

\$200,000 IN BRIDGES.

THE FOUR VIADUCTS OF THE ONTARIO & QUEBEC AT ROSELDALE.

It is to be crossed by four—all to be completed by February—Toronto's New Front on the North Side. Thousands of our citizens, tempted by the beautiful autumn weather and the magnificent October tints, walked out over the iron bridges joining the city with Rosedale to see the new lacrosse grounds and the greater Ontario and Quebec railway. When three later are completed, there will be six magnificent iron structures spanning the romantic ravine that cut up the northwest suburb of the city and all within a very small radius.

In company with Mr. Harrison, the engineer in charge for the O. & Q., a World reporter on Saturday visited the works and asked the progress. Mr. Harrison is one of the young engineers in the office of Mr. Shaler Smith of St. Louis, the leading bridge engineer in the United States, and the designer of the four viaducts now being built. Mr. Harrison is himself an enthusiastic bridge man, and thoroughly versed in the art.

The four viaducts on the O. & Q. are all of the same pattern, designed by Mr. Smith, and built and put in position by the Toronto bridge company under the inspection of Mr. Harrison. They are of the style known as plate girder viaducts and are built of steel and iron plate riveted together and supported on columns of the same material.

No. 1 is the nearest to Yonge street and is about completed; the track is laid and the first construction train will pass over it to-day. It is 320 feet long and 76 feet above the masonry. It consists of three spans of 60 feet and seven 20 foot spans. For masonry and iron work the cost will be \$30,000.

No. 2 is half a mile further east. The track between it and No. 1 will be laid to-day, and to-morrow will see the iron being put in position. The viaduct is already on the ground. No. 2 is 260 feet long, 75 feet high and of the same style as No. 1. Its cost will also be about \$30,000. It will be completed in three weeks or about November 1.

No. 3 is over the D. M. will have a stretch of 550 feet, height of the track is about 100 feet. It will take six weeks to put it in position and ought to be ready for the rails in the middle of December.

No. 4 is over the D. M. is 570 feet long, 108 feet high and will cost over \$65,000, and ought to be ready by February 1. The four will cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000.

Great strength and complete security are the main features in all these bridges. They are built to carry five times the weight of trains of Mogul locomotives crowded on to the bridge from one end to the other. To insure against accidents, the bridge engineers are now giving great attention to the iron columns supporting the girders and anchoring them to the masonry. The girders are anchored to the masonry by long and strong bolts, and the masonry is rendered the stronger perfectly stable in the most violent hurricane.

The masonry work of the bridge building has been brought to a point where the work is nearly completed. It is estimated that the masonry is all made at the bridge company's shops in the west end, and with the exception of some iron work, is all done in the northern area.

Perk Down in the Month. CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—The prop which was taken from the pork and lard market yesterday appears to have given way, as cash and October, which experienced a sharp advance yesterday, fell to the level of the market to-day, and at the close of trading quotations did not vary much from the close of Thursday. Pork futures advanced a few cents, but the market was comparatively little trading even at the decided price.

A Canadian Bank sold in New York. NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—An attachment was granted to-day against a property in this state of Melrose bank, Montreal, Kidder, Peabody & Co., corresponding to the bank of the latter \$25,000, while \$22,000 only stood to the credit of the bank on the books. The attachment was made by Kidder, Peabody & Co. assigned their claim to Geo. Magowan who obtained the attachment.

A Wife Consists to be Killed. MILWAUKEE, Oct. 7.—Albert Eberhart, who came from Magdeburg, Germany, last Friday, killed his wife with an iron bar on Saturday morning. A note was found in their room this morning explaining the motive. He had been told that his wife would be difficult to get along with, and he had decided to kill her. He had gone out to hang himself. He has not been found.

Condemning San Francisco Nabeles. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 6.—At the episcopal convention to-day Bishop Wingfield of Northern California said, that although San Francisco is filled with millionaires, San Francisco millionaires are not equipped to do anything for the cause of God and the church. Dr. Morgan Dix in his over-vehement rejection as a candidate as bishop, and in the election of Henry C. Potter, a known friend of co-education and woman suffrage."

A prominent operator of the Willard stock market is said to have lost upwards of \$5,000,000 among the others named as heavy losers is George M. Pullman of the celebrated car company.

THREE PASSENGERS KILLED.

A Train Telescoped on the Lake Shore Road in Michigan.

Huron, Mich., Oct. 6.—A terrible accident occurred at 6 o'clock this morning on the Lake Shore road at Pittsford, six miles west of this city. A freight train had just arrived at the station on the main track and was cutting out a car, when an other freight train dashed across the bend and plunged into the cachose of the first train at full speed. The cachose at once took fire. The following passengers were killed: Mrs. J. Rogers of Huron, Mr. Wirt of West Union and unknown man bound for Kalamazoo. Their bodies were consumed beyond recognition, the heads and limbs being burned to a crisp. Mrs. Mark Gray of Hudson had her legs horribly smashed and is otherwise fatally injured. John Harford of Pittsford was severely injured.

A FIREMAN BURNED TO DEATH.

Terrible Result of a Railway Collision in Philadelphia.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 6.—A terrible collision occurred late last night on the Delaware and Western railroad near Crocco. Three local trains were coming down the mountain, following each other closely. The brakes on the rear train failed to hold, and the train came dashing down the second grade, piling up the cars promiscuously and throwing the engine over on the south bound track, completely wrecking it. The engineer and fireman of the rear train struck to the engine. The fireman, Archibald Ford, died this morning. He has burned to death. The engineer, John Dunn of this city, cannot live. He has a wife and family.

The Mormon Plague Spot.

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 7.—Six thousand persons attended the Mormon conference yesterday. Apostles Richards, Carrington, Lyman and Cannon spoke, impressing on their hearers the necessity of living up to their religion by going into polygamy and paying tithing. The conference presented statistics showing that the membership of the church in Utah is 127,000; number of families 22,000; births during the past six months 1200 males, 1100 females; number of children under eight years 37,000; number of marriages in six months 339; new converts 23,000. The only other statistics given were that the church in Utah is worth \$1,000,000.
