Remarkable Escape from Starvation off Cape Horn

Extract of letter from DAVID LAMPS (Master), of the late barque "Colorado," Glasgow.

"Having lost our ship on Staten Island, on the 25th of July, and having several months' provisions, we were then compelled to travel the island for ten days, subsisting on nothing but shell-fish and seaweed. On the 19th of July we came across another shipwrecked party of seventeen, the surviving part of the crew of the British ship "Dunkeld," of Glasgow, fourteen having perished through exposure. Now, the ship was lost on the 22nd of January, and the crew, consisting of EPPS'S COCOA, was washed ashore out of the wreck. There was nothing saved except the Cocoa, and we, numbering twenty-five men, were left alive on it up to the 20th of August, when we were rescued by the steamer "Mercurio," of Buenos Aires.

"Two much remained of the cocoa in this Cocoa. We had a good stock of it there; we used it in a liquid state for drink, we also baked it on the fire, which kept us alive and warm for 6 weeks on this bare, bleak island, situated in a region of perpetual ice and snow."

\$15,000 Fur Coats.

Black and Silver Fox Fetch Amazing Prices.

London, January 30.—According to London furriers the most expensive furs now on the market are pelts of black and silver foxes from Prince Edward Island. These are so costly that they can only be obtained by private sale.

A single pelt of the black fox fetches from \$750 to \$1,750, and for a woman's coat at least four pelts are necessary. At a public sale at the beginning of the winter one pelt brought \$1,650.

Harrison Watson, the official agent for Prince Edward Island, states that he himself was skeptical when he heard of the fabulous prices commanded by fox pelts in the open market, but he was assured by the Minister of Agriculture that the figures were correct.

"Six pairs of breeding foxes," said Mr. Watson, "have been sold for \$20,000 (\$100,000) to a Russian syndicate," which intends to compete with the Canadians. The supply of furs for the next five years will be small because the foxes are to be kept for breeding purposes.

Inquiries among the furriers of the west end show that recent purchasers of fur coats, ranging from £1,000 (\$5,000) to £3,000 (\$15,000), included five members of Parliament, eight peers, eleven bankers and three actresses.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.
Severe fighting occurred in the attempt of Montenegrins to capture Scutari. Montenegrins it is reported have taken Bardianjill Hill, one of the strategical positions, but at a cost of 2,500 men killed and wounded. The same despatch place the Turkish loss at 4,000 men. Thousands of fresh troops have been arriving at Constantinople from Anatolia in the past few days. Several troop-ships have departed, but the destination has not been divulged. There are signs that the Porte realizes the hopelessness of the situation and is preparing the way to leave the fate of Turkey in the hands of Europe and obtain the best possible settlement.

SYDNEY, To-day.
A message from Capt. Taylor, of the s.s. Invermore, which arrived at North Sydney, is to the effect that while steaming across the Gulf, his ship sighted a schooner fast in the ice, with all sails set. Her position at that time was east by northeast. Considering the conditions, Capt. Taylor made a good run to North Sydney. He experienced a strong W.N.W. gale till about 35 miles from the Cape Breton coast, when a heavy loose field of drift ice was met. The Invermore worked through without accident. It is not likely that the North Sydney-Port aux Basques route will be resumed for some weeks. The Bruce and Invermore are going to St. John's direct.

MEXICO CITY, To-day.
General Felix Diaz, whose hold stroke on Sunday almost overthrew the Madero Administration, held his army in the leash yesterday, nor did the scattered Government forces dare to attack him in his fortified positions in and about the Arsenal, still hoping he might attain a complete control without further loss of life and destruction of property. General Diaz surprised the Capital by refraining from turning his heavy guns upon the National Palace. The Government's position has not been materially altered. That peace negotiations, official or otherwise, were in progress became known early, but owing to secrecy enveloping them few outside the principals knew the details; excellent order prevails throughout.

Enquiry Continued.

Yesterday the drowning enquiry was continued when Patrick Mallard, who was working at A. Harvey & Co's coal premises, was sworn and examined. He saw the 'John Green' steam down the harbor and take the boat in tow. When opposite Harvey's wharf he heard a cry from the boat "Hold on! Hold on!" This was repeated three times. The tug was then between 30 and 40 yards distant from the pier. It was getting dark and he watched the boat until she disappeared. Could not say whether she sunk or otherwise.

George Pearce, who witnessed the happening from the deck of the s.s. Eellaventure, at Harvey's wharf, swore that the tug was going too fast. He remarked that the boys looked wet. He heard a shout and when about to look the boat disappeared. He remarked the boat is gone, men and all.

Richard Bailey sworn and examined. He saw the John Green tow the boat. He heard shouts but could not hear distinctly. He did not see what happened the boat when she passed alongside the Bellaventure as it was getting dark.

Notes and Comments.

The most pathetic circumstance of the Scott expedition is that the party which made for the South Pole should have perished after their quest had been successful.

But they had accomplished their life work in the heroic effort they made and they died with full knowledge that the object they had set before them had been attained. This must have been of much consolation to them in their last moments.

They knew they had not died in vain and that the relief expedition would in all likelihood find their bodies and their records, and the world would learn of their great achievement.

From the scanty information to hand the world is left in doubt as to the number of the party which perished. It is stated in the message that it is believed that 66 (?) scientists and sailors lost their lives.

This is not credited by others, who believe that the party which perished was the small one that made the final dash for the South Pole. That party is supposed to have consisted of Capt. Scott, Dr. Wilson, Capt. Oates, Lieut. Bowers and Petty Officer Evans.

The latter belief is by far the more probable. It is hardly credible that all the members of the Antarctic Expedition should have perished. There would be in any case a party left at headquarters, and there would likely be others who would take stages of the journey to carry forward supplies, who would not be in the final stage of the dash for the South Pole.

The uncertainty arises from the only information available to the world was signalled from the S. S. Terra Nova to the port of Oamaru, New Zealand, which then passed on to Little-

ton where she is due on Saturday. From the report it would appear that Capt. Scott and his party arrived at the South Pole a month after Amundsen had been there, and the intelligence has been delayed from the fact that it was only late last year that the Terra Nova returned to the Antarctic to pick up the expedition, and then they learnt the disaster which she has given out to the world.

The Wish Father to the Thought.

This morning we drew Sir Robert Bond's attention to an article in this morning's Daily News headed "The Grange Reported Sold," and enquired if there was any truth in the report of the sale of his private residence. Sir Robert replied no. It is not sold, and has never been offered for sale in the English or any other papers. We were quite sure when we read the article that it was simply a canard. The wish was no doubt father to the thought, for the Daily News and its political associates are very anxious to have Sir Robert Bond out of the political arena next fall, and nothing would give them greater joy than to know for certain that the field was clear of their formidable opponent.

Gower St. United Services.

The united meetings of the week began last night, under very favorable auspices, and the service proved very helpful all through.

The Rev. F. R. Matthews was the leader, and he was assisted by Rev. Dr. Curtis and Rev. Mr. Whitmarsh. The address proper was delivered by Rev. Dr. Rogers. The good Doctor did not take any particular subject as the basis of his remarks, but told of some of his experiences in evangelistic work, during his fifty years of ministerial toil in the Lower Provinces, and principally in Nova Scotia.

The address, though short, was one not soon to be forgotten; and its principles were such as appeal to the common faith of all believers. Following the address the devotions and singing were continued until the usual hour of closing; and the meeting, as already stated, proved very encouraging.

Suspenders

Suspenders are a providential arrangement which permit men to go about in public with a feeling of perfect security. Whenever you attend a social function and observe a pained look come over the face of a male guest, you may be sure that he has either imbibed too much of the menu or parted with a suspender button.

Suspenders never came into general use until the invention of pants. They sprang into immediate popularity and have been worn off and on ever since. Men who used to be obliged to hold up their pants with a safety pin or a wire nail took up with the new idea at once, and came to the supper table in their shirt sleeves, wearing a proud, self-satisfied look and a new pair of striped suspenders.

Suspenders are made of cloth stretched over rubber bands, which become exhausted after being worn for a few weeks and allow a pair of shapely pants to droop languorously toward the sou-sou-west. This is what causes so many men to go about in pants which fit like a 30 x 40 tire on a go-cart.

Suspenders are fitted over buttons which have the habit of letting go in the middle of a round dance. Nobody ever heard of a suspender button coming off within four miles of a needle and thread. This kind of a button always falls on a hardwood floor and rolls around in a circle at the precise moment when the wearer is trying to appear wholly at ease.

Of late years fashion has prescribed a very neat substitute for suspenders, in the form of the leather belt, which causes lean men to look like an hour glass. It is a hazardous proceeding for a thin man to rely upon a belt, and any attempt to force this innovation upon attenuated citizens should be rebuked by act of congress. The belt is all right for stout parties who have one hip on each side, but it is a positive insult to people with a waist like a wasp. On this account, suspenders will be worn long after the leather belt has become a pensive memory.

Gasolene and Other Wreckage Picked Up.

The schr. referred to was lost en route from St. Pierre to Burnt Islands laden with gasolene and other supplies. The crew escaped in boats and landed at Burgeo.

The Scott Expedition.

LEADER AND MEMBERS WELL KNOWN TO CAPT. BOB BARTLETT, OF POLAR FAME—“TELEGRAM’S” INTERESTING INTERVIEW WITH CAPT. BARTLETT.

Capt. Bob Bartlett, the hero of the Peary Polar Expedition, was to-day interviewed by the Telegram on the matter of the tragedy connected with the South Polar Expedition of Captain Scott.

Last evening Capt. Bartlett had a wire from a friend in New York giving information of the success of the expedition in its object and of its disastrous termination for its brave leader and comrades. Capt. Bartlett is perhaps one of the best authorities on polar expeditions, having to-day, he was up north with Peary in the expeditions of 1887-8, 1905-6, and 1908-9, and was with Peary to within a few miles of the Pole when the famous explorer made the great discovery which has made his name famous in the world over. Capt. Bartlett was in England before the Scott Expedition sailed south and was repeatedly on board the Terra Nova in London. He was one of the guests at the dinner given on board the ship when Lady Markham hoisted

The Royal Standard

on the ship. The expedition was fitted out conjointly by the British Government and the London Geographical Society and at all the functions given in the explorer's honour Capt. Bartlett, our distinguished fellow countryman, was an honoured guest. On the occasion alluded to above, Sir Clement Markham was present and many notable in the public and social life of England. Capt. Bartlett was very well acquainted with Capt. Scott and his wife having repeatedly visited their home and dined with them and was well known to Lieut. Evans, Dr. Wilson, Capt. Oates, Lieut. Bowers and others of the expedition who now alas are numbered with the dead.

Captain Bartlett says that Lieut. Evans is not with the Scott expedition now and thus his life

at least is saved. Lieut. Evans was sent back home when the expedition was within 150 miles of the Pole, because Scott did not want to keep the Terra Nova waiting another season. He, therefore, sent Lieut. Evans back with instructions to bring the ship back to New Zealand. One of the members of the expedition, a naval captain, was on this station in one of His Majesty's warships for several years but Capt. Bartlett cannot recall his name. Had the methods used by Peary on his expeditions north been observed by the Scott expedition south the Capt. believes that the enterprise would have been expedited and the great catastrophe which overwhelmed the ill-fated party averted. Any reader of this interview who wishes to prove his statement, he says, has but to follow the itinerary of Capt. Amundsen, the great Norwegian explorer, and he will see that Capt. Bartlett is correct. Shackleton used

Methods at Variance

with Peary's and he got only to within 112 miles of the Pole and narrowly escaped losing the whole party. In Capt. Bartlett's estimation to convert men into beasts of burden or compel them to draw sledges is not at all suitable for Arctic or Antarctic exploration; neither are ponies suitable. With dogs driven by men well accustomed to the work the best possible results can be obtained. As regards the food it is also a simple matter because the dogs eat the same food as their masters and when the food is consumed and exigencies arise the men can live on the dogs, and this has been done in many expeditions. The Scott expedition which left England in June 1910 was differently equipped than the Peary expedition. They (the former) had motor sledges and ponies and only a few dogs and they did not bother using the dogs, being unaccustomed.

To Handling Them.

Capt. Bartlett thinks that Capt. Scott made a great mistake in using the ponies and thinks it was sheer perseverance, tenacity and British pluck which brought him through to the Pole instead of any extraordinary or intrinsic value of ponies for such travel. Conditions in the South Polar regions as compared with those in the North Polar Zone are altogether

different; up north they must contend with drift ice and open water and the relay system is impossible, whereas South there is a great ice cap and the itinerary of the route is stationary, so to speak, thereby minimizing the dangers of being cut off from

Supporting Parties.

The work of the South Polar expedition must necessarily be done in the summer, while up North it has to be done on the first approach of the twilight and also to get the best results from the heavy frosts. The Arctic is moving and making water leads and with the heavy frosts these can be crossed after a few hours. You can't go over this ice in the warm weather of April or May; it is only in February and March with part of April that such ice can be utilized. In March is the beginning of the perpetual light while in February one has enough to enable an expedition to travel from 8 to 10 miles per day. With the return of the sun in March it is practically perpetual light. In South Polar latitudes what is water north is a continent covered with ice, and as the Pole is neared a perpetual ice cap is traversed gradually becoming higher and higher as it nears the Pole until it reaches an elevation of between

11,000 and 12,000 Feet.

Whereas the South Polar expedition used sleeping bags and tents with material of a very light texture, but wind proof, the people of the North Polar expeditions used the Esquimaux snow igloos or houses but no sleeping bags and wore only fur clothing weighing about 12 lbs. in travelling. The Scott Expedition used what is known as "Barberry," a sort of canvas impervious to wind with Jaeger underwear. The Peary expedition travelled and dressed and for that matter lived as the Eskimo.

The Natural Habitat

of the country did. In fact they lived as near to nature as possible; while the habitations or mode of living of the South Polar expeditionists would not be as conducive to warmth and comfort. The people of the North Polar expeditions had cooking apparatus whereby they could make in 10 minutes burning of 6 ozs. of alcohol a ration consisting of a pound of pemmican, tea and a tin of milk for three men giving them two meals per day. Their day would consist from 13 to 12 hours while travelling, with one meal leaving camp in the morning the next when

Building Their Igloos,

and a third before retiring. The people of the Scott expedition differed also materially from the Peary people in the quality of the provisions used and in the manner in which they cooked them. The Peary people lost no time in cooking. They ate their frozen pound of pemmican and quickly brewed their hot mug of tea, which was all that was required to sustain them. The Scott people indulged more in cooking their food than in having it already prepared as Peary's men did. Capt. Bob thinks that the unfortunate members of Capt. Scott's party held on as long as they could possibly do so, believing that they would get back to their base in a certain defined time and with a certain amount of provisions to supply them. It is likely, he thinks, a continuation of blizzards prevented them from consummating this idea, and the result was

to withstand the rigors of the last of the journey, and the fact of their being found so quickly would bear him out in that calculation. The Terra Nova is back very early in the captain's opinion, so that they did not have much delay south. He is of opinion that Scott was within 100 miles of his base of supplies when found. Capt. Scott told Capt. Bartlett before he left that he had the pick of 8,000 men, and he would of course choose the best men, morally, mentally and physically. These men, he felt assured, he could count on in any grave crisis or emergency. They were all moral men and the captain saw and spoke to them on the decks of the Terra Nova. These men compared favorably with the men of the North Polar expeditions. Most of the men who accompanied Peary were athletes out of the best colleges and universities of the United States. Personally, Capt. Bartlett said, in conducting such an expedition he would prefer young men of education, college




