Conservatives Make Gains in Municipal Election.

Lord Balfour Urges Unity and Co-operation -- Canadian Government Steamer Adrift in North Atlantic -- No Marconi Station at Clifden.

CONSERVATIVE GAINS.

LONDON, Nov. 1. — Complete results of the municipal elections in the provinces to-day show that Labor lost one hundred and sixty seats and gained five. Conservatives gained one hundred and ten.

LORD BALFOUR PLEADS FOR CO-OPERATION.

LONDON, Nov. 1. — Lord Balfour spoke tonight in Edinburgh. He took the line that Conservatives and National Liberals were united by a common danger, and urged that they should afford a united front in a manner that would give them the best chance of success. When there was so much adversity in moderate men of all parties working together it seemed sheer folly to throw away any opportunity for co-operation so fruitful in the past by hazardous experiment, unjustifiable by argument, and defenceless at the bar of reason. So far as he was able to judge the Labor Party would make themselves felt at the coming election. If they came into power he thought it would be disastrous for the country, and those who would immediately and profoundly regret would be the wage-earning classes.

REPEATING THE OBVIOUS.

LONDON, Nov. 1. — The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Stanley Baldwin, declared tonight in a speech at Cardiff, that his first duty will be to settle the debt to the United States. Regarding the amount owing to the United States, he said, "It is a very large sum but we have told America

we are responsible to the last penny, and we are going to pay it."

IRELAND'S CIVIL WAR.

DUBLIN, Nov. 1. — Republican prisoners in Mount Joy Prison, observed the second anniversary of the death of Terence MacSwiney, late Lord Mayor of Cork, by thirty-six hours fasting. Irregulars claim that in the week ending October 14th, they made twelve attacks upon Government forces, "resulting in thirty-two enemy casualties."

BOXING CHAMPION.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. — Mickey Walker, of Elizabeth, N.J., became the water-walking champion of the world tonight, when he received the decision over Jack Britton, veteran title holder, in a fifteen round bout at Madison Square Garden. It was one of the most furious contests ever seen in the battle-scarred arena.

CANADIAN SEIGNEUR ADRIFT.

HALIFAX, Nov. 1. — The Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer, Canadian Seigneur, has lost her rudder, and is in need of assistance, latitude 55.32 north; longitude 37.42 west, approximately seven hundred and thirty-eight miles east of St. John's, Newfoundland, according to advices here.

LABOUR LOSSES HEAVY.

LONDON, Nov. 2. — The rout of Labour was the feature of the Municipal elections in a large number of Boroughs throughout England on Wednesday. In a total party hour on Wednesday morning returns were incomplete, but it is significant that in ten of London's twenty-eight

Boroughs, the completed returns show that Labour lost one hundred and forty nine seats, which had previously been held by the Labourites. In some instances their representatives being completely wiped out.

NEED, SCHOONERS IN COLLISION.

NORTH SYDNEY, Nov. 1. — The schooner ARKONA, broke her moorings in the harbor here during the gale yesterday. She broke her bowsprit and rudderhead when she collided with the tern schooner Catherine Moulton. The Arkona afterwards beached, but is further undamaged. The Arkona was from Harbor Breton, and the Catherine Moulton from Burgeo.

IRISH IRREGULARS OCCUPY CLIFDEN.

BELFAST, Nov. 1. — Republicans are continuing to occupy Clifden, northwest of Galway, which they took yesterday, after a fierce encounter with National forces, in which eighty Nationalists were captured, but they have released all with the exception of Commandant O'Malley, and three captains.

A MARCONI STATEMENT.

LONDON, Nov. 1. — Reports that Republicans in capturing Clifden obtained possession of the Marconi Station from which messages are sent to Canada, brought a statement from the Marconi Company this afternoon that it had not maintained a station there since June last, having moved the station to Essex, England.

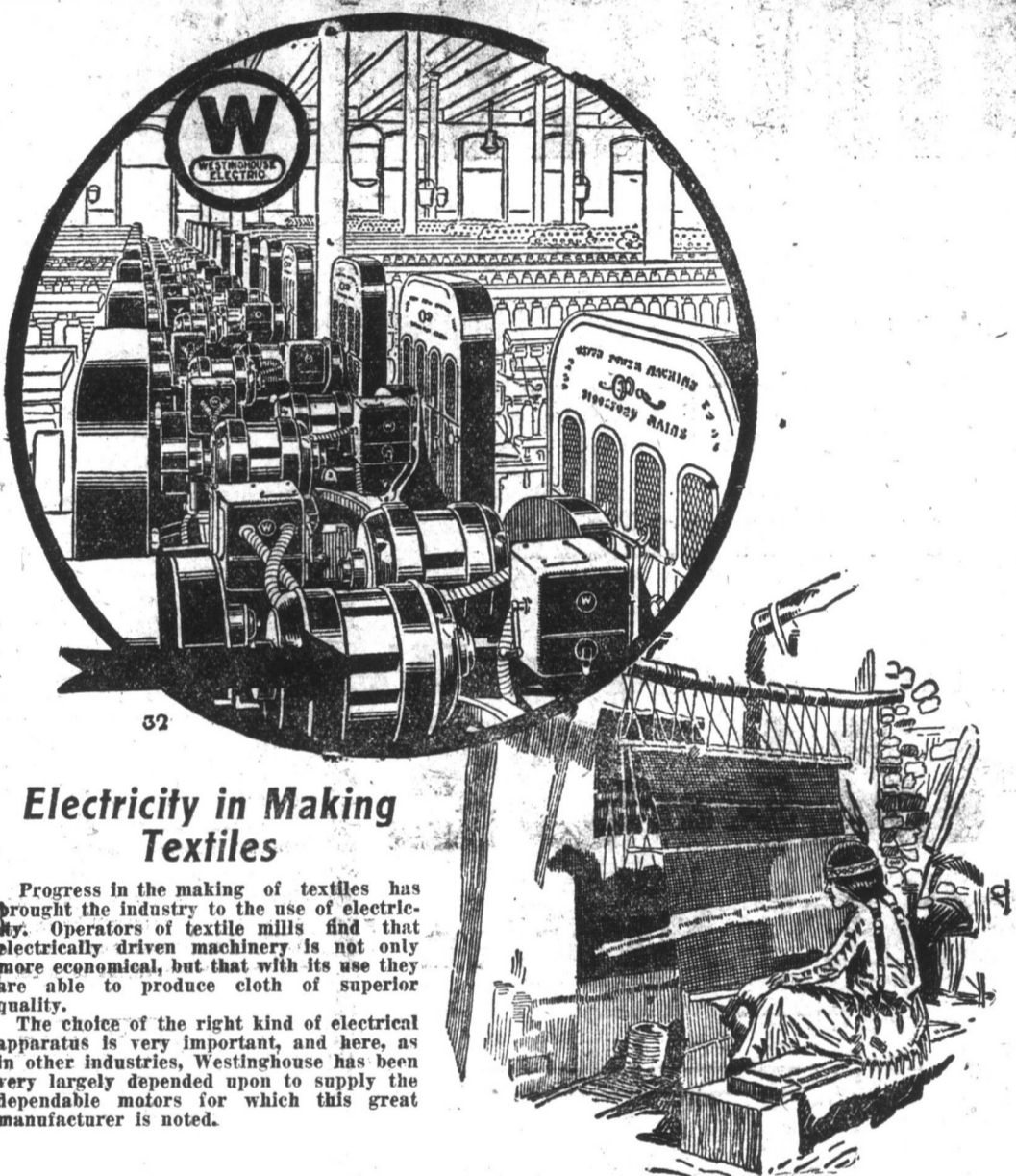

A Woman of Fortitude.

Marie Antoinette, Josephine Jeanne de Lorraine, daughter of Francis I. of Lorraine, and of Marie Therese of Austria, was born on Nov. 2, 1755, at Vienna. In May, 1770, she married the Dauphin Louis, grandson of Louis XV. of France, and who in 1774 succeeded the French throne as Louis XVI. She entered with spirit into the gaiety of French Court life, and drew

down upon herself much popular hatred in consequence. Marie Antoinette was not really beautiful, but there is a tolerably unanimous opinion that she was handsome, lively, amiable, and thoroughly kind-hearted. Her husband, however, was by temper irascible, and allowed himself to be led away by the course of events, instead of striving to contend and direct them. Thus he was away by first one statesman and then another, until at last he saw himself dived

of every shred of power by the Revolutionaries. After the deposition of Louis, all the elements of grandeur in the character of Marie Antoinette began to manifest themselves. She showed the greatest courage during the dastardly attacks made on the Royal Family; and appeared to be always more anxious for the safety of her husband and children, than for her own. She shared their captivity with noble resignation, and her demeanor under the most trying circumstances never lost an iota of its dignity. When brought to trial, her fortitude never forsook her, and her behaviour in almost unparalleled misfortunes has won for her not only the pity and sympathy, but the reverent admiration of posterity. For she bore herself with calmness, and met her death on the scaffold with unflinching bravery.

Strength of the French Army.

The report made by France to the League of Nations puts the strength of her home and colonial forces at 690,000 men. The cost of maintenance of this force for 1922 is given as 4,500,000,000 francs or, at the present rate of exchange, \$484,760,000. In justification of this large army, the French statement points out that treaty obligations call for the employment of 160,000 men in Europe, the Near East and Africa, 92,000 of them on the Rhine. Colonial demands in Morocco, Algeria and Tunis, amount for 230,000 more on paper, though less than that number are actually in garrison. In France proper 335,000 men are stationed. Of the complement of 690,000 men, 100,000 are professional soldiers, 375,000 are conscripts, 205,000 natives of the colonies and 10,000 foreigners.

Mr. Garvia Tells.

LLOYD GEORGE TO GO.
Ever since Mr. Lloyd George formed his Coalition Government six years ago, Mr. J. L. Garvia, Editor of "The Observer," has been one of his strongest supporters. After the failure of the Geneva Conference he was seen to weaken in his support, and the turn of events in the Near East proved the last straw. Mr. Garvia called upon Mr. Lloyd George to resign and announced a series of drastic articles, of which the following is the first to appear in the "Observer":

THE FOUR POINTS.
"First, so far as the East is concerned, the Government has irrevocably lost the Great War which it was one of Mr. Lloyd George's chief purposes to win when he took office six years ago. Secondly, the necessity for a fundamental change in the personnel and system of our Government is unambiguously proved. Thirdly, the moribund Coalition is dead at last. Mustapha Kemal of all men having killed it as surely as the sparrow killed Cock-robin. Fourthly, the Premier's position has become quite untenable with any credit to himself or advantage to the country."

"We take the last point first. Mr. Lloyd George was a great leader in the war, and we shall never forget it. If he can only make up his mind at last, though late, to sacrifice his office in order to regain his influence, he will be a great leader once more in due time, and perhaps sooner than is thought by most persons now that his stock is low. But for the present his public usefulness is exhausted. For so infinitely clever a man it is strange that he has made the old stale mistake of so many of his predecessors. He has lingered too long and hopelessly outstayed his luck. "If he now endeavoured to extend his tenure still more abnormally, he would find the ground quietly but firmly cut from under his feet by a majority which is not his own and now means at no distant date to have another head. Unionist unmistakably mean to unite. They know that they can now do better fighting on separate—even if parallel—lines, than if they went to the polls under Mr. Lloyd George's personal leadership. That attitude is inevitable. Liberals in the constituencies will be unmistakably re-united in their turn. Nothing the Premier can now attempt would sufficiently arrest that process. The main currents of events at home, as abroad, have passed beyond his control."

NOT THE MAN HE WAS.
"The reasons for this anti-climax are obvious. Alone of living statesmen the Premier has been seventeen years in office. When he should not expect to continue forever, it might seem strange that he did not go out long since—in circumstances which would have ensured his speedier and more powerful return. The thing is explicable. Eight of his seventeen years in office have been equal to more than an ordinary generation of wear and tear. No mortal man could stand it and remain as good as he was. Neither in insight for home and foreign politics nor in any kind of consecutive direct energy is he equal, or anything like equal, to the man he was at his best. "Resilient on the surface at call, capable as at Genoa of magnificent dramatic demonstrations, he follows these ebullitions by a manner of lethargy; for he is all the time fundamentally fatigued in the way that makes men incapable of really fresh thought, of vital insight, and of steady concentrated application. Two years ago, and often since, we have urged him for his own sake to withdraw. We pressed that course on him again after Sir George Younger gave him contingent notice to quit. Unable as a Premier in custody, and a faded one, to be true to himself, or to follow up any decisive instinct of his mind, he had his last chance at Genoa, and he threw it away by subsequent inactivity."

"THE MORNING POST."
"The Morning Post," the origin of the "Die-Hard" Conservatives, whose action at the Carlton Club Meeting led to Mr. Lloyd George's resignation and the assumption of office by Mr. Bonar Law, has the following caustic reference to Mr. Garvia and the late Premier: "For a good many years now, Mr. Garvia has industriously played the part of charwoman of 10, Downing Street. Whatever has happened during the week, Mr. Garvia has come in on the Sunday with his stop pall and his mop, and has given the place, what is called in domestic circles, a thorough cleaning. Even when Mr. Lloyd George brought in his Sinn Fein and Bolshevik friends, to make a sad mess with their job-matted boots, Mr. Garvia did not murmur; any dirt that he could not get rid of otherwise he discreetly swept under the bed. And so it came about that however disreputable the house might appear by the Saturday night it always looked as bright as a new pin on Sunday morning. But Mr. Garvia, who has cleaned up so many messes without a murmur, has given notice at last."

Projected Newfoundland Paper Enterprise.

The House of Commons recently, Mr. Macpherson asked the Prime Minister if he was aware that an influential group of officials was about to visit this country to place before him a projected paper enterprise on the coast of Newfoundland, and, further, that the subject of the deputations was to secure a Government subsidy in the form of a guarantee of half the capital and interest on \$18,000,000, to be required to finance this scheme, and to assure the House that this subsidy would not be granted before the view of members of the House on such an enterprise.

Mr. Hilton Young: I understand that an application has been made to the Trade Facilities Act Advisory Committee for a guarantee in respect of \$18,000,000, being part of a loan of \$21,000,000, for the enterprise in question. In accordance with the practice which I have given on several occasions I do not propose to interfere with the Committee's consideration of the application.

A correspondent of the Financier writes: "Newfoundland newspapers have struck an optimistic note in discussing the outlook in the Ancient Colony. Household Notes.

To make a cranberry tart, spread a round of paste over an inverted pie plate and prick paste six or eight times with a fork. After paste has been baked to a delicate brown, remove from plate and set pastry inside plate. When cold fill with a cold, cooked cranberry filling and then cover with a top pastry crust made by cutting paste to a paper pattern and baking.

To make, mix together ¼ cup of dry, sifted pumpkin, ¼ cup of sugar, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons molasses, 1 tablespoonful ginger, 1 tablespoonful melted butter, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, ¼ teaspoon salt and a cup of rich milk. Pour into small tins, which have been lined with pastry, and bake about 25 minutes. After they have cooled, decorate with whipped cream and serve immediately.

FURNISHING HOUSEHOLD OIL.

A friend of mine has four small children of whom the oldest is nine and the youngest two. With her lives a woman of about 80 and her husband's cousin. That totals a family of eight. Now this woman's husband is willing she should have a servant in the house, but she prefers not so.

Not on account of expenses, for when she reckoned up what she was paying to have a woman come in and clean and to have the laundry put out, she found it totalled about \$13. Not on account of space, she has room enough for she lives in a big old fashioned house. But just for this reason. She dreads the adding of one more personality to her household. An alien personality that will inevitably involve a certain amount of friction, of adjusting, of harmonizing.

She is the Adjustment Bureau. "All that," she says, "will come on me, of course, and I do enough of it now. Everyone tries to help, but I have to be the Adjustment Bureau for all complaints and misunderstandings and collisions. I have to see that the children don't wake Cousin John too early in the morning; and that mother doesn't fall asleep in the living room and bother my husband by snoring when he is having his after dinner cigar; and that everybody gets their fair share of the bathroom, and all that sort of thing. If there was an-

other person in the house to keep happy and satisfied and out of the other's way, I think I would go crazy. I'd rather do the extra work myself than furnish any more oil for the household machinery."

Do you wonder? I don't think I do.

A Wearing Job.

Furnishing oil for the household machinery is one of the unpaid, unpraised, unrecognized jobs of the housemother that often has more share in making her wear out at the end of the day than all the hundred and one other things she has done.

No one has any conception of how much this sort of thing a woman does, because no man has the patience to do any of it himself. If the fact were drawn to the average man's attention, that there is an inevitable drain of this sort upon the woman who is the focus of a large household he would probably say "Tommy Rot!" No need of it at all. Women exaggerate these things. If she wouldn't pay so much attention to these little things, now at the office I... ending with a glorified account of his superior skill in handling affairs.

He Sees the Difference.

But if his wife should take him at his word and not pay so much attention to these little things, he would feel the difference pretty quickly. The only time a man like that realizes something of his wife's contribution to keeping things running smoothly is when she is sick or away. I think every woman owes it to herself to go on a vacation once in a while, if that is denied her to have a little sick spell. Don't you?


