



Shaw, "I think he is capable of filling the position of chief engineer." chief engineer."

Ald. Burns wanted to know if the members of the board were capable of judging the qualifications of an engineer.

Give Him the Position. Ald. Bailey, seconded by Ald. Small, the moved that G. C. Cunningham be appointed city engineer at a salary of \$- per annum and that the chairman be authorized to bring in a bylaw in council giving effect to

bring in a bylaw in council giving effect to this resolution.

Ald. Atkinson said he had nothing personal against Mr. Cunningham, but he thought Mr. Jennings' resignation had been brought about in an improper way, and that was his reason for fighting against Mr. Cunningham's appointment last year, and for wishing to have the matter reterred to the new council. Now that he was assured that Mr. Jennings would not again enter the city's service, he preferred having nothing further to say in the matter.

Ald. Lamb said that Mr. Cunningham had been placed in his present position more by been placed in his present position more by force of circumstances than by his ability. The alderman was willing to give him a trial at his present salary.


