Edmonton, May 24.—Though its work will not be finished, the royal commission will adjourn for more than a month next Saturday at noon, and its decision on the A. & G. W. case will probably not be ready until some time in July. W. L. KING GEORGE V. TO OVERSEA DOMINIONS

The New King Issues Two Gracious Messages to the Colonies and to India.

London, May 24.—On the occasion of the anniversary of Empire Day, King George has issued two gracious messages to the colonies and India, somewhat similar in style to the message which he addressed yesterday to the nation. In both, he refers to his previous tours through the respective dominions, promises to follow in his father's footsteps, uphold constitutional government and safeguard the liberties of the colonial empire, and devote himself to the well-being of the Indian people. With reference to the rumors that he is to be crowned in Copenhagen, a court circular announced that Alexandria will always look upon England as his home.

Accident in Hamilton

Hamilton, Ont., May 24.—A fatal accident occurred in the Red Hill, west of Stoney Creek, this afternoon, when Jos. Atkinson, a British army pensioner, aged 70 years, was struck by an automobile bearing the license number of 8347, and belonging to a man named Lubensky of Toronto. The driver turned the car to the opposite side, but Atkinson became mixed and stepped in front of the machine, being knocked down and dying at Stoney Creek two hours later.

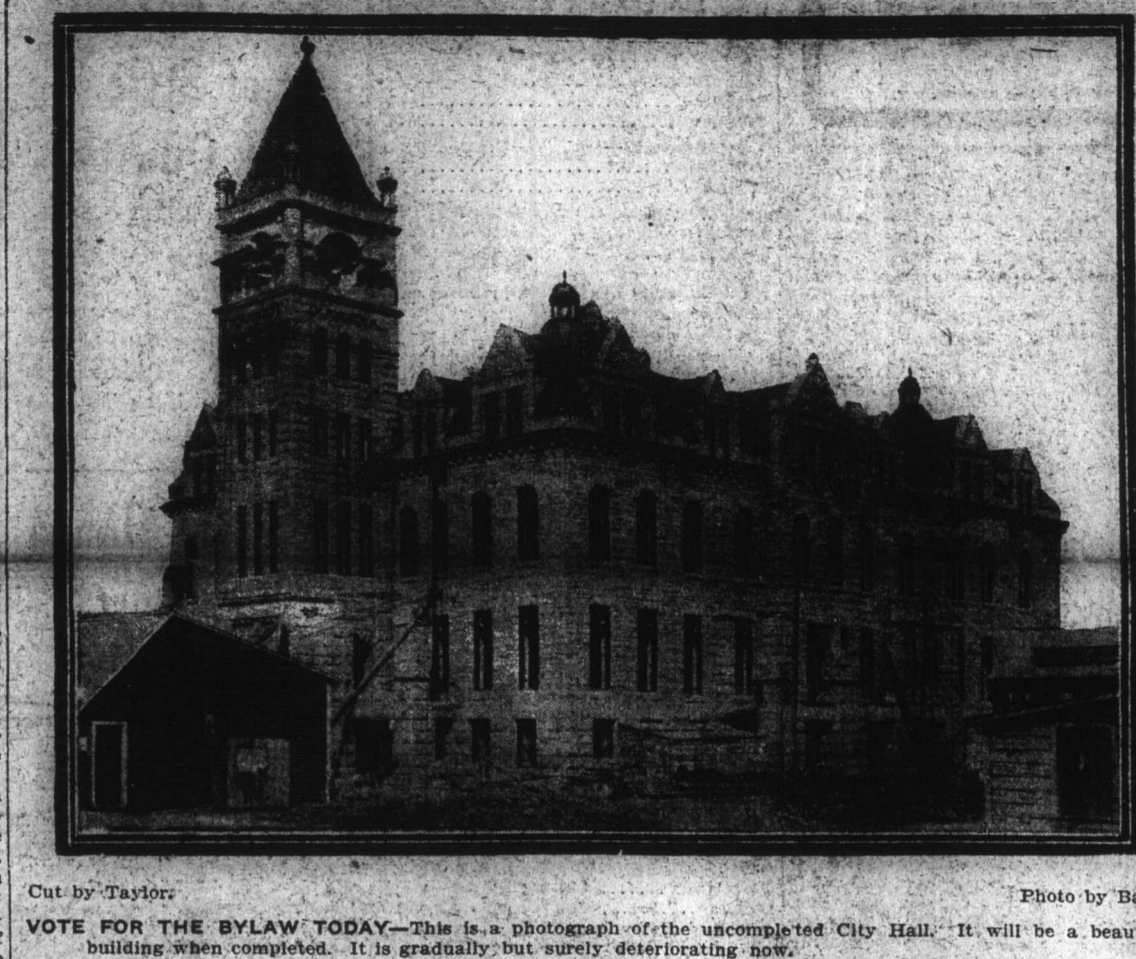

His Case Again Remanded Until Tuesday of Next Week

St. Paul, Minn., May 24.—A. M. Parkin, the Canadian, held in Minneapolis on the charge of defrauding the Radisson hotel out of \$200, will not have to answer to the charge until Friday. When brought up in police court Monday he asked a continuance to the 25th, as he expected affidavits from Calgary showing him to be the agent of R. B. Bennett. He also asked time to prove that his money is being held up by Bennett and the friends of the late prime minister. Parkin's case was remanded until Tuesday of next week.

Port Huron, Mich., May 24.—In a collision between two big steel ships on Lake Huron, north of Point St. Ignace, in a dense fog Monday morning, 17 men are believed to have been drowned. The steamer Frank H. Good-year, of Cleveland, was sunk in 47 fathoms of water. The steamer James B. Wood, of Cleveland, which struck the Good-year, how on, came into Port Huron harbor today with a big hole in her bow, carrying half a dozen survivors from the Good-year.

A GAME PIECE FOR THE TWO BALL TEAMS

Double Victory of Winnipeg Places That Team at Head of the League

We split even in the double bill with the Mid Hatters yesterday. We should have won them both in the words of the poet that is quite another story. The game in the morning was somewhat of the nightmare kind, but the controversy in the evening has been a ball game. The attendance was very fine and the directors are well satisfied with the day's performance, the only but in the morning being the morning's disaster. In the evening 1,618 people put down real money at the counter, which is a record attendance, the previous high water mark being 1,101.

These ninth inning disasters are getting entirely too numerous and are exceedingly painful, and the race on Tuesday morning was one of them. It was one of those hard fought, well contested, heart-breaking contests that make one somewhat disappointed with life. Pete Standeridge was the flinger and did well until the game had run past its usual course, when he weakened a bit. But he had the game won a couple of times, and errors and plays of the bonehead variety lost the game for us. The third innings was really the heart-breaker, and two runs were scored, which would never have been the right of a score board but for the stupid work of the players on the infield. Chandler was the principal offender and played as though he were in a trance, and a sound trace at that. It was terrible medicine.

As usual, we started out in the lead and got away to a two run lead in the first through good awaiting by Paddock and Carney and a wild play by the big Swede in the box for Medicine Hat.

But we lost them all in the third innings. With one out Nelson singled. With the second man out McCarter put out one which Chandler might have reached had he been somewhat speedier, and when it was gone he started in to think it over, and before he thought it all out the runner had scored. McCarter scored on Wilson's single and there is the game tied up again.

We broke the tie in the fifth. Flanagan doubled and Standeridge sacrificed him to third, but he was slipped at the plate trying to score on Paddock's effort. Paddock scored when King William whaled a three racket to right.

The hat came back in the sixth and played a run after two were out. Then Sturgeon hit for three sacks and scored on Shafer's hit.

But we were in the run business ourselves. First up, Smith smashed nicely for two sacks, and got third on Kellackey's sacrifice, scoring in Chandler's out.

We worked into the ninth innings with that one run lead, when Shafer first up, singled for the third sack, and Sturgeon pitched the morning. Pete got the next two, and it was Nelson to bat. Dunn took his place and swatted a hard sack punch down at Smith. As it reached the third sacker the ball took a bad bound, and that was the beginning of the downfall. But for that mishap the game would have been a close one, and the ball so abruptly, it would have been the greatest baseball game of the season. Of course, Shafer scored.

Universal Suffrage for Sweden. (New York Evening Post).

Christiana, Norway, May 23.—By a great majority the Odelslag has voted to grant universal municipal suffrage to women over 25 years of age.

The next legislative will become effective at the next elections and will increase the present number of electors from 270,000 to half a million.

Since 1907 women have been allowed to vote under the same conditions as men only when they, or the husband, common, have paid an income tax of four hundred kroner in the towns and three hundred kroner in the country districts.

No Bargain With the Irish.

(Morning Post, London.)

Mr. Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary for Ireland, speaking at a banquet given at Reading to Sir Rufus Isaacs in celebration of his appointment to be Solicitor-General, said he saw it was his duty to say that the words employed by the Prime Minister were the price that he was paying for the bargain with the Irish.

(Oh, oh.) He might be right, but the circumstances of his position to know something about the Irish, and I tell you, he is not a man to be trifled with.

What is more, there is no understanding with the Irish, and Mr. Birrell and his friends to follow him may vote on Monday night, or in any of the divisions on the Budget which will certainly attract attention next week, as they choose. However, they vote and into which ever lobby they go, there is no man on the Liberal Front Bench who would be able, either in public or in private, to accuse them of any breach of faith or any misunderstanding whatsoever.

They may vote how they like, and how they will do no pretence to say: I do not know. The words of Mr. Asquith were dictated by no party, by no group; they were absolutely necessary in order to fill with genuine encouragement and loyalty his own supporters.

His words were addressed, of course, to the House of Commons, of which the Irish, under the Union, are a necessary and an integral portion, but if they were addressed to anybody in particular they were addressed to the men behind him, his supporters, who have fought the battles of Liberalism and have urged the case of Liberalism against the House of Lords for years past on every platform and in the contest of every contested election in the country.

The situation may be one of difficulty. I do not say it is, but after all the leader of a great party has some right to consider himself and his followers.

No Liberal government can live under the conditions which exist between the House of Lords and the House of Commons. There must be made clear, and must be fought out—now, if possible, in this present parliament, and if that should not prove to be possible, in any other solution and any other election, so far as we are responsible for it, can only take place on the clear and distinct understanding that if the country supports our view again, as it has already done, I say more than once, why then the issue is for ever to be determined.

We stand, if you like, for a peaceful revolution. But I say that we need a humdrum people stand between the country and a revolution. The House of Lords cares for nothing except the threat of violence and that is the constitution under which we are at present condemned to live.

The resolutions which we have passed are the minimum of our resolves, and I need not be more convinced of anything in my life than that when the country has to choose between these resolutions and the fantastic remedies—if indeed they are remedies—of the House of Lords for reforming itself, the people will have no difficulty on which side to cast their lot.

I comment to you our resolutions, and what is even more important than that, our determination, made plain by the Prime Minister in the House of Commons, to pursue this matter at once to the bitter end.

Through Australian Spotlights

(London Daily Mail)

I have been much interested in reading some of the comments on England in the Australian Magazine by Mr. B. H. Scholefield. Mr. Scholefield opens by declaring that practically every Englishman believes that the English are an own land and a physically degenerate race.

At any rate that is the belief with which he came to England. At first he visited the East End of London and had his prejudices confirmed. But the more he saw of this country the more convinced was he that his early idea was an exaggeration.

"I was tempted to go further, to ask pardon of colonial patriotism—which in my individual case was not so narrow a prejudice as I believe that the English are as fine a race as any part of the Antipodes can produce. In a general observation of England I have found fully as large a proportion of strong, healthy, well-built men as in any of the Australian States." "The English," he maintains, "are altogether better preserved, for their age, than their colonial brethren. A man lives a healthy, vigorous life in Australia, but he wears out earlier than the Englishman at home. No part of Australia can show the proportion of men in full toll that England can. The English and scrutinize the faces of the crowd. Where do you see the most hard-bitten expression of America and the colonies? Where the wrinkles indicating early manhood? The Englishman is not worried about next week's election. He is positively a normal creature, the most normal on earth. And his health gets the benefit of it. The face of the sturdy Englishman, whether he be professional, clerk, or laborer, or middle-class business man, preserves its youthful smoothness and pinkness well into manhood. Englishmen almost invariably look younger than they are. They seem to weather the storm better in this grey old land."

Are We Impelled? Our Australian onlooker declares that politeness is at a discount in England. If you want to be treated attentively by a waiter you must not be courteous. The lower classes the man in the street, and hotel servant mistakes spontaneous courtesy for weakness and act accordingly. As for the surface manners of the English, the least said is soonest mended. "I have often thought that the Englishman takes a pride in being rude to strangers, and that is why so many casual visitors write down the English people in rude letters as a nation of bores. A man will remain seated in a tube railway while elderly ladies stand on the footpath and compel her to step off into the roadway. The Englishman will never thank you for a courtesy. Then in the matter of civility to the opposite sex and elders the English boys cannot compare with their colonial cousins. Nothing, however, exceeds the kindness and consideration of the Englishman for the person to whom he has been duly introduced. Our critic maintains that English manners are stand-offish, overbearing, and insolent to those whom the English do not know. These are real and concrete facts in the cases which led to the conflict with the American colonists and helped to create that unpathetic feeling between the colonies and the mother country which the war happily arrested and turned to good account. I do not support these criticisms, nor do I controvert them. I simply give them as frank ones and pressions of opinion by a son of the over-seas Dominions who evidently regards the motherland with kindly and friendly eyes."

Comets and Princes

(Washington Post.)

When Bedford, in the opening scene of the first part of Shakespeare's play of "King Henry VI" voicing about his lamentations over the untimely death of the heroic and well-beloved Henry V, cries—

Comets, importing change of times and states, have smitten the heavens; and with their fiery tails, have set the world on fire.

He was but expressing an idea that has been common to mankind in all ages and nations.

Similarly, California, when in her great anxiety to prevent Caesar from going to the Senate House on the 15th of March, she recounts the various prodigies that had just been seen in Rome, but fails thereby to shake his determination although she bursts out with the exclamation:—

When beggars die there are no comets seen; the heavens themselves blaze forth the death of petty kings.

No belief has been more persistently persistent than that comets excite a mysterious and malign influence over the destinies of the state and the great ones of the earth, and that they threaten war and disaster in many forms to the race of man.

It is a curious fact that the same prodigies which these rovers of the skies are reported to well crystallized in Sylvester's translation of Du Barlas, "Weeks."

(Evening Post) "The comet which was seen last night in the constellation of the Great Bear, that long streaming star, which threatens Earth with Plague, and War?"

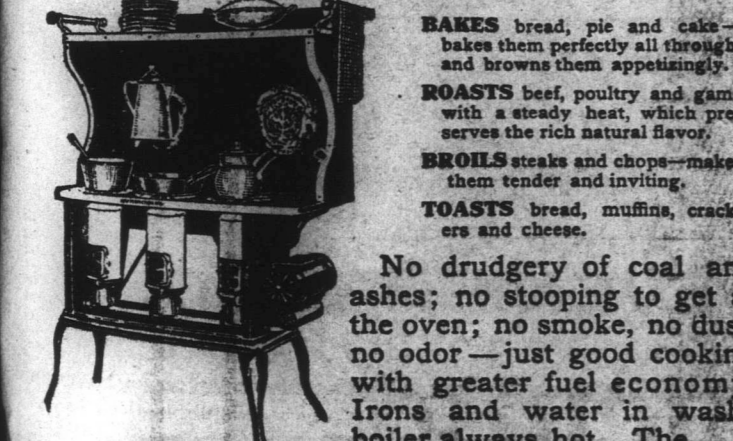

PLANNING TO FIGHT GREAT WHITE PLAGUE

Calgary Will Organize Branch of Anti-Tuberculosis League

ABLE ADDRESS MONDAY BY DR. G. D. PORTER

Committee Nominated to Organize the Calgary Branch

There was a fair attendance at the lecture given in the schoolroom of Knox church Monday night by Dr. G. D. Porter of Toronto on tuberculosis.

The chair was taken by Mayor Jamieson, and after the lecture a committee was nominated to formulate a plan to fight the great white plague.

In all probability something will be done along the line of forming a local branch of the Anti-Tuberculosis League, which at present has its headquarters for Canada in Ottawa.

The following were nominated for the committee, and Mayor Jamieson, who is chairman, will call a meeting of this committee as soon as he can communicate with all those members, several of whom were not present last night.

Committee Nominated Mayor Jamieson, Wm. George, president of the board of trade; Drs. Laferty, Anderson and Graham; Rev. Mr. Pratt; J. E. Bull, the local representative of the Victorian Order of Nurses; and the presidents of the Ladies' Aid societies of Knox church, Central Methodist church, First Baptist church, Pro-Cathedral of the Redeemer and also of St. Mary's church.

The main point brought out by Dr. Porter was the fact that consumption is not incurable, that is not until it has reached advanced stages.

The people generally are very apathetic regarding it, because this is not generally known, and as soon as a person is known to have the disease he is given up as hopeless in almost every case.

Should Prevent Infection There was a great deal that could be done, however, and besides that precautions should be taken that even though the life of the patient could not be saved, all danger of other people being infected should be removed.

There were three ways consumption could be contracted. From animal to man, from man to man direct and from man to man indirectly.

Cattle are really the only animals from which there is danger of catching the disease. The meat may have the germ and if it is not properly cooked there is great danger of infection.

The danger of infection from the milk was still greater, however, and children were very liable to infection. He said that he favored the pasteurization of all milk, and especially that given to children.

This killed the germs. If a consumptive coughed in the face of another person frequently there

FIGURES THAT TELL STORIES

CANADA AND ARGENTINA



The fields of "The Last Best West" are not the only fertile areas that are being tapped to supply the needs of the great markets of Britain. The Canada of the south is Argentina, and the development of the world's trade is bringing these two into keener competition.

Argentina was the greatest contributor of wheat to the British market excepting Russia, and the lead of the latter was by only a quarter of a million hundred weight. Canada stood third, with the British East Indies (15,423,600 cwt.) fourth. In exports of flour, Argentina was a small competitor, while Russia and India did not appear in the contest at all.

The greatest exporter of flour to Britain is the United States, which sent 6,739,051 cwt., or three times as much as Canada. But Canada far outdistanced the others, for the next competitors are Germany, with 605,960 cwt.; France, with 575,380 cwt.; and Australia, with 507,100 cwt.

During the night two victims are added to the list of this dread disease every time the clock strikes the hour.

Forty per cent of the 12,000 were in the prime of life, between the ages of 15 and 45 years.

Statistics showed that if the disease was taken hold of in the early stages over forty per cent recovered, while if left till later the percentage of recovery was only one per cent.

Alcohol was not the least bit helpful, and he advised strongly against its use. Good healthy food and fresh air were among the best of remedies.

There is no climate that will effect a cure alone, but some of them are more beneficial than others. The climate of Canada was among the best, and cold was good for consumption.

No Specific Cure There is no specific cure for the disease today, any more than a century ago. Good nourishment and plenty of fresh air were among the best things, and the place where a great deal could be done was the kitchen.

Good fresh air was also a necessity, and proper ventilation of living rooms should be seen to, especially the bedroom.

A RAIN OF SULPHUR IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Here is a Phenomenon That Interests Great Many Astronomers

MAY HAVE BRUSHED TAIL OF HALLEY'S COMET

The Sky Was Blood Red and There Was Great Alarm

Halifax, N. S., May 24.—Captains of vessels arriving in North Sydney from the southern sections of Newfoundland report an atmospheric phenomena on Wednesday last, the day the comet was supposed to pass between the earth and the sun.

At Harbor La Cou there was a shower of a substance closely resembling sulphur, which covered the entire neighborhood to a depth of about a quarter of an inch. The sky became blood red and many of the inhabitants were greatly alarmed.

Captain Mouton of the steamer Victory, which arrived at the same port today, from a village about 200 miles east of Harbor La Cou, reports that at that place there was a heavy snowfall followed by a shower of fine flakes or some similar substance. Clothing hung out on the lines had to be taken in and rewashed.

At both places the showers lasted about 15 minutes. A similar occurrence is said to have taken place at Burin, three quarters of a century ago, when Halley's comet was last seen here.

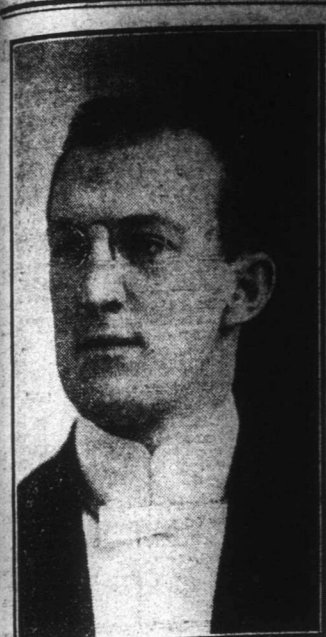

U. S. FINDS LUMBER TRUST AT THE COAST

Washington, D.C., May 22.—For some time the officials have been looking carefully into charges that the so-called trust controlled the price of lumber, and an agent has been at work gathering information for the use of the department.
