**Journal from the Seminary.**

As the first term of the school year is drawing to a close, it can be gratifying to those interested in the progress of the Seminary to note the results thus far obtained. Not only the excellent rank of the work done by the pupils, and the ever increasing spirit of industry that pervades the school, but the eager desire on the part of the pupils to be intelligent in regard to the problems of the day, are hopeful indications that in the near future the standard of seminary work may be greatly advanced.

A widely known educator, of more than thirty years experience said recently, that he considered his work a success, if the pupils whom he graduated left school with a desire for more knowledge and knew how to acquire it. The independence of thought and effort of a large proportion of the students in the Seminary is such as many a school might envy.

Besides the ordinary resources, such as magazines, newspapers and reference books with which the school is well supplied, it has been particularly fortunate in securing lectures bearing upon some of the more advanced studies. The last lecture was given by Prof. Taft, Dec. 8. The lecture entitled the "Submerged Tenth," which is a repository of facts concerning capital and labor, was listened to with closest attention and gratefully appreciated, for this is the kind of talk the pupils want to hear.

Work away girls, tenacity of purpose and sentences of intellect are yours by inheritance; massiveness of brain will come by development.

The Seminary course now provided for as much mathematics as is required for a grade B license. The work in Algebra and Arithmetic, which was originally intended to extend over two years, will be completed by the entering class of this year in half that time. Like good results are being obtained in other subjects. Through the kindness of the managers of some local enterprises, differential principles of Physics have been studied in their applications. As far as our opportunities have afforded, we have abandoned the method of studying science from books; none, say that of experience.

With the microscope and the zoological collection of three hundred specimens that the institution has provided for itself, more efficient work than could otherwise be done may be looked for next term. There is now good reason to believe that a set of physical and chemical apparatus will be in possession of the school next year, so that experimental work may be done in Physics and Chemistry equivalent to what is expected of the best high schools. Students have already come to us demanding more work, and others have been heard from who would have come this year, had they been assured of the real condition of the school, its prospects, and its possibilities.

These facts should stimulate confidence in the school. Those who are most closely connected with its detailed workings need the encouragement and hearty cooperation of all who are or have been in any way associated with it. The day of the proverbial girls' boarding-school is past.

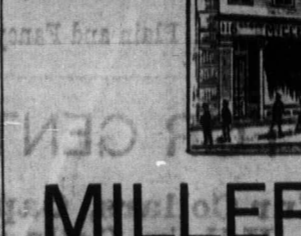
