A GIGANTIC "STRIKE."

What is known as the "coal miners' strike" inaugurated in England on the 12th inst., both in its dimensions and in its scope, may be regarded as the most extraordinary occurrence.

The strike seems to have been brought about in this way. Towards the close of the month of February the members of the Miners' Federation, numbering about three hundred thousand, became alarmed by a proposition introduced under consideration by the Durham and Northumberland National Union of Miners, for a reduction of wages in view of the declining tendency in profits.

The miners' reply was to insist that they would not be prepared to accept any reduction of wages, and that in the event of such a proposition being made, they would be obliged to walk out of their work.

The miners made no objection to the proposition and hence the stoppage of work. In these circumstances the strikers were likely to meet the coalowners, gas companies, railways and manufacturers.

BEHRING SEA QUESTION.

LONDON, March 19.—The question of renewal of the moratorium in the Behring Sea matter has reached an advanced stage during the week. Sir Julian Pauncefote being charged to state the character of Lord Salisbury's reply to the United States note on Wednesday.

In Ministerial circles it is believed Lord Salisbury continues to contest that the renewal of the moratorium under existing circumstances is unreasonable. Liberals think Lord Salisbury wants to leave the Behring Sea question in a state that will embarrass the coming Hamilton Government.
