of the still more wonderful things that happened after Jesus had died on the cross and risen again from the dead,-how Jesus had many times showed Himself alive again to His disciples and friends, and had eaten and talked with them.

Jesus remained on earth for forty days after He rose from the dead. At the end of that time, He met with His disciples in Jerusalem, and commanded them to wait in that city until the Holy Spirit, whom His heavenly Father had promised to send to guide them, should come. "For", said Jesus, "as John the Baptist baptized with water the people who came to him, you shall soon be baptized with the Holy Spirit."

The last time Jesus and His disciples were gathered together was on the Mount of Olives; and they asked Him if He were now going to set His people Israel free from the Romans, and make them a great and powerful nation.

Jesus did not tell them whether this would happen or not; but He said to them, "You will receive power to do wonderful things yourselves, after the Holy Spirit is sent upon you. And you shall go and tell people every-

where, in the farthest corner of the earth, as well as here in Jerusalem and the country round about, all that I have taught you."

As Jesus finished speaking, the disciples suddenly saw Him moving slowly away from them—up, up towards heaven, till a cloud hid Him from their eyes. And as they looked wonderingly upward whither Jesus had gone, two angels in shining white garments stood beside them, and said, "Why do you stand so sorrowfully gazing up into heaven? Jesus shall come again to earth some day, and in the same way He went up".

So the disciples, a little comforted by the angels' words, went back from the Mount of Olives to Jerusalem, and there they assembled together in an upper room, where they spent much of the time in prayer to God, asking His help and guidance for the work which Jesus had said they were to do

Acts 2:1-11. Study Acts 2:1-21—Memory Verses, 2-4.

Golden Text—I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you forever; even the Spirit of truth.—John 14:16, 17.



1 And when the day of Pen'tecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place.

2 And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting.

3 And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them.

and strangers of Rome, Jews and proselytes,

11 Cretes and Ara'bians, we do hear them speak in our tongues the wonderful works of God.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Whilst the disciples were waiting in Jerusalem for the Holy Spirit to come, Peter stood up and said that they ought to choose one of their number, to take the place, amongst the twelve apostles, of Judas, who had betrayed Jesus. So they named two men called Joseph and Matthias. After they had prayed to the Lord, they chose Matthias, "and he was numbered with the eleven apostles".

Soon the time of Pentecost, one of the great Jewish feasts, came, and the disciples were all gathered together in one house. Suddenly they heard a strange sound, like the rushing of a great wind, which filled the house in which they were sitting. There also appeared in the room what seemed to be flames of fire in the shape of tongues, and one of these flames rested on the head of each of the disciples. Then they were all filled with the Holy Spirit, as Jesus had promised, and they began to speak in many foreign

languages, which they had never understood before.

Now, there were in Jerusalem, at that time, Jews who had come from the countries where those languages were spoken. These heard the sound like the wind, and crowded into and around the house where the disciples were, to see what had happened. When they heard the disciples, they were astonished, and asked, "Do not these men come from Galilee? How, then, are they able to speak the languages of those countries in which we were born, and which they have never seen?"
But some who heard the words of the disciples, mocked them, and said that they had been taking too much wine, so that they were drunken.

But Peter stood up and spoke to the crowds. He said that the disciples were not drunken, but God had sent upon them the Holy Spirit. He went on to tell how, long ago, God, through one of His prophets, had

THE LESSON RETOLD

Peter went on speaking to the crowds of people; and he told them how Jesus had worked wonderful miracles among them, which showed that God had really sent Him, and how they, who were His own people, instead of welcoming Him, had cruelly put Him to death.

"But He is not dead now!" Peter went on to say, with a glad voice, "for we, His apostles, have seen Him since He rose from the dead, as the scriptures promised He would rise. And He has now gone up to reign in glory with God in heaven; and, because He has left us, He has sent us this Holy Spirit, whose power you have just seen, to be with us as a Guide and Helper. So now, you and all the children of Israel may surely know that this same Jesus whom you crucified, is the Saviour of the world, for whom you and your fathers

have been looking so long and so earnestly."

When the people heard these words, they were filled with sorrow for what they had done to Jesus, and said to Peter and the other disciples, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?"

Peter answered them, "Repent of your sins, and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ, that you may be forgiven; then the Holy Spirit shall be given to you also, for God has promised to send Him to you and to your children, and to all whom the Lord our God shall call."

Great numbers who heard Peter speak, gladly believed on the Lord Jesus, and about three thousand persons were baptized that same day. These all came and met together with the apostles and other followers of Jesus; and they learned of them

the teachings of Jesus, and how they should live, if they wished to serve and please Him. And they all lived with each other as brothers, those who were rich dividing their wealth with those who were poor.

These followers of Christ went daily to the temple to worship and to pray there, and met also in one another's houses, to eat together and to talk with joy of all that had happened. And every day, some others, who had repented of their sins and believed on Jesus, came and were baptized by the apostles.

1 Now Pe'ter and John went up together into the temple at the hour of prayer, being the ninth hour.

ness we had made this man to walk?

13 The God of A'braham, and of I'saac, and of Ja'cob, the God of our fathers, hath glorified his Son, Je'sus; whom ye delivered up, and denied him in the presence of Pi'late, when he was determined to let him go.

14 But ye denied the Holy One and the Just, and desired a murderer to be granted unto you; 15 And killed the Prince of life, whom God hath raised from the dead; whereof

we are witnesses.

16 And his name through faith in his name hath made this man strong, whom ye see and know: yea, the faith which is by him hath given him this perfect soundness in the presence of you all.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One afternoon, it happened that Peter and John were going up together to the temple, at the hour of prayer. Now, a poor man, who had been lame ever since he was born, was carried every day by his friends and laid at the gate called the Beautiful Gate of the temple, that he might ask alms or gifts of those who came up to worship.

This man, seeing Peter and John about to go into the temple, asked them for alms. Peter, fixing his eyes upon him, said, "Look on us". The man obeyed, thinking that Peter was about to give something to him. But Peter went on, "I have no silver nor gold; but what I have, I will give you. I bid you, in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, to rise up and walk."

And Peter took the lame man by the right hand, and lifted him up; and immediately his feet and ankle bones were made strong, and the man, who had never taken a step before, was able to walk as well as other men. Leaping and dancing for joy, he followed Peter and John into the temple, praising God for what had been done to him.

The people who saw him, and who knew

how he had always sat helpless at the temple gate, were filled with wonder, and ran quickly after the men who had done this strange thing.

And Peter turned to them and said, "Why do you look so curiously at us, as if we ourselves had made this man to walk? It was Jesus who gave us the power to make him well—that same Jesus whom God sent from heaven, to be the Saviour of the world; but you would not believe in Him, and at last killed God's own Son. He is now risen from the dead, and is with His Father in heaven, and has left us here on earth to tell people of Him and lead them to believe in Him. It is because the lame man trusted in the power of His name, that he has been cured."

Acts 4: 5-20. Study Acts 4: 1-31-Memory Verses, 11, 12.

Golden Text—And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and they spake the word of God with boldness.—Acts 4:31.



5 And it came to pass on the morrow, that their rulers, and elders, and scribes,

13 Now when they saw the boldness of Pe'ter and John, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marvelled; and they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Je'sus.

14 And beholding the man which was healed standing with them, they could say

nothing against it.

15 But when they had commanded them to go aside out of the council, they conferred among themselves, 16 Saying, What shall we do to these men? for that indeed a notable miracle hath been done by them is manifest to all them that dwell in Jeru'salem; and we cannot deny it. 17 But that it spread no further among the people, let us straitly threaten them, that they speak henceforth to no man in this name. 18 And they called them, and commanded them not to speak at all nor teach in the name of Je'sus. 19 But Pe'ter and John answered and said unto them, Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye. 20 For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Amongst the rulers of the Jews there were many Sadducees. These were people who did not believe that the dead could rise, and were very angry with Peter and John for saying that Jesus had risen. So they joined with the priests and had the two apostles shut up in prison. The next day, all the rulers met together in their great council, to try Peter and John, asking them by what power they had healed the lame man.

And Peter answered, "Ye rulers of the people and elders of Israel, if you ask us about the good deed done to the lame man, and how he has been healed, we tell you it is by the power of Jesus of Nazareth, whom you crucified. For though you counted Jesus as

nothing while He was here on earth amongst you, yet God has made Him to be Ruler over us al. Neither is there any other person in all the world who can save us from our sins." When the rulers saw that Peter and John were poor and unlearned men, and yet were bold and without fear in speaking before them, they were astonished. But seeing the man who had been healed standing near, they could not deny what the apostles had done.

So they sent Peter and John out of the council, and talked about the matter amongst themselves. They said, "What shall we do to these men? We cannot deny that they have done this miracle, for all the people of

Jerusalem must already know of it; but we may keep the news from spreading any further, by telling them we will punish them if they preach any more to the people."

So Peter and John were called in again, and commanded not to speak nor teach anything more about Jesus. But they answered fearlessly, "Whether it would be right for us to obey you more than God, you yourselves must judge. As for us, we cannot help teaching the people about Jesus and the wonderful things we have heard Him speak and seen Him do." Then, although the rulers threatened again to punish them, they had to let them go, for they could not prove they had done anything wrong.

When Peter and John told their friends what the rulers had said, they all prayed together, that God would keep them from being afraid to preach the gospel. And the house in which they were gathered, was shaken, and they were so filled with the Holy Spirit, that they spoke with boldness the messages which God gave them.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Peter and John and the other disciples of Jesus preached His name so diligently, that soon the followers of Jesus became a great multitude. They were all very helpful and loving one to another. 23 Saying, The prison truly found we shut with all safety, and the keepers standing without before the doors: but when he had opened, we found no man within.

24 Now when the high priest and the captain of the temple and the chief priests heard these things, they doubted of them

whereunto this would grow.

25 Then came one and told them, saying, Behold, the men whom ye put in prison are

standing in the temple, and teaching the people.

26 Then went the captain with the officers, and brought them without violence: for they feared the people, lest they should have been stoned. 27 And when they had brought them, they set them before the council: and the high priest asked them, 28 Saying, Did not we straitly command you that ye should not teach in this name? and, behold, ye have filled Jeru'salem with your doctrine, and intend to bring this man's blood upon us. 29 Then Pe'ter and the other apostles answered and said, We ought to obey God rather than men. 30 The God of our fathers raised up Je'sus, whom ye slew and hanged on a tree. 31 Him hath God exalted with his right hand to be a Prince and a Saviour, for to give repentance to Is'rael, and forgiveness of sins. 32 And we are his witnesses of these things; and so is also the Holy Ghost, whom God hath given to them that obey him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

God had given to Peter and the other apostles such wonderful power in working miracles, that great multitudes of sick people came from all over the country round about, to be healed.

The high priest and the Sadducees were very angry, when they heard this, and they put the apostles in prison. But in the night, the angel of the Lord came down from heaven and opened the prison doors and brought them out, and said, "Go up now to the temple, and preach the gospel to the people". And the apostles did as the angel commanded, going up early to the temple

and preaching there.

But the high priest and the Sadducees, not knowing that the angel had set the prisoners free, called the rulers together, and sent to the prison to have the apostles brought. But when the officers went to the prison, they could not find them; so they came back to the rulers, saying, "We found the prison still tight shut, and the guards keeping watch before the doors, but the men for whom you sent us were not there".

The rulers wondered what this strange news could mean. But while they wondered, there came a messenger, who said, "The men whom you put in prison are standing preaching in the temple". Then the officers went and brought the apostles before the rulers, yet without doing them any hurt, lest they should anger the people. And the high priest asked the apostles, "Did we not command you to speak no more about Jesus? And yet you still go on teaching His doctrine, till the whole city has heard it!"

Then Peter and the other apostles answered, "We ought to obey God rather than men. That same Jesus whom ye slew on the cross, God has raised up again as a Saviour, to give His people new and penitent hearts and forgiveness of their sins; and we, His apostles, are sent to tell you these things, which we have learned of Him." So the rulers, seeing how determined the apostles were, and fearing the people, allowed them to go, after cruelly beating them.

For one of their number, a learned man, who was much thought of, had said, "If what these men teach be not true, it will soon come to nothing; but if God has really sent them to preach to the people, you cannot stop them, and if you try to do so, you will be fighting against God".

And the apostles went out from before the rulers, glad that they had been permitted to suffer for the sake of Jesus. And every day they kept on preaching the gospel, both in the temple and in every house into which they went.

2 And devout men carried Ste'phen to his burial, and made great lamentation over him.

3 As for Saul, he made hovock of the church, entering into every house, and haling men and women committed them to prison.

THE LESSON RETOLD

As the apostles went on preaching and teaching and the number of disciples was greatly increased, they set apart seven deacons, to help them in taking care of the poor. One of these deacons, named Stephen, seemed to have special power given him from God, for he not only preached to the people, but did great miracles among them. This made some of the Jews very angry and jealous, and they stirred up the people against Stephen by telling them falsely that he had spoken evil words against Moses, their great leader, and against God. At last Stephen was made prisoner and was brought before the rulers. There, false witnesses said that they had heard him speaking against the temple, and against God's law, which He had given them by Moses.

Now Stephen was not afraid, when he

heard himself accused of doing these wicked things. He felt that God was with him to take care of him; and this made him feel so happy, that his face shone like the face of an angel. And he began to speak fearlessly to the rulers, saying, that, so far from speaking against the law of God, he knew and loved it, even as they did; and he told them plainly that they had killed those who were sent to tell them that Jesus was coming, and, at last, they had killed the Saviour Himself.

When the rulers heard these words, they were filled with rage against Stephen, and gnashed on him with their teeth like wild beasts. But he, looking up towards heaven, saw a glorious light there, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God. And he cried, "I see the heavens opened, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God". Then the rulers cried out with loud voices against him, and stopped their ears, so that they should not hear what they thought were his wicked words. And they brought him out of the city, and stoned him with great stones. While they were treating him thus cruelly, he kneeled down on the ground, and prayed, "Lord, forgive them this sin". And having said this, he died as peacefully as if he had been falling asleep.

Now, among the Jews, when a man was stoned, the persons who had borne witness against him, always cast the first stones. And so the false witnesses who had spoken against Stephen cast the first stones at him. For this purpose, they took off their outer garments, and laid them at the feet of a young man named Saul, that he might keep them safely. This Saul was likely one of the rulers who had agreed to put Stephen to death.

After this, there was a great persecution against the disciples. But good men took Stephen's dead body and mourned over it, and buried it. As for Saul, he did much harm, for he went into every house, to find those who believed on Jesus, and when he had found them, he took them, whether men or women, and dragged them away to prison.

Acts 8: 14-25. Study Acts 8: 4-25-Memory Verses, 14, 15.

Golden Text—The people with one accord gave heed unto those things which Philip spake, hearing and seeing the miracles which he did .- Acts 8:6.



14 Now when the apostles which were at Jeru's alem heard that Samar'ia had received the word of God, they sent unto them Pe'ter

and John:
15 Who, when they were come down, prayed for them, that they might receive the Holy Ghost:

*16 (For as yet he was fallen upon none of them: only they were baptized in the name of the Lord Je'sus.)

17 Then laid they their hands on them, and they received the Holy Ghost.

18 And when Si'mon saw that through laying on of the apostles' hands the Holy Ghost was given, he offered them money

19 Saying, Give me also this power, that on whomsoever I lay hands, he may receive the Holy Ghost.

20 But Pe'ter said unto him, Thy money perish with thee, because thou hast thought that the gift of God may be purchased with money

21 Thou hast neither part nor lot in this matter: for thy heart is not right in the sight of God.

22 Repent therefore of this thy wicked-

ness, and pray God, if perhaps the thought of thine heart may be forgiven thee.

23 For I perceive that thou art in the gall of bitterness, and in the bond of iniquity.

24 Then answered Si'mon, and said, Pray ye to the Lord for me, that none of these

things which ye have spoken come upon me.

25 And they, when they had testified and preached the word of the Lord, returned to Jeru'salem, and preached the gospel in many villages of the Samar'itans.

THE LESSON RETOLD

On account of the cruel persecutions, many of the disciples fled from Jerusalem. Wherever they went, they told the people of Jesus. Philip, who, like Stephen, was one of the seven deacons, went down to the city of Samaria, and preached to the people there. The miracles which he did, so filled the people of the city with wonder, that they listened to all that he said. For unclean spirits, when he commanded them, came out of those whom they had been tormenting, and the helpless and lame were made well. And there was great joy in the city, and many believed and were baptized.

When the apostles in Jerusalem heard this, they sent Peter and John to help Philip in his work, who, when they came to Samaria, prayed that the Holy Spirit might be given to all those who had believed. Then they laid their hands on their heads, and God sent His Holy Spirit into them.

Now there was at Samaria a man named Simon, who, before that time, had deceived the people by pretending that he could do things for them by magic, until they all listened to his words, and said, "This man must have power given him of God". But when Philip began to preach the gospel in Samaria and many believed and were baptized, Simon also came, and said that he, too, believed, and asked to be baptized. So Philip baptized him, and he continued with Philip, wondering at the miracles which he did.

But when Peter and John came from Jerusalem, and Simon saw that, by the laying on of their hands, the Holy Spirit was given to those who believed, he went to them and offered to pay them money, if they would give him also, the power to bring down God's Holy Spirit from heaven upon any person upon whom he might lay his hands.

But Peter told him that he had done very wickedly in thinking that what God gave to those who loved Him, could be bought for money, and he said to Simon, "Repent of thy wickedness and ask God to forgive thee, for I see that thou art yet a wicked man and a servant of sin".

Then Simon was afraid, and begged, "Pray to the Lord, that His anger may not fall upon me!" And when the apostles had still further preached the gospel in Samaria, they went back to Jerusalem, preaching in many of the villages on the way. And so the good news about Jesus spread far and wide.

Acts 8: 26-38. Study Acts 8: 26-40-Memory Verses, 29-31.

38 And he commanded the chariot to stand still: and they went down both into the water, both Phil'ip and the eunuch; and he baptized him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

While Philip was preaching in Samaria, one day an angel of the Lord spoke to him, and told him to leave Samaria, and go through the wilderness towards the city of Gaza. And Philip started on his journey at once.

On the way, he came upon a man riding in a chariot,—a man from the land of Ethiopia, an officer of high rank, belonging to the court of the queen of that country, who took care of all her treasure. He had been to Jerusalem to worship at the temple, and was earnestly reading the scriptures on his way home. The part which he was reading, was the wonderful fifty-third chapter of Isaiah, which pictures so clearly the sufferings of the Saviour.

When Philip saw this stranger turn, the Holy Spirit said to him, "Go near to the chariot, and speak to this man". So Philip ran immediately, and drawing near the chariot, he heard the man reading aloud the words which the prophet Isaiah had written; and Philip spoke to him, saying, "Do you understand what you are reading?"

The man answered, "How can I understand it, until some one explains it to me". Then he invited Philip to come into the chariot beside him, and asked him, "Do you understand what the prophet meant when he wrote these words? Did he write them about himself, or about some other man?" And he read, once again, the words of Isaiah, in which the prophet tells his people of a

Saviour who was to come into the world and die for their sins,—a man, meek and lowly, as Jesus had been; and who would, instead of being welcomed, be cruelly put to death.

Philip explained these words to the eunuch, and told him all about Jesus, and how He had been sent by God into the world, to take away the sins of all people. And as they rode along together they came to a place where there was water, and the officer said, "See, here is water-what is to prevent me from being baptized?" And Philip answered, " If thou believest with all thy heart, thou mayest". "I do believe!" said the officer. "I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." So the chariot was stopped, and the two men went down into the water, and Philip baptized him, as a sign that he believed on Jesus as His Saviour. And when they came up again, the Holy Spirit took Philip away, and the officer saw him no more; but he went back to his own land full of joy, because he had heard about Jesus and had become one of His disciples.

THE LESSON RETOLD

At last the churches throughout Judea and Galilee had rest from persecution. The fierce Saul had become a follower of Jesus. The wonderful story will be told at the beginning of next Quarter. The Holy Spirit guided the disciples and made them strong. Many more people joined them.

As Peter went through the land, visiting the churches, he came to the village of Lydda. There he heard of a man named Æneas, who had been ill of palsy for eight long years. Peter went in to see him, and said, "Æneas, Jesus Christ maketh thee well. Rise up, and make thy bed". And immediately Æneas, perfectly cured, got up from the bed where he had lain for so many years. And when the

people who lived in Lydda and round about saw that Æneas was made well, they believed on Jesus.

Now at Joppa, a city not far from Lydda, there lived a follower of Jesus named Dorcas. This woman was full of kindness, and was always making things for the poor, or doing them good in some other way. Now, while Peter was at Lydda, Dorcas fell ill and died; and they laid her in an upper chamber; and the disciples sent two men asking Peter to come to them quickly in their trouble.

So Peter hurried back with the messengers, and they took him into the room where Dorcas lay. And the poor widows whom she had helped were standing about, mourning, and showing the clothes she had made them.

But Peter put every one out of the room, and kneeled down and prayed. Then, turning to the dead body, he said, "Dorcas, arise!" And she wakened, like one who had been asleep, and when she saw Peter, she sat up. And Peter reached out his hand and helped her to rise, and calling to those in the house, he presented Dorcas to them alive. And they were all filled with joy, and many more people believed in Christ, because Dorcas had thus been raised from the dead.

Peter remained for a long time in the city of Joppa, lodging in the house of Simon, a tanner.



THE LESSON RETOLD

Many, many, years before Christ came into the world, there lived a wise man, who, besides being the very wisest man that ever lived, was a king of Israel-King Solomon. Many of the wise things which he said were so helpful to old and young, and so instructive and full of warning against evil, that they were collected into a book, called, The Book of Proverbs, which now forms a part of the Old Testament.

There was one particular evil that King Solomon hated very much; so that, in this book of his, he mentions it often, and always with a warning to everybody to keep far, far away from it. This was the sin of drunkenness, a sin which the people in the world today need to be warned against, as much as those who lived in the time of King Solomon.

Solomon, in one place, draws a very sad picture of a drunkard returning home, after spending a night feasting and drinking with

evil companions. It had seemed pleasant enough while it lasted, but soon the poison in the wine had taken away the man's senses; and his heartless companions had knocked and kicked him about at their will, because he was too helpless to protect himself, until he was covered with wounds and bruises, which, with his red and swollen eyes, made the man a sad spectacle of what that dreadful evil, drink, does. And yet, even after that, this man would not be warned against his evil ways. He had become such a slave to this bad habit, that he could not give it up, and went on caring for it more and more.

"And so", said Solomon, "this beautiful wine that looks so rich and red and sparkling in the glass, at last biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder." These were two of the most dreaded reptiles of that Eastern country. They often darted out from hidden and unexpected places, and attacked people who had not thought of danger, and the bite of each was poisonous and deadly. So it was with wine. Before a man was aware of it, this wine, which seemed so harmless, would bring him to certain ruin and destruction.

And drunkenness brings other sins with it. It takes away a man's love of what is good and right, and his love of truth, until nobody will believe or trust him. He cannot even respect himself, for he may often do foolish and senseless things, which make him feel thoroughly ashamed, when he becomes sober again.

To allow oneself to come to such a state was, Solomon said, just as senseless and dangerous as to try to lie down on the crest of a wave or on top of a high ship's mast, for, in the end, it would bring death not only to the body, but to the mind and soul, as well.

Surely it will be a wise thing for us to obey the counsel of King Solomon, when he says, "Look not thou upon the wine". For, although it is beautiful and bright as it sparkles in the glass, it is sure to bring sorrow and woe upon all who use it.


