Despatches to the Evening Mercury.

BY ATLANTIC CABLE.

London, March 31.—The debate in the House of Commons, last night, on the Irish Church, was the most important one which has taken place during the present session of Parliament.

Florence, March 31.—King Victor Emmanuel is confined to his bed by serious illness. A despatch from Rome says the Pope is sick; but the nature of his attack is not stated.

London, March 31.—Despatches from the Continent state that rumors have broken out in Gronoble. It is supposed they are occasioned by the enforcement of the new army law. No definite particulars have been received.

Philadelphia, March 31.—Wm. Donovan was executed at York yesterday for the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Squibb and their grand-daughter. He protested innocence to the last.

San Francisco, March 31.—The steamer *China* from Hong Kong, arrived yesterday. A heavy fallow occurred among the Chinese Customs banks, which was so bad there was no hope of foreigners recovering their losses, though the American and English Consuls had addressed the Viceroy on the subject. The United States consulate and all its archives, at Foo Chow, had been destroyed in a great fire there.

Advices from Yokohama state that Satsuma attacked the *Tycoon* at Oosae, and after four hours fighting, the *Tycoon* was driven to his ships and went to Yeddo. All the foreign Legations were pillaged and burned. The foreign Legations have all left Yeddo, being notified that a battle would take place in a few days. The Japanese town of Karagawa had been burned, with loss of two and a half million dollars. A large number of high officials had been beheaded for treason, and a great many on account of the *Tycoon's* misfortune had committed *Harikari*. The *Tycoon* had been declared an outlaw.

New York, April 1st.—*Herald's* special says the financial exhibit that will be made by the public debt statement for the month, looks less encouraging than it did a week ago. From present appearances, instead of a small reduction of the debt, it is thought that a considerable increase will be shown.

The *Tribune's* special says the House has obtained possession of very important documents touching Mr. Johnson's opposition to the reconstruction measures of Congress. It is said that members have the original despatches which were sent by Mr. Johnson to prominent officials in the South, military and provisional governors, and others, urging them to use all the means in their power to defeat the legislation of Congress, all of which the managers will adduce on the trial.

IMPORTANT TO MORMONISM.—The Washington correspondent of the *Tribune* says:—The Committee on Elections have virtually decided the Utah delegate case today. Mr. Hooper will lose his seat on the general ground that Mormons are organized into a community hostile to the Government of the country. In the testimony which was taken yesterday morning, it was sworn that Hooper is an Elder in the Mormon Church, and that such officers are obliged to take what is termed the endowment oath. Affidavits were read of men who had taken the oath, showing that it requires those who take it to hate the United States Government, to do all in their power to overthrow it, to teach this sentiment to their children, and to impress it on their dying beds. Mr. Chandler of New York has been selected to draw up the report, and he is known to favor the uprooting of Mormon rule entirely.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY.—On the evening of the 25th inst., a Hotel keeper from Cobourg, named Michael Burke, who had been on a visit in Belleville, met with two or three well-known characters at a tavern convenient to the Market place. They drank pretty freely, and one of them, a notorious robber, who has been twice in the Penitentiary, and once in the State Prison, named James Labrashe, induced Burke to accompany him towards the Railway Station, and having crossed over Taylor's Hill, on arrival at a Jones some place, the ruffian knooked Burke down, robbed him of \$36 in bills, and then made his way towards Canfield. He was afterwards caught at Madoc, and the money being identified, when he was brought before the Police Magistrate at Belleville, and sent up for trial.
