(Before Full Bench.) Job Bros. & Co. vs. John McMartin et al.-Howley, K.C., asks that crossexamination of Charles Paulding, who had left without being cross-examined, for New York, should take place before defendant's witnesses were examined. The Court rejected this mo-

Howley, K.C., further moved that defendant be allowed to produce evidence to contradict Paulding if necessary on certain points. This the Court granted, but only questions applicable to the points should be asked and the Court would be the judge of what these questions should be.

John McMartin called and examined by Howley, K.C.-He resides in Cornwall, Ontario. His business is mining and contracting. He became interested in this through Reid and Ford, whom he met in New York. He had known Ford for a couple of years before that, and Ford had told him about a property in Hamilton Inlet and induced him to join Reid and himself in the option. 


