THE GARDWELL CAMPAIGN

WILL BE OPENED IN EARNEST ON THURSDAY OF THIS WEEK.

Mr. Reed of Maine Again Elected Speaker by a Very Large Majority.

Washington, Dec. 2.—The fifty-fourth Congress began its public sessions at noon today with a session of the House of Representatives.

There were fifteen new faces among the Senators not counting Mr. Chilton of Texas, who re-occupies a seat he once held before by appointment, and there were in addition thirteen re-elected Senators to be sworn in by Vice-President Stevenson, and three successors of the holding over Senators whose terms will expire two years from now, some of the most prominent including Blackburn, Brice Vest and Peffer, took their seats today.

Mr. Reed (Rep., Maine) has been elected Speaker by a vote of 224, as against 85 for Mr. Crisp (Dem., Ga.) for Mr. Bell (Pop., Col.), and 1 for Mr. Culberson (Dem., Texas).

The Senate adjourned until to-morrow at 12 o'clock. After the election of Speaker Reed and the principal officers of the House members' seats were selected by a committee appointed to join the Senate committee in selecting a President to notify him that Congress was ready for business. The House will meet daily at 10 o'clock and the 51st Congress was temporarily adopted and the House adjourned till to-morrow.

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TRAGEDY IN A GHUTE.

James V. Campbell Buried in an Avalanche of Grain.

The Queen City Flour Mills at Toronto Junction the Scene of the Accident. The Deceased a Brother of Mr. Archibald Campbell, M.P., and a Well Known Citizen.

James V. Campbell, foreman of the Queen City flour mills, Toronto Junction, met with a terrible death under most peculiar circumstances shortly before 6 o'clock last night. Deceased and an employee named Harper were in the shorts bin on the third floor of the mill, and had taken out a carload, when the shorts clogged about the sides of the hopper, leaving a hollow space underneath. In endeavoring to clear the shorts Campbell dropped his small scoop shovel into the hopper, and while trying to redeem the spoon he slipped down the side of the hopper. The weight of his body started the shorts moving again, and he was carried through to the chute, being suffocated and buried in the shorts.

Harper secured assistance, and in a few minutes the body of the unfortunate man was taken out. Drs. Clendenan and Perfect were called in, but Campbell had passed beyond human aid.

Deceased was about 40 years of age, and was a brother of Archibald Campbell, M.P., proprietor of the mills. He came here from Ridgeway when the Queen City mills started running, and resided with his wife and three children at 82 Annettoe-street.

Coroner Clendenan has issued a warrant for an inquest.

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LITTLE ONES BURNED TO DEATH.

A Mother in Hamilton Left Her Children While She Went to Milk the Cows. A Sad Tale.

Winnipeg, Dec. 2.—News has reached the city that the residence of a farmstead, Gangel, 12 miles from Gladstone, was burnt Saturday night. Three little children, aged 4 years, 2 years and 1 month respectively, were cremated. It appears Mrs. Gangel left the children in the house unattended while she went to the stables some distance away to milk the cows. The children are supposed to have been playing with burning splinters and set fire to some combustible material. At any rate, when the mother had finished milking the cows, she saw the house in flames, and the rescue of the children was impossible. The two younger were burned to cinders, and the eldest was so seriously injured that she died several hours later. Mrs. Gangel is frantic with grief, but is being cared for by neighbors.

ONE AT THE AQUEDUCTS. Ald. Hubbard Engineers Motion Against the Lake Simcoe Scheme.

Ald. Hubbard's motion was put and carried unanimously. Ald. Bates and Ald. Leslie positively declined to vote.

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ADASTARDLY ATTEMPT TO DESTROY THE OLD COMET WORKS.

A Bag of Saw Dust Saturated With Oil Found Burning Fiercely in the Rear Portion of the Building—A Saturday Night Blaze Which Might Have Frosted Diablos.

Shortly before 11 o'clock last night a disastrous attempt was made to set fire to the large vacant building 24 Adelaide-street west, formerly occupied by the Comet Company, and for the time being the vestry of the fire by P.C. William Peterson and Night-watchman Colbeck.

The blaze was quickly extinguished, and the remains of the bag containing the oil and sawdust were taken to police headquarters. There were no injuries to persons, and the damage was not serious.

A Diablos' Fire, which might soon have caused an explosion that would have done much damage in the vicinity of the ground, was discovered in the premises of the Toronto Lens and Camera Company, on the corner of Adelaide and Bay-streets, Saturday night. A tenant of the building had discovered a small amount of sawdust which was lying on the floor.

In regard to the Business Situation—On the Whole the Outlook is

Satisfactory. 2-Your correspondent interviewed the leading Montreal bankers on Saturday and their opinions regarding the business outlook in Canada, will no doubt be read with more than ordinary interest by the mercantile community.

If that is not a credit to us, I do not know what is. As at present the fall of 1895 will be a decided improvement."

Mr. George Haines, general manager of the Merchants' Bank of Canada, said:

"I do not think the country is in an unsatisfactory condition. Navigation is now closed and the exports of Canada's exportable products are very large. Profits have not been as good as formerly, but it cannot be said that they have been less. The country will not derive great benefit from the trade that has been done. The splendid crops in Manitoba, the Northwest, even at low prices, have done much to give a general feeling of hopefulness and buoyancy all over that country.
