Local and Miscellaneous

FOR PENITENTIARY.—Brown, the store breaker, left for the Penitentiary this morning in charge of the Chief Constable's son, and Mr. Mercer, the gaoler.

Wm. Taylor, of the Gore of Puslinch, on Thursday last, took a fancy to a buffalo robe and two horse blankets, which were in a cutter standing under a shed in Galt, and appropriated them. He was followed by the constable, the articles found, and he committed for trial.

ADJOURN OR PROROGUE.—In the House on Saturday, Mr. McCall moved that when the House adjourned on Thursday, the 17th inst, it should stand adjourned to Tuesday, the 12th January.

The motion was resisted by the Premier, as an attempt to take the control of the House out of the hands of the Government, and was withdrawn for the present. The object of Mr. McCall was to secure a sitting of the House after the holidays, instead of prorogation before Christmas, as the Premier desires. This is the chief beauty of dual representation. The Legislature may not interfere with those of the Dominion. For this purpose legislation was hurried through with damaging haste towards the close of last session, and this year the folly is to be repeated. Mr. J. S. Macdonald will you ask yourself solemnly, is this right?

[Since the foregoing was written, it is asserted that the Premier has relented, and will consent to the adjournment of the House over the holidays.]

BEEF PACKING IN CHICAGO.—The Chicago correspondent of the Hamilton Spectator writes: The seven houses engaged in this important branch of commerce in this city have about closed their operations for this season. The business has not been so active this year as last, showing a falling off of some 10,000 head, nevertheless Chicago has packed 64,325 barrels of beef for exportation during the season. The greatest number of cattle killed by any one house was 4,300 head. A striking falling off in the branch of business is observable since the close of the war; to illustrate which it is only necessary to say that, in 1864, there were no less than 92,459 head of cattle killed in this city, while this year the number has dwindled down to 23,391. Notwithstanding this fact, however, there are few people (unless it may be some of these beef-packers) who will not readily endorse the sentiment of General Grant and exclaim "Let us have peace."

A TERRIBLE SCENE.—The following fearful scene occurred at the recent steamboat disaster on the Ohio: A gentleman with his sister, a lovely and accomplished young lady, were passengers on the United States. At the first shock the gentleman was thrown from his bed clear on the floor. Hastily pulling on his pantaloons, he rushed to the door of his sister, burst open the door, and seizing her in his arms, carried her down on the main deck, where procuring a door-shutter, he threw it overboard, and leaped after it with his sister in his arms. He placed her securely on the shutter, and was swimming behind, pushing it, with his precious load toward the shore, when to his horror, a big burly and able-bodied man swam up, pushed his sister off the board, and climbed up himself. The young girl sank with a scream and if she came to the surface it was so dark, and the confusion was so great that he could not find her. Maddened at the dastardly act, he made after the author, and seizing him by the throat, a struggle to death ensued. They rose and sank together, still struggling, and when last seen were grappling with each other. Whether either was saved, or both went down together is not known. The sister sank beneath the waves and was lost, but she was terribly avenged by her brother.

THE GUELPH POLICE COURT.

Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., Police Magistrate.

THURSDAY, 17th.—The case against Richard McCrudden, for disorderly conduct, which was adjourned from Tuesday, came up again this morning. Defendant was fined \$5 and costs.

Thos. Naughton was charged with an assault on Ellen Taylor with intent to commit rape. The case was perpetrated on the 30th of last August, and Naughton immediately after fled to the States. Having lately returned he was caught by the Chief Constable. The case was dismissed, the evidence not being sufficient.

Mr. Metcalf's New Building.

We announced last week that Mr. Metcalf had taken possession of his new building on Upper Wyndham street. It has a frontage of forty feet by sixty feet deep. It is three stories high above ground, and though not so imposing as the Alma Block, yet it presents a very handsome appearance. The front is of rock-faced work, coursed and pointed. There are two large windows to each store, six feet by eight, and in each has been placed one large pane of the finest plate glass. All goods shown inside of these are thus seen to the best advantage. One half of the building has been fitted up as a saddler's shop for the proprietor, Mr. Metcalf, and besides the show room on the basement floor there is also a large work room in the rear. The other half has been fitted up as a grocery store for Mr. J. Langdon, who is well known to our readers both in town and country from having been so long with Mrs. James Massie & Co. Owen Sound Correspondence.

Owen Sound has become a place of considerable importance in our Western Peninsula, not only on account of the fine harbour which it possesses, but because of the agitation in favor of its being made the terminus of railway communication from certain points. The Town as well as the adjacent country have been improved very much during the last two years. To a certain extent the W., G. & B. Railway would injure the place, but I believe the ultimate benefits in securing the traffic from the North-west, which will in time be very extensive, would, to both Guelph and Owen Sound, be far from inconsiderable. Toronto is the grand hotbed of selfishness in railway matters, and I think it a great pity that a more amicable feeling could not be engendered between Guelph and other places on the route between here and there. In no town that I have heard from this season has there been greater improvements than in Owen Sound. Many buildings have been erected, and in most instances engaged before they were finished. Large quantities of pork and produce are now coming in and commanding high prices. I have just learned that on Sunday night four young men were detected in the act of opening the grave of a Mrs. Mitchell, who died of consumption. They had not kept their intention quite secret, and two of them were caught by a watch which the relations of the deceased had placed on the grave. The other two are not to be found.

MALICIOUS LIBEL.—A summons was issued yesterday morning at the instance of Ed. Hodder against J. R. Cook, for malicious libel. The parties are required to answer at the Police Court.

BY TELEGRAPH

PER ATLANTIC CABLE.

Despatches to the Evening Mercury.

Madrid, Dec. 16.—The leaders of all political parties have made a solemn pledge to use all their influence to preserve peace and order throughout the country. Constituent Cortes has met and settled the question at issue. The prompt and effectual suppression of the revolt at Cadiz has greatly strengthened the hands of the Provisional Government, and has dissipated the alarm which previously prevailed. The Minister of Finance already commenced payment of the January interest on the public debt. In London and Paris the subscriptions to the new loan have been closed. They amount to 500,000 reals.

Paris, Dec. 16.—The following news from Spain is published here this morning, the country is entirely tranquil.

Mr. Johnson, the American Minister, in a short speech at the anniversary of the Free Hospital, declared that Lord Clarendon was of the same mind as Lord Stanley, in regard to the settlement of questions pending between England and America, and peace between the two countries was certain.

John Stuart Mill has written a letter on the result of the recent elections. He ascribes the defeat of the workingmen's candidates, to the heavy expense of an election campaign, as now conducted, and as a remedy for this evil, argues that Government should pay the necessary expenditure and make all other outlay illegal and penal.

MADRID, Dec. 17.—The appointment of Senor Mauriere Roberts, as Minister of Spain to the United States is officially announced.

BELLY, Dec. 17.—Official correspondence of this city says: "It is expected with confidence that the Turkish and Greek Governments will listen to the warnings of great powers, and abstain from hostilities."

American Despatches

New York, 17th.—The Herald's London special says: Our despatches from Cadiz of the 10th were stopped and couriers detained. They describe fully the situation of affairs at that time, and state that the government troops were badly beaten in their encounter with the Insurgents. While the fight was progressing Capt. Farrell, the American Consul, is said to have mounted one of the barricades in union, and holding the American flag in his hand, he called upon both parties to stop the struggle, and put an end to bloodshed. The fight was shortly after brought to a close and hostilities ceased. Numerous buildings throughout the city bear evidence of a desperate struggle, and the city hall is badly shattered by cannon shots. The government troops are reported to have been guilty of excesses, and plundered many deserted houses. A number of English and American tourists were arrested by military authorities, but subsequently released through the interposition of the American Consul. The Insurgents loudly proclaimed in favor of a Republic, and cheered loudly for America, they also declared that if the city were bombarded they would ask that the country be annexed to the United States.

The Herald's Berlin special says: Prussian interests being strongly in favor of European peace, the Government has endeavored to induce Greece to comply with the demands of Turkey so far as said demands are founded on international law.

Legislature of Ontario.

TORONTO, Dec. 15.

The bill to divide the Township of Garafraxa into two Municipalities was read a third time and passed.

The House went into committee of supply when the following items were passed:—Colonization roads \$50,000, criminal justice \$129,000, Miscellaneous justice \$31,457.97, Government buildings—repairs &c. \$25,000, Government House \$50,000, Deaf and Dumb Institution, \$75,000, Reformatory at Penetangishene \$8,000, for improving the navigation of inland waters, surveying and draining of lands \$100,000, Mechanics' Institutes \$4,000, emigration \$10,000, cost of official Gazette \$3,000, Aid to Red River sufferers \$5,000.

ELAKE SUPERIOR MAIL CONTRACT.—The respective proprietors of the *Chicago* and *Algonia* have had a grand contest in Ottawa for the mail contract between Collingwood and Fort William; and the *Algonia* party have triumphed. The owners of the *Algonia* are to receive \$350 per trip from Collingwood to Fort William, performed fortnightly, and \$80 per trip from Collingwood to Sault Ste. Marie, performed weekly on alternate weeks. The contract is for one year, with the privilege of extending to two or three years, by giving notice to the contractors in December of each year.

The Stapleton wells near Goderich, is now turning out about 400 barrels of the very best salt a week, and the demand is fully equal to the supply.

An extra of the *Canada Gazette* contains a proclamation of Lieut.-Gov. Bellean, calling the Quebec Legislature together for the despatch of business on the 20th January.

Pigeon Matches.

Two of the most interesting pigeon matches of the season came off at Mr. George Atkinson's, Mountain Park, Guelph township, on Wednesday, the 16th inst. Messrs. John Lillie, and John Atkinson fired at six birds each, for \$5, and Messrs. John West and Joseph Atkinson at eight birds each for \$10. After the shooting was over the parties engaged and

Speaks to the Guelph Mercury. TORONTO, Dec. 16. The Deputation from Centre Wellington waited on Hon. Mr. Brown to-day in Toronto, and after they had tendered him the nomination, he replied that he would take the matter into consideration, and give his decision in a few days.

GOLD MINING IN NOVA SCOTIA.

Gold mining has now become established as a leading branch of industry in Nova Scotia, the value of the precious metal obtained amounting to upwards of half a million of dollars annually. Owing to the fact that the gold is obtained almost altogether by patient mining in veins of solid quartz, its discovery has not been attended by any marked excitement, as was the case in California and Australia, where it was at first washed from alluvial deposits—some miners making large fortunes, while more were disappointed. The official statistics show that a larger proportion of gold, both per man employed and per ton of quartz crushed, is obtained in Nova Scotia, than in any other gold-producing country in the world. These circumstances, together with the cheapness of machinery, labour, provisions and fuel, and the extraordinary purity of the metal itself, render gold mining in Nova Scotia extremely profitable. It is, in fact, essentially a manufacturing business. The raw material (quartz) is unlimited in quantity, and hence, the industry is capable of an indefinite expansion, the only requisites being capital and enterprise, to turn it to valuable account.

Wentworth County, Ontario. The gross yield from the Sherbrooke district, has been 2,264 oz. 15dw. 3grs., the yield of 2,920 tons, or an average of over 15 dw. equal in value to \$15 to the ton. A mill such as the Wentworth will crush 15 tons per day. The cost of raising and crushing the quartz will average about \$7 per ton. Taking twenty working days to the month, this would show to be divided among the stockholders \$2,400 per month, or say 25 per cent per annum. These figures may not be realized, but very much better has been done by companies in the same district, and on properties apparently not more favourably situated.

ORDINATION AT ROCKWOOD.—The Presbytery of Guelph met at Rockwood yesterday (Wednesday), for the ordination and induction of Rev.
