Italy's Position

CCORDING to to-day's news, there is little doubt in the Austrian mind as to the direction of Italy's inclinations in the present war. In fact the scenes the other day in the Italian Parliament gave concrete evidence of the correctness of the idea so long general that if ever Italy took part in the great conflict would be on the side of Britain and her allies.

More notable even that Premier Salandra's formal pronouncement were the cheers that evidenced the national aspirations after territory that once was Italy's, but is now subject to Austria, and of deep significance also was the general applause, the cordon of troops thrown around evoked by the mention of Belgium, her sufferings and her heroism. Small wonder then that Austria, reading aright the signs of the times. should have taken immediate steps to strengthen her border forces against Italy and should have put all things in order to meet a prospective and probable attack by her erstwhile ally.

Most remarkable is the situation that has developed, in regard to Italy's relations to the one-time Triple Alliance since war began. 




