

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

A Dinner and a Kiss! Germany's Maritime

London News and Leader: - The sole aim of all legitimate warlike operations is to weaken the power of the enemy for the conduct of the struggle. Only a childishly ignorant German will believe that Great Britain's power of carrying on the war can be seriously affected by the sinking of a few liners. This is so generally recognized even in Germany that it is still felt to be necessary to defend the sinking of the Lusitania by the repetition of the exploded fable that she was carrying vast supplies of muniions. But what is to be said of a nation which carries its doctrine of the destruction of enemy commerce to such lengths that it is prepared to sink a ship of which the complement and freight must from the circumstances be largely neutral, if by so doing loss can be caused to the enemy country? But Germany not merely does this; she does it while claiming to be fighting for "the freedom of the seas."

Economise!

Britain is Willing to **Make Concessions**

To American Importers Who Wish to Obtain Christmas Goods Manufactured in Germany and Austria.

Washington, August 30.-Concesions in the enforcement against American commerce of the British Order-in-Council were announced today as a result of informal negotiations just completed by the foreign trade advisors of the State Depart-

The British Ambassador Sir Cecil Spring-Rice assured the trade advisrs that their informal representaons in cases where the British orders have caused "undue hardship" to Aemrican commerce will receive


special consideration. The Ambassador called at the State Department personally to explain the extent of the British concessions, which are especially intended to meet the growing complaint of American importers that the Christmas trade s threatened by failure to obtain goods made in Germany and Austria, for which they had contracted.

Generally speaking, it is the intention of the British Government to permit the passage through the blockade lines of goods for which the American importers have entered into contract with German and Austrian firms. Heretofore it has been required that the money shall have actually been paid for the goods. Now, it will be sufficient to show that they were regularly contracted for, and that the American importer is really the person responsible for them, and title rests with him. Goods valued at mulated at Rotterdam and await transportation to the United States. The order applies to these, but whether it will extend to goods yet in German factories, but under contract for delivery on this side of the Atlantic, is yet undetermined.

The success of private interests in London represented by special attorneys in securing the release of about \$600,000 worth of such goods now on the docks is explained at the British Embassy here as due to the fact that the local attorneys there were able to secure and present to the British authorities the proof required as to the character of the goods and the conditions of contract. Now it is planned to permit American importers to present proof at the British Embassy here, which, it is believed,

will greatly facilitate importations. The entire responsibility for the holding up of dyestuffs of German manufacture intended for America is placed by the British authorities on the German Government and it is alleged that a contrary impression has been sought to be created because of ill-feeling against Great Britain To set itself straight in this matter, the British Embassy issued the following statement: April 14, a formal notice was issued by the British Government that they would allow exessels carrying two shipments of dyestuffs which were paid for by delivery in Germany of certain cotton cargoes, to pass without interference, provided the vessels sailed under a neutral flag; that the shipments were made from Rotterdam, and the dyestuffs consigned to the Secretary of Commerce for distribution directly to the Textile Industries.

"This offer, which was refused by Germany, still holds good."

Frightfulness a Failure

The story of the raid by German aircraft in the Eastern counties of England, will doubtless develop as cargo of coal. others have done, into a story of destruction of property and the lives of non-combatants. The policy of the War Office of giving no particulars as to the localities of such raids is sound, as it does not permit the Ger localities of munition works, training camps, warship vards and fortifications. There is a notable difference between the policy of the Huns and of the Entente in that respect. The Entente are using their aircraft on the bases, trenches, the fortifications, the railway communication and the sub-marine bases of the enemy. In these military efforts the air-flotilla provided by private subscriptions in Newfoundland will take a notable part and as the war progresses, the airfleet provided by the Governments and foundland and the Prince of Baroda will give the Entente a notable superiority in this mode of warfare. The same contrast between a policy of frightfulness and military effective No such deeds as the destruction of innocent men and women on board merchantmen disgrace the record of the British Navy or their Allies. Britons unborn will have no cause to blush for such wholesale murder as that perpetrated on those aboard the Lusitania. British submarine com manders will have such proud records as the destruction of war vessels around the Heligoland bases, the penetration of the Baltic and the sinkng of German warships there and in good. Sold at STAFFORD'S. the Gulf of Riga, and such deeds against warships, transports and blowing up of bridges on lines of nunication as have been accom plished in the Dardanelles, the Sea of Marmora and the harbor of Constantinople. The record of the British Navy has always been marked by humanity, and in spite of the temptation of reprisals to the German Naval men who have stood by and allowed British sailors to perish without lifting a hand to help them and jeered at them when drowning. British sailormen will do nothing which will disgrace their proud escutcheon. The policy of frightfulness has no military value. It fails in its object of frighten-ing the nation which has ever been eminent for valor and determination, and it brings everlasting disgrace on

Never, according to the 'Hamburger Nachrichten,' were so many fishing steamers launched at German shipbuilding yards as during last year, in spite of delays caused by the war. In 1914 thirty new fishing steamers were launched from German yards, as compared with twenty-five in 1913, eighten in 1912 and seventeen in 1911, while for 1910 and 1909 together the number was only twenty-one. This ctivity, the journal explains, is due to the increasing consumption of sea fish and the great improvement in the business results which have been shown during the last few years by all the steam fishing companies. The German steam fishing fleet, which on Jan. 1st. 1914, numbered 250 vessels, with a total of 49,460 tons, has now been increased to 300 steamers, with a total of 60,000 tons. The steamers completed during last year represent ed about 7,000 tons, with an engine capacity of 12,800 horsepower. They were all vessels of over 200 tons and between 350 and 450 horsepower. The Impoverishment of the North Sea.

Prof. J. Stanley Gardiner recently delivered a lecture before the Royal Geographical Society of London, which has been published in the form of a pamphlet. Professor Gardiner is well known as an authority on the life and physics of the sea, and what

ne has to say on such topics will receive the attention it deserves. The title of the lecture was "Geography of British Fisheries." Professor Gardiner discusses many phases of the life history of fishes, with special reference to the cod, the plaice and the eel, and he concludes with a reference to the North Sea. He says man's action in the North Sea has be come such as to destroy the balance of nature, acting as it does principally on mature fish, lessening their number, and so the amount of spawn to produce the next generation. This can be controlled, but only by international agreement, for which there must be a foundation of incontestable evidence. The conferences and work of the International Council have been highly profitable in this connection He says that it is clear now that the plaice stock of the North Sea is being so seriously depleted by man that a plaice fishery in that region may well be in a few years a thing of the
