The united meetings of the week began last night, under very favorable auspices, and the service proved very helpful all through.

The Rev. F. R. Matthews was the leader, and he was assisted by Rev. Dr. Curtis and Rev. Mr. Whitemarsh. The address proper was delivered by Rev. Dr. Rogers. The good Doctor did not take any particular subject as the basis of his remarks, but told of some of his experiences in evangelistic work, during his fifty years of ministerial toil in the Lower Provinces, and principally in Nova Scotia.



Gasolene and Other Wreckage Picked Up.





came it was for the summer voyage Our ship sailed from Brittany and many others left with her; and about the same date several left the port of St. Malo. At that time the fleet from France wa very large. Some fished off the banks. A very great number went direct to St. Pierre, and others scattered to the different harbours upon the Treaty Coast. Our destination was St. Julien's and the Grois Islands. These are French names, and they have tended to familiarize the recruits who were leaving France for the first time with the places to which they were coming.

Our vessel was one hundred and forty tons or thereabout and was rigged a brigantine. She had a cargo of general fishing supplies and stores. and all that was necessary for such a vcyage. Her deck was very much fumbered with skiffs commonly called batteaux, and nets, and barrels, and puncheons and water casks. We had some forty or fifty men who comprised the crew for fishing from the shore at St. Julien's, and also several boys. In addition to the fishing crew there was the ship's crew proper, which consisted of some ten' hands all told. including a couple of boys to tend on the captain and crew generally. I was one of the crew of the ship, but did not know much about the work, but owing to coming with my brotherin-law I thought my inexperience would be overlooked, and that I would get common fair play. In this I was sudly mistaken. A boy on board a ship seventy years ago did not count for much. He seemed to be something for the crew to play upon. something to be kicked about and cuffed, and scolded and blasphemed. Their treatment of the boys was unfair in the extreme, and though Frenchmen did it, and though I am a Frenchman myself, it is with shame that I have to remember the conduct meted out to boys on board the fishing ships. It seemed to me that the boys never got a chance to wash themselves, that they seemed hardly ever to get a chance to feed themselves but that they were especially on board to be punished and ill-used. In the case of the fishing lads and apprentices proper, there seemed to be no rearess for such wrongs, but my case was a little different, and because of that I decided to protect myself, and to resent the wrong and to fight for my rights, and it. was in the effort of seeking protection and of defending myself that I was left behind in Newfoundland.
