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## FIVE MURDERED AT HEMFORD

### Three Men and One Woman Shot to Death by Havelock Veinot Who Kills Himself

Drowning peacefully in the beauty of the early sunny Sunday morning the hamlet of Hemford, Lunenburg Co. a few miles from New Germany, was shocked into realization that a tragedy of most ghastly and horrible proportions was being enacted in its very midst. Nova Scotia has witnessed shocking events of homicide and self destruction before, but never in all her history, since law and order have been enacted here Sunday blackened her life. Three men and one woman have been deliberately and coldly murdered and the slayer has taken his own life.

From seven o'clock that morning until noon, scenes indescribable have been witnessed in the memory of those who beheld them. This murderer did not run amuck. He shot his own father. In the most deliberate and calculating manner. Then he set forth and shot a man and his wife, which deed he followed up by killing another man, a near neighbor. Returning home, he finished his father with a bullet. Then he blew his own brains out.

The murdered are: William Veinot, the father of the murderer and suicide; Albert Ritchey, Adella Ritchey, his wife and Archibald Snyder. The man who murdered them and took his own life was Havelock Veinot, 45 years old, a bachelor, who lived with his parents. One victim is survived by a widow and thirteen children.

This terrible affair, it appears, was brought about in connection with property rights. The people of Hemford declare that Veinot was not crazy but was a man of hasty temper. He did this terrible thing," one said, "in a way no denominated man would have done it. He went about it like a man who fully decided on the whole tragedy including his own suicide."

## "RIO GRANDE" NEXT SATURDAY

### Fast Moving Melodrama Secured For Patrons of Primrose Theatre

Notwithstanding the great demand for advance bookings Bishop & Bishop have succeeded in obtaining for Saturday night, Sept 25th, "Rio Grande," the film version of the famous stage play written by Augustus Thomas and released shortly by Specialty Film Import. The picture is full of action, spectacular scenes, and is almost entirely an outdoor picture with many beautiful scenic effects.

One of the most remarkable scenes in the production is the battle staged between Texas Rangers and Mexicans. It is one of the most vivid and realistic fights ever screened. Five hundred Mexicans and two hundred cowboys were actually engaged in the work before the camera, many of them mounted. The fight was staged in the streets of a village which was being raided by the Mexicans. Director Edwin Carew spent several days preparing the cowboys and Mexicans for the battle and when it opened they went to it strong.

Another great feature of the production is a dance scene in which one hundred expert dancers from Mexico City were used. The dance is held at the Hacienda of a wealthy Mexican and the dancers are all in the colorful costumes of old Mexico. One of the most dramatic moments of the play is staged in this setting. The story is that of a beautiful Sonora woman, her father is one of the leading patriots of the border land and her romance with an Irish cowboy who for a time is her hated enemy. The story is played by Rosemary Theby, who is seen as the leader of the armed Mexicans in their raid on the American town. She is captured by the cowboy who loves her and as his prisoner she gradually awakens so her great mistake in hating Americans.

## WATCH FOR THE PAINTED BANDS

HALIFAX, Sept 18—It will not be difficult hereafter for motorists to get along the principal roads of the province of Nova Scotia, thanks to the work of the Nova Scotia Motor League, which has completed the painting of colored bands on telegraph and telephone poles along two of the chief roads of the province, almost completed the work on another, and will start next week on a fourth.

The "red band" route, which is between Halifax and Yarmouth thru the Annapolis Valley, is now finished. The "green band" way, also between Halifax and Yarmouth, but via the South Shore, is also finished. Next week it is expected that the "blue band" route will be completed. It runs from the other routes at Bedford to the New Brunswick border beyond Amherst, and last night those doing this work were reported to be at Parrsboro. When this route is made clear, work will begin on the "yellow band" road, which will be between Sydney and Truro, where it will join the blue band lines. The Nova Scotia Motor League hopes to continue this work next year, so that all the motor roads of the province will eventually be out lined so no one can make a mistake.

Secretary Watson of the League said yesterday that the League was asking all motorists to co-operate in this work.

## LIGHTNING AND RAIN STORM

### Severe Damage in Digby and Bear River, One Death in Liverpool

HALIFAX, Sept 14—A heavy lightning and rain storm swept over the province last night and today. Damage is reported at several places, and the telegraph service to eastern points interrupted.

A despatch from Port Hawkesbury says that no trains from Halifax or Sydney arrived there today. Several bridges at that place have been carried away, and the iron bridge and concrete abutments at the head of Hawkesbury harbor are down.

## DAMAGE IN DIGBY

DIGBY, N. S., Sept 14—One of the worst electrical storms which ever passed over this country took place today, resulting in considerable damage. In the town of Digby four places were struck. St. Patrick's Roman Catholic church being the worst sufferer. This building, which is on the top of one of the highest hills, was struck twice. There are holes in the roof, front wall foundation and the steeple is ripped to pieces. Windows were torn out and strewn around and it will cost considerable to repair the building.

The three other buildings were in St. Mary's street, only a few hundred yards apart. They were the residences of S. L. Sullivan, a cottage owned by Edward Sullivan and the Hutchinson farm. The latter was set on fire and practically destroyed. Acadiaville, the residence of John Murley, was badly damaged. In Bear River, the house of Stanley Sullivan was struck, the bolt entering the north end of the house and almost wrecking it. Beds were torn to pieces and partitions torn out, but fortunately no one was hurt.

## YOUNG MAN KILLED

LIVERPOOL, N. S., Sept 14—Harley Brough, son of Richard Brough, a section man residing at Broad River, was instantly killed at his home this morning by lightning.

His brother and sister were present and made every effort to revive him but were unsuccessful.

The house was torn up considerably by the lightning, plaster and shingles being thrown in every direction. At 7 o'clock on Monday evening an interruption until Tuesday morning with a heavy rainfall.

## EXPLOSION IN NEW YORK

### Exact Cause Not Definitely Known but is Generally Believed to be Due to a Time Bomb

NEW YORK, Sept 17—The exact cause of the explosion which in the twinkling of an eye yesterday noon transformed Wall Street, near Broad from a scene of bustling activity to one of dreadful carnage, remains tonight a mystery.

Official opinion, as expressed by William J. Flynn, Chief of the Bureau of Investigation of the United States Department of Justice and Fire Commissioner Thomas Brennan, is that the disaster was caused by a time bomb loaded with high explosives and reinforced with metal slugs. The early theory that the blast was caused by a collision between an explosive laden wagon and another vehicle seems to have been dispelled by subsequent investigations, although it has not yet been entirely discarded by official investigators.

Chief Flynn, who arrived here from Washington last night to take personal charge of the Federal investigation, declared after leaving the J. P. Morgan office late today that "from evidence obtained within the last few hours it has been definitely established that the explosion was due to a time bomb."

## THREE HUNDRED INJURED

"The bomb was taken to Wall Street," he added, "in a wagon which was blown to pieces. The infernal machine was timed to go off at noon and apparently was placed in the four blocks of Wall and Broad Streets when the explosion occurred." Six more deaths since midnight brought the death toll tonight to thirty-five. The number of injured including those treated at the scene in hospitals and at their homes, was approximately 300. Nearly 100 of these are still being treated in hospitals. The property damage is variously estimated from \$1,000,000 to \$2,500,000.

## LOTS OF FRUIT IN ONTARIO

(Crop Is So Large That Damage by Recent Storm Will Not Cause Any Boost in Prices)

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Sept 14—Although several hundred tons of fruit were rendered unfit for shipment by Saturday's storm in the Niagara peninsula, the crop is so abnormally heavy that there will be plenty for the markets. Individual growers will suffer losses, estimated to total \$400,000, the great majority of the growers in the fruit belt were not in the path of the storm, their crops are so large that it is doubtful if the storm will cause any boost in prices. As an example of how complete was the devastation on some farms, W. H. Bunting, who had a large supply of baskets on hand, disposed of his entire stock of baskets yesterday, having no further use for them.

## JUDGMENT OF RAILWAY BOARD

Passenger and Freight Rates Advanced, and Sleeping and Parlor Rates Increased Fifty Per Cent.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—By virtue of a judgment which will be issued from the offices of the Board of Railway Commissioners, railway companies in Canada are granted an increase of forty per cent in Eastern Canada freight rates and thirty five per cent in Western freight, effective on Monday next, September 13, and to continue in force until December 31.

After December 31 the increase in the freight rates in Eastern Canada is reduced from forty to thirty-five per cent and in Western Canada from thirty-five to thirty per cent. PASSENGER RATES INCREASED Simultaneously with the increase in freight rates, passenger rates all over the country are advanced twenty per cent, so long as they do not exceed four cents a mile. This increase is effective only to December 31. After that date, and for the six month period from January 1, 1921, to July 1, 1921, a ten per cent increase is authorized.

Following July 1 passenger rates return to those in force at the present time.

The judgment will authorize increases of fifty per cent in sleeping and parlor car rates, and an increase of twenty per cent in the rate on excess baggage.

### RATES ON COAL DOUBLED

No increase is authorized in the rates on milk. Authorization is given for an increase in freight on coal from ten to twenty cents a ton.

A summary of the judgment which has been handed down by the Railway Commission in the application of all Canadian railways for increased rates was given out this evening by the Chief Commissioner, Hon. F. B. Carvell.

The judgment will refuse to authorize any increase in the rates on sand, gravel and crushed stone, incidental services, such as switching, milling in transit, diversions, re-consignment, stop overs, demurrage, weighing, etc., but provision is made for special applications in any or all of these services.

No increase is authorized in the rates on commutation fares, nor in the minimum class rate scale, or the minimum charge for shipment.

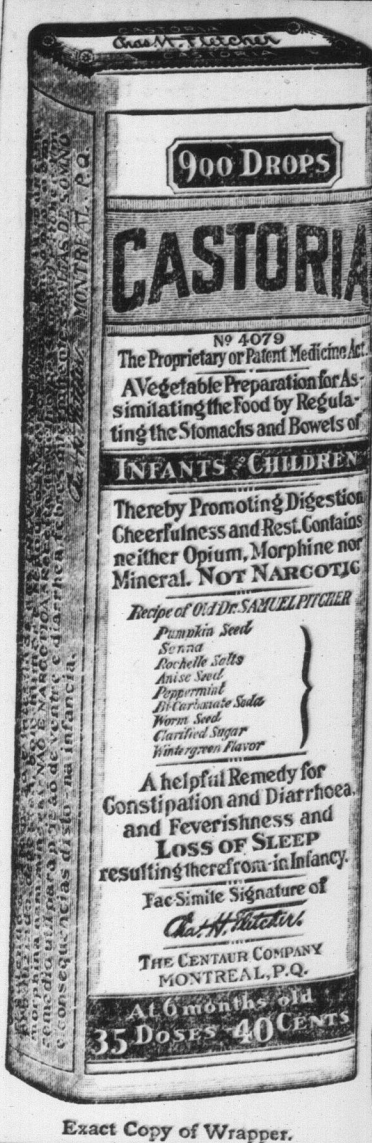
