

The U-Boat Criminals at the Bar.

(From the New York Tribune.)

Among all the Germans marked out for individual punishment none more richly deserve their fate submarines. The British Admiralty, it is stated, has a list of no less than seventy-one of these, and there are others down in the black ments. The purpose to try them for crimes of which only pirates, and not always they, have hitherto been guilty is not likely to be foregone. For the seamen of other countries Maye long traditions of honor and chivalry at which the Germans mocked. German methods of mak-Fing war were brutal enough; and, as othe official book of war usages showed, the brutality was calculated. Civilians were spared neither in their property nor in their lives, because Athe proclaimed object was "to destroy the total intellectual and matterial resources" of the enemy. But though the outrages perpetrated in France and Belgium thrilled the world with horror, some precedent for them, of a sort, might be found in the darker pages of history.
