The never reached there, however, and lalthough every enguiry has been made to find the driver of the vehicle that took them from Hock Ho's he cannot be discovered. The time of departure of the twenty fits in with the date that the Lottie is known to have left here, and although some of the party promised to communicate with their friends left behind, they have not done so. The latter state that their kinsmen may probably have tried to get into the United States. The whole matter, as far as regards this particular band of Chinamen, is very shady, and forms a seemingly disjointed statement, which may be true or not. Of course, it is a very hard thing to tell whether this party went away on the Lottie or some other vessel. It is certain that they are not now on this island.

In the little Island Kingdom annexation is now the all-absorbing topic, the planters being unanimously in favor of taking shelter under the wing of the American eagle. The prospects of a revolution are extremely encouraging, and Col. Robert Wilcox who is at the head of the discontented element, informed the visitor that June would not pass without seeing the uprising. The session of the Hawaiian parliament opens this month, but the storm is not looked for much before the middle of the session.

Wilcox, the leader of the revolutionists, claims the sympathies of both classes of the population. His father was a wealthy white planter; his mother a native of the most aristocatic caste. Several years ago, when Wilcox was just entering manhood, he was sent by the Government of his native land to a military college in Italy, there to receive the tuition in the science of war necessary to fit him as the military leader of his people. He studied for two or three years, and then, by a turn of fortune's wheel, a new Government came into power at home, and he was recalled, to find his "ocupation gone." He was trained to be a leader of soldiers, and then the army was dismissed.
