SUFFS' CAMPAIGN GIVEN THREE MONTHS At the End of That Time Either the Women or the Government Will Have to Give In, According to Lloyd's—Militants Burned Another House Yesterday. Special Cable to The World. LONDON, May 9.—(Copyright)—It is the general belief at the headquarters of Lloyd's Insurance that the present situation cannot last longer than three months and that if the militant women maintain their suffragette campaign of violence for a longer period, the government must give in. That, of course, is merely their assumption; a militant suffragette "arson squad" was out this morning and succeeded in destroying by fire a large unoccupied manufactory near Barrow-in-Furness, Lancashire. A quantity of suffragette literature was scattered on the lawns surrounding the house. "Gen." Mrs. Flora Drummond, the militant suffragette leader, who collapsed twice in Bow street police court during yesterday's conspiracy proceedings against the principal officers of the Women's Social and Political Union is today very ill from the effect of her privations during her "hunger strike" while under remand. The physician in attendance has advised her to undergo an operation. The anxiety of the British authorities over the threat of the militant suffragettes to eclipse their destructive acts of the past week was displayed this morning when Premier Asquith and First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill, accompanied by their wives, left Waterloo Station on the Southwestern Railway to proceed to the coast, in order to join the admiralty yacht Enchantress, on which they are to make an extended inspection cruise in the Mediterranean. A large number of naval aides de camp, government departmental secretaries and railway officials surrounded the party. Beyond these there was an outcrop of detectives to protect the ministers from any undue attention on the part of militant suffragettes or their male supporters. Regular price 20c. 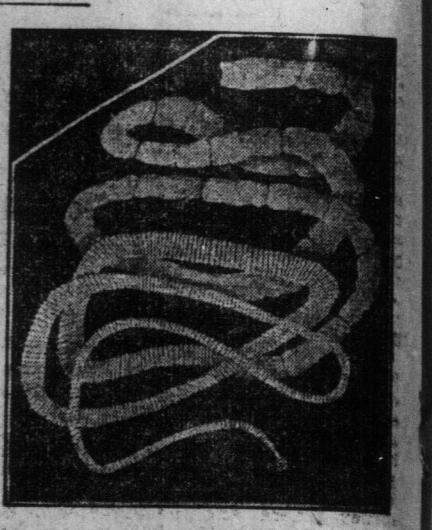
RETURNING WITH PIORKOWSKI CURE
Dr. W. J. Beattie Tells of Virtues of New Turtle Treatment.
STUDIED WITH STOERK
Claims That Tuberculosis in Early Stages Can Be Cured.

LONDON, May 10.—(Special Cable.)—Dr. William Johnston Beattie of Littleton, N. H., now staying at the Savoy Hotel, will sail for New York Saturday on the Steamship Mauretania with curative preparations for consumption discovered by Piorkowski of Berlin, in whose laboratory he has been studying for the past three months. To The P. D. C. World correspondent he gave this important statement as to what occurs on the injection of turtle bacilli into the human body, according to the theory of Prof. Paul Ehrlich of Frankfurt, one of the most famous medical scientists of today.
"Prof. Ehrlich's theory is known as the side-chain hypothesis and is in brief as follows:—
"Each cell of the body has a nucleus which is the centre of its life and function (purpose). Furthermore, each cell is provided with receptors, by means of which any poison taken into the body is seized upon and rendered inert. If the cell is loaded with toxins (poisons) it degenerates and finally dies. When a poison enters the body many new cells are formed and consequently the number of receptors is greatly increased.
"Quite harmless.
"When the turtle serum is injected cell reproduction goes on very rapidly and the new receptors take up the turtle serum elements as well as the toxins produced previously by the tuberculosis bacilli. In this way the poisons of tuberculosis are neutralized, the formation of receptors is abundant enough to neutralize all of the tubercle bacilli and their toxins than a cure results.
"The great advantage of the turtle preparations is that they are in so far as we now know, absolutely harmless."
Dr. Beattie went first to Vienna, where for three weeks he studied under Prof. Stoerk, who has a very high reputation as a pathologist. There he studied gross pathology, examining hundreds of lungs from persons who had died of tuberculosis. Then, proceeding to Berlin, he took special courses of diagnosis and therapy simultaneously with study in Piorkowski's laboratory.
Dr. Beattie showed to The P. D. C. World correspondent certificates given him by Piorkowski, Stoerk and Eisner. Also a certificate entitling him to practice medicine in the State of New York. Dr. Beattie said:
"I do not pose as a bacteriologist. That work has been independent of my other work. My specialty and my interest is to know something about tuberculosis in all its stages. I went to Berlin to study Piorkowski's treatment because of what I had heard and read and because I knew Berlin was the centre of diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis. The percentage of deaths from tuberculosis is less in Berlin than in any other city in the world. The late Prof. Koch is responsible for all this research. His book on tuberculosis is the most wonderful I have ever written.
"Piorkowski has been working out his cure for ten years. I hold a license from him to treat patients with his preparations, of which there are two; namely, turtle tubercle bacillus emulsion and turtle tubercle bacillus injection.
"Diagnosis in tuberculosis cases is all important, that is why I paid special attention to it while in Berlin. He meant working eighteen cubic centimetres of emulsion should be injected every four hours. A clinical chart is made which guides me when the dose is to be given and what quantity is to be used.
"It's not simply a question of pumping large doses into a patient. Each case must be judged individually according to the reaction indicated by the chart. In nearly every case I first inject the emulsion of a live culture. Afterwards, when the patient is better, I use a second preparation of a 'dead culture.'
"The best way is to commence with small doses. After an interval of eight or ten days a double dose is injected, and after further lapse of five or six days turtle tubercle bacillus is injected, this injection being repeated at intervals of eight or ten days. If no improvement is noticed after two or three weeks, one, two or three cubic centimetres of emulsion should be injected again. At most the emulsion should be used three times only."

BRIEF WIND-UP OF LEGISLATURE

Closing Session Not Marked by Anything of Spectacular Nature.

SPEECH FROM THRONE

Sir John Gibson Referred to Approach of His Retirement.

The Ontario Legislature prorogued yesterday afternoon amid the booming of artillery. Apart from these signs of formality and the salute of a small body of redcoats, the proceedings for the final wind-up of the year's session were brief and of an inconsequential nature.

Very few of the members rallied to witness the finishing touches. Two of the opposition, Messrs. N. W. Rowell and Wm. Freyfoot, alone were present and sat side by side with Allan Stedholme, the labor representative.

The government was proportionately little better in showing the premier, attorney-general and the minister of education representing the cabinet, and Messrs. W. D. McPherson, T. R. Whiteside, Sam Charters of Peel, Fattinson of Waterloo, McCowan and Godfrey of East and West York respectively, Dr. Preston, the whip, and Hon. Thos. Crawford appearing in the rank and file.

The address of the Lieutenant-governor was as follows: Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the legislative assembly: In relieving you of your legislative duties I desire to thank you for the attention and consideration you have given to the large number of measures brought before you in the course of a session of much importance and interest.

Our good wishes which have followed his royal highness the governor-general in his visit to the mother country will accompany him on his return to Canada, and in the meantime we earnestly pray that the health and strength of her royal highness may soon be completely restored.

It is a matter of congratulation and thankfulness that our people during the recent season have escaped flood calamities such as have overtaken our neighbors to the south.

In view of the satisfactory report submitted to you of what has been accomplished under the government's policy of development in a portion of Northern Ontario, there is every reason to expect similarly desirable results from the application of this policy to other sections of the new country.

By virtue of the act respecting the public operation of electric railways, municipalities desiring to secure local transportation facilities, where the general convenience calls for the same, will hereafter be able to avail themselves of the assistance of the Hydro-Electric Commission in the necessary preliminary stages, as well as in the carrying out of matured plans, or if preferred may operate such undertakings thru a public utilities commission.

General interest in the housing problem, as experienced in important centres, is calculated to be aroused by the legislation you have enacted on this subject. It is to be hoped that the co-operation of public-spirited citizens facilitated by this measure, will serve to diminish the danger to society of the congestion of population in the conditions that are unfavorable to the welfare of the community.

Amendments have been made to the Liquor License Act for the purpose of curtailing the hours during which intoxicants may be sold, and also to prohibit the sale in hotels of beverages not consumed on the premises.

Among the other important measures passed during the session now closing are those to provide for an eight-hour day for miners working underground; to amend the Marriage Act; to give effect to the recommendations of the assessment committee; to authorize the management of public utilities by commissions and to bring into operation the Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1914.

I commend to your consideration during the coming recess, as well as to that of all persons interested, the draft bill to provide for compensation to workmen for injuries, which has been submitted by the commissioner, in order that a measure may be enacted at your next session which will prove a lasting solution of this important question.

I thank you for the appropriations you have made for the public service and for carrying on the great activities my government have in hand, and I desire to assure you that these appropriations will be expended with a due regard to efficiency and economy.

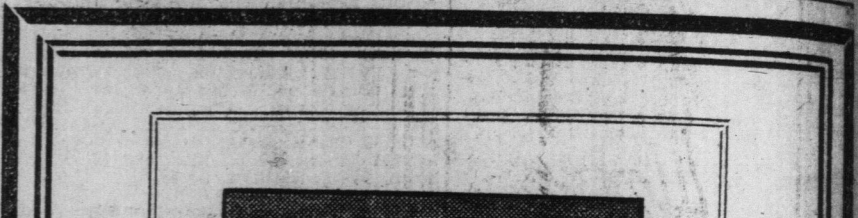
NEW GOVERNORS FOR UNIVERSITY. W. K. George, R. Home Smith, Eric Armour and C. A. Mitchell Appointed.

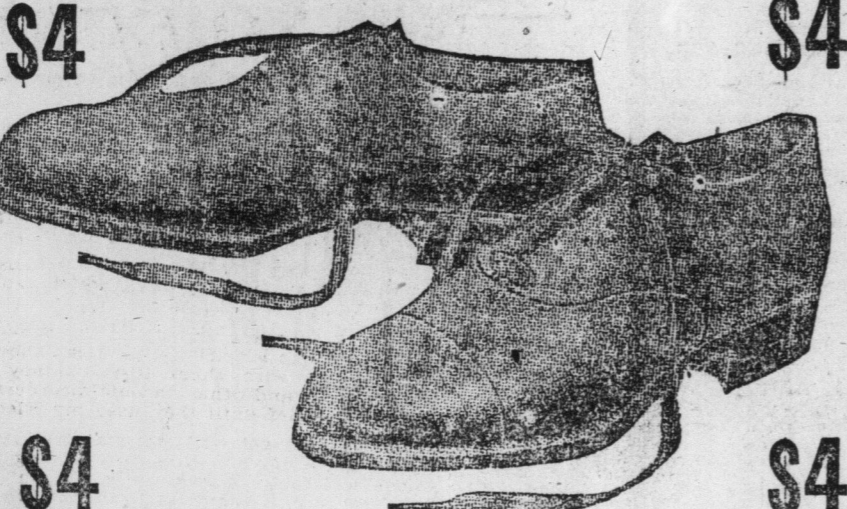

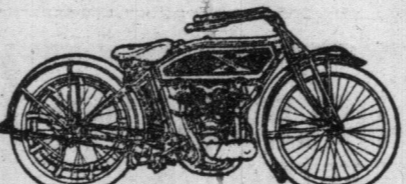

CANADIAN STOCKS ARE MARKING TIME

Toronto Exchange Seems to Be Waiting For Something to Turn Up.

BRAZILIAN THE LEADER

But General List Is in a Rut—Bread Bonds Down Again.

Speculative interest was almost lacking in the Toronto stock exchange yesterday, and the trading movement fell to its lowest level in some time. The dearth of activity was nothing more nor less than a reflection of the lethargic action of the New York and London markets. There were no new developments to engender enthusiasm, and even the floor traders viewed the action of the list with apathy, everyone apparently waiting like the renowned Mr. Wilkins Micawber, for something to turn up.

Brazilian was once again the only interesting spot, and even in this instance the price swing was more restricted than usual. The shares opened at a small decline of 94 3/4, and held between that figure and 95, closing unchanged for the session at the latter quotation. The only feature of the movement was the fact that in the afternoon board several big blocks of stock—over 550 shares—changed hands. Parties in close touch with the company were inclined to view the transfer as the passing of large Canadian holdings into European hands, the only material demand for the security being for London account. Meanwhile it was noted that the peg had been put in around the 95 mark, and that unless some new factor developed, the odds favored the stock hovering around that figure for the next few days at least.

In the general list alterations in prices were held within narrow limits. The first real demand in some days for St. Lawrence Navigation carried those shares up nearly three points to 125, but there was no news to account for the movement, which was set down as one of the vagaries of the market. Toronto Railway lost a fraction at 143, making a new low record for the week. Toronto Paper dipped below par during the morning, but made up its loss later on, and closed at 100 bid. Another downturn in the 6 per cent. bonds of Canada Bread, which sold at 8 1/2, fell off a full point, and their lowest since March, attracted some attention. Four months ago they were quoted at 94.

U. S. STEEL STOCK WIDELY SCATTERED

Over a Hundred Thousand Shareholders Shown on Books—Employs Hold Portion.

The books of the United States Steel Corporation, which were open for inspection at the last annual meeting, show that there are about 74,000 preferred shareholders and 44,000 common holders, a total of 118,000. Many individuals, banking houses, brokerage houses, etc., own both preferred and common stock. Making due allowance for this, there must be over 100,000 shareholders of record.

HEAVY FINANCING WILL BE NECESSARY

NEW YORK, May 9.—According to the estimate of The Journal of Commerce security issues of the aggregate value of \$30,124,226 matured during the next 8 months, as compared with \$105,270,100 in the same period of last year, of the total maturing railroads will be called upon to meet \$11,061,226. This will necessitate some very heavy financing.

BANKS ARE OPENING NEW BRANCHES

Steady Extension of Banking Facilities Thruout Dominion One Year's Record.

During the month of April the Canadian chartered banks opened 25 new branches and closed 4 old ones, making a net gain of 21, according to Houston's Bank Directory. Of the new offices, there were 11 in Quebec, 3 in Ontario, 3 in Saskatchewan, 2 in British Columbia, 2 in Alberta and 2 in Manitoba. Of those discontinued, there was one each in Ontario, Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia.

On the first of May the banks had 2968 branches, of which 2889 were located in the Dominion. This compared with a total of 2715, of which 2641 were in Canada, a year ago, or a net increase for the year of 253—truly a remarkable record, and one which must be accepted as a clear indication of the wonderful progress of the country.

OPPOSING VIEWS OF BULLS AND BEARS

Various Arguments Advanced in Relation to New York Stock Market.

In view of the present uncertainty in the New York stock market, the following resume of bull and bear arguments, compiled by Erickson Perkins & Co., should prove of interest.

Bull Points. 1. The crop outlook is better. 2. Current reform should put an end to the recurring troubles during the crop moving period. 3. Industry as a result of peace in the Balkans. 4. Bankers expect a big stimulation of industry as a result of peace in the Balkans.

FAVORABLE REPORT FROM PEARL LAKE

Official Statement Will Give Details of Recent Development at the Property.

The report of developments at the Pearl Lake Gold Mines property in Porcupine, now in course of preparation by Colonel Stevenson, managing director, promises to afford some very interesting figures. It will show that the shaft is rapidly approaching the 800 foot level, where a station will be cut to intercept the vein which has been opened up at 400 and 600 feet. BIG MARKET IS EXTREMELY DULL

Little Break, Little Rally, and Then Aspect of Mill Pond.

EVERYBODY'S WAITING

Neither Bulls Nor Bears Care to Risk Much Just Now.

NEW YORK, May 9.—After a slight depression in the early trading, followed by a recovery which put the European stocks and a few others a point above yesterday's close, the market came almost to a halt today. In one hour only 3000 shares were traded in the market as a whole was without importance and served merely to emphasize the lack of demand for securities and the reluctance of traders to take a definite position in the market at this time.

Failure of the market to respond to yesterday's brilliant crop report encouraged bear traders to put out new lines at the outset, but they were unable to bring out long stock and quickly reversed their position. The ease with which the market rallied indicated a strong undertone, but this apparently was due to nothing more than a sold out condition.

WILL SEGREGATE McENANEY SOON

Directors of the Crown Reserve Mining Company will meet in Cobalt early next week, and from there will go on to Porcupine to examine the course of development at the McEnaney property, of which the Crown Reserve owns control. FIVE-POINT RALLY IN TIMISK. SHARES

One-Time Favorite Moves With Some of Its Pristine Alacrity.

GENERAL LIST IS FIRM

North Dome Comes to Life Again—The Porcupine Power Situation.

A spectacular flurry in Timiskaming and restricted movements in some of the lesser lights of the list served to liven up the mining exchanges yesterday. The tone was somewhat firmer on the whole, the nothing like general improvement was manifested in the Porcupine.

The spurt in Timiskaming was inspired by the report that very high grade ore has been encountered at the 600 foot level of the mine. President Cartwright, who returned from Cobalt yesterday, was quoted as saying that the vein was five to six inches wide and that values ran around 9000 ounces to the ton. The shares opened at 33 1/2, jumped to 38, and then reacted to 35 under profit-taking. The close at 35 1/2 left a net gain of 2 points for the day.

North Dome, the Porcupine Company which the Timiskaming holds control, was dealt in for the first time in months. Sales were made at 40 and 45, a new low record. The previous trade was at 50 in February. Last year the stock brought as high as 85, but that was in the rainy days. Rumor had it that another strike had been made at the property, the details were lacking. The Porcupine despatches stated that the first unit of power from the Sandy Falls plant, which was shut down recently owing to damage in the flood, would be available within a day or two and would probably be taken by the Hollinger, which has a preferential contract. The Dome will get the power about a week later, and the McIntyre and McEnaney should be supplied in about the same time.

The gold stocks were quiet, with Jupiter at a new low for the month at 47, and the Hollinger back to 47 1/2 again. Dome Extension scored a smart rally, crossing 10, while Swastika and Pearl Lake were firm at their recent advances.

The general list of Cobalts held about unchanged. Gifford made a fractional advance, and Peterson Lake moved up to 22 again. Le Rose at 24 1/2, and Nipissing at \$8.90, were both higher.

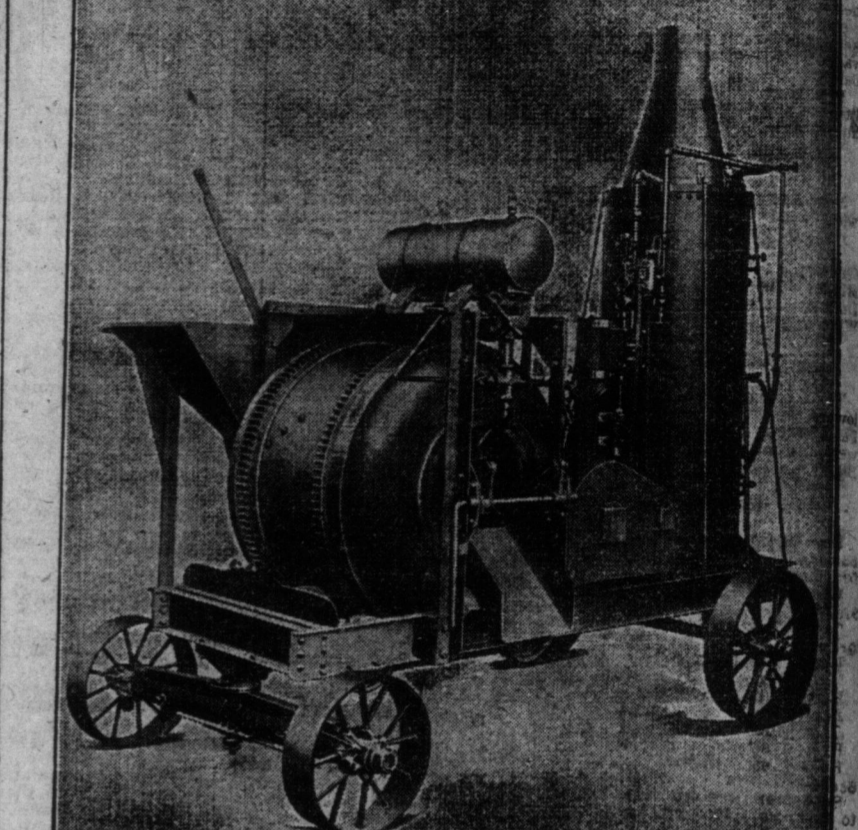
