

Where prevention has failed, the judge himself indicates a more merciful and effective form of punishment than imprisonment, which means evil associations for the culishment than imprisonment, which means evil associations for the culprit or, failing that, a more comfort-able housing, perhaps, than he has been accustomed to and an induce-ment to repeat the offence at the first took place at the General Cemetery, ment to repeat the offence at the first opportunity. This is the use of the birch rod, as to the beneficial effect of which no one experienced in such matters has any doubts. But it should be possible to prevent the offences altogether and make any form of punishment unnecessary. Parental control is usually lacking and not exercised when it might be. The first thing to be done, then, is to get at the parents and guardians, where they exist, and in no uncertain manner. A parent owes the duty to his child and to the state of looking after him: where he fails in it he should be re-

A parent owes the duty to his child and to the state of looking after him: where he fails in it he should be reminded of it sharply.

Many expedients that have been suggested, while admirable, touch rather the fringe than the centre of the trouble. It will be largely removed when we have universal and compulsory education, a reform which it may not be too sanguine to hope will come within the next hundred years. Until then some other way must be found to occupy the time and energy of these children with advantage to thomselves. What they suffer from is not a natural depravity—there should be no such thing in St. John's—but the misdirection of the active impulses and high spirits to be found in the composition of every healthy child. We earnestly commend to the civic authorities the problem of turning these into the right channels, with due admission of the other problems that so fully engage their attention. In this re-

#### spect our city is lamentably lacking in certain features and equipment which are elsewhere regarded as appanages of civilisation, though we always resent the inference. It should be an easy and inexpensive matter to provide, in the heart of the city, recreation grounds, children's playgrounds, open-air gymnasiums and the like. The material is there if we would only work upon it. No creature in the world answers more quickly to guidance than the young boy to appeals judiciously made to his better nature and his enthusiasm.
