YORK TOWNSHIP COLLECTORS.

The Council Acts Down the Salaries of Its Officials.

The principal business transacted at yesterday's meeting of the York Township Council was the appointment of the collectors for the present year as follows: No. 1 district (southwest), W. J. Bull; No. 2 (northwest), John Armstrong; No. 3 (southwest), R. J. Bull; No. 4 (northwest), George C. Moore.

W. J. Bull will be required to give a \$15,000 bond, and will receive 2 1/2 per cent on the assessments of his district. Last year the collector of this district received 3 1/2 per cent.

John Armstrong was given a \$5,000 bond, and will receive 2 per cent. Last year he received 2 1/2 per cent. George C. Moore will be required to furnish a \$10,000 bond, and will get 2 per cent. Last year 3 per cent was paid.

The collectors will be required to pay over all sums weekly. On motion of Messrs. Lucas and Sylvester, a grant of \$40 was made in full for the year.

Thomas Crawford, township clerk of Scarborough, wrote that his Council had made a grant of \$40 to finish gravelling the town line between Scarborough and West York, south of Christie's Hotel, and that James Keys and John Buchanan expended the amount.

A petition was presented, signed by A. Harvey and others, asking to change the boundaries of U. School sec. 6. A by-law was passed appointing an arbitrator on behalf of the township.

A communication was received from a Harveyston farmer, who is thinking of supplying a system of waterworks to some houses in Lottrel and Florence avenues, and asking for permission to lay pipes across the street, and also suggesting that it be well for the Council to take into consideration the question of a more extended service for that locality, both for water and sewerage.

On motion of Messrs. Goulding and Healy, \$40 was granted for the purpose of gravelling the school grounds at West York, south of Christie's Hotel, and that James Keys and John Buchanan expended the amount.

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A DOCTOR SWINDLING CITIZENS BY AN INGENUOUS TALE OF WOE.



STOCKS ARE VERY STRONG.

THE GRANGERS ARE HIGHER AT THE CLOSE TO-DAY. Canadian Securities Quiet and Featureless. Sterling Exchange Weaker—Large Advance in Visible Supply of Wheat and Markets Were Firmer—Higher Prices for Chicago Provisions.

Monday Evening, Sept. 4. The local stock market was quiet and featureless to-day. Consols higher, closing at 102 1/4 for money and account.

Canadian Pacific full in London, closing to-day at 65 5/8. St. Paul closed at 67 5/8.

The earnings of P. R. for week ending Aug. 31 were \$330,000, a decrease of \$53,000, as compared with corresponding week of last year.

Sterling exchange is lower to-day, with rates in New York still a cent.

The English visible supply of wheat decreased 31,000 bushels the past week. The shipments of wheat from India the past week were 140,000 bushels.

The amount of wheat on passage to Europe 22,024,000 bushels, a decrease of 744,000 for the week.

Corn affluence to Europe is \$5,000,000 bush, decrease of 225,000 bush for the week.
