THE HISTORY OF
AN OLD FAMILY REMEDY

TOLD BY ONE OF THE FAMILY.

OUR branch of the Wills family came from the town of Bristol, in the southern part of England. My father, Chas. Wills, was of an adventurous, roaming disposition. The bottom of the bureau drawer was cut out, in order to obtain the original recipe, which is now in their possession, still pasted to the board where it was placed forty years ago. The old bureau still remains in Waterbury, where the cut drawer can be seen by any one.
