





# MINUTES

#### OF THE

## COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION

OF THE

United Counties of Leeds and Grenville.

#### THIRD MEETING.

BROCKVILLE, November 11, 1872.

The Council met at two o'clock p.m.

The Warden in the Chair.

Members present—Messrs. Beecher, Carley, Cornett, Gallagher, Hicock, Hourigan, Keeler, Kernahan, McLean, McBratney, McCrea, McNish, Millar, Murphy, Rathwell, Shaver, Sheffield, Stafford, Taplin, Whelan and Wilson.

The Warden laid on the table,

1. Letter of Provincial Secretary respecting a new Registry Office for the County of Grenville.

2. Letter of the Principal of the Ontario Institute for the Deaf and Dumb.

3. Letter of Mr. Bigg, Inspector of Public Schools, respecting the new Normal School.

Mr. Taplin brought up the petition of David Mansell and others, respecting the High School at Farmersville.

Mr. McCrea moved, seconded by Mr. Beecher, that all papers and documents in the hands of the Clerk, or that may come into his hands during the present Session, be referred to the several committees to whom they belong. Carried.

Mr. McBratney moved, seconded by Mr. McCrea, that the Council do now adjourn until to-morrow at ten o'clock a.m. Carried.

The Council adjourned.

TUESDAY, November 12, 1872.

The Council met at ten o'clock a.m.

The Warden in the Chair.

Members present-Messrs. Beecher, Carley, Cornett, Cornwall,

Gallagher, Hieoek, Hourigan, Keeler, Kernahan, McLean, MeNish, Millar, McCrea. Murphy, McBratney, Rathwell, Read, Shaver, Sheffield, Stafford, Taplin, Whelau and Wilson.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Mr. Kernahan brought up the fourth report of the special conmittee on the new Registry Office for the County of Leeds, and the addition to the Gaol.

The Chairman of the standing committee on Finance brought up their first report.

Mr. Hicock moved, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that the first report of the committee on Finance be referred to a committee of the whole Carried. Council forthwith.

The Conncil in committee.

Mr. Whelen in the Chair.

The Council resumed.

The Chairman reported that the committee had risen and adopted the report.

Report received.

Mr. Taplin moved, seconded by Mr. Gallagher, that the report be concurred in by the Conncil. Carried.

Mr. Keeler moved, seconded by Mr. Millar, that the fourth report of the building committee on the Gaol and Registry Office be referred to a committee of the whole Council forthwith. Carried.

The Council in Committee.

Mr. Keeler in the Chair.

The Council resumed.

The Chairman reported that the committee had risen and made some progress, and asked to sit again.

Report received, and leave granted to sit again to-morrow at eleven o'cloek a.m.

Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. Keeler, that the Warden be authorized to instruct the Chairman of the special committee on Gaol and Registry Office to telegraph to Cobourg and learn if Mr. Smith, the Inspector of Registry Offices, is returned from England. Carried.

Mr. Gallagher moved, seconded by Mr. Whelan, that the Council do adjourn to meet at the hour of two o'clock p.m. Carried.

The Council adjourned.

The Council met at two o'clock p.m.

Mr. Millar moved, seconded by Mr. Murphy, that the sum of two hundred dollars be granted the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh for the purpose of cribbing and otherwise protecting the banks of the river St. Lawrence in the bay above Wright's Point. Lost.

Mr. Hicock moved, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that the property in Edwardsburgh known as the Johnstovan property be sold to the municipal Council of Edwardsburgh for the sum of two hundred dollars, clear of all expenses to the Counties, if the Council has the power to dispose of the same.

Mr. Whelan, in amendment moved, seconded by Mr. Stafford, that the Warden be instructed to dispose of the Johnstown property and place proceeds in Counties' treasury, if the Council has power to dispose of it. Carried.

The original motion as amended was then adopted.

Mr. McBratney moved, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that a special committee be appointed to examine and report to the Council what amendments, if any, are necessary in the law respecting joint stock, companies for the construction of roads, 31st Vic., chapter 31, said committee to consist of Messrs. Taplin, Hicock, W Ison, McCrea, Millar, Cornwall and the mover. Carried.

Mr. Cornett moved, seeonded by Mr. Whelan, that the Council do now adjourn to ten of the clock to-morrow morning. Carried.

The Conncil adjourned.

# WEDNESDAY, November 13, 1872.

The Warden laid on the table a copy of the telegram to the Inspector of Registry Offices, and his answer thereto.

The Chairman of the special committee appointed to examine and report what alterations are necessary in the law respecting joint stock road companies, brought up their report.

And on the question of concurrence therein, Mr. Keeler moved, seconded by Mr. Millar, that the said second resolution be not concurred in, but be amended by inserting the "United Counties of Leeds and Grenville" instead of the "Town of Brockville."

Hon. Sidney Smith, Inspector of Registry Officer has intimated to this Council his inability to come here during this session of the Council to accept the new Registry Office, (which is now complete) from the hands of the contractor, and whereas it is absolutely necessary for some person to have charge of the building and keep a moderate fire therein to dry the arches and walls thereof, therefore resolved, that John Gordon, contractor, is hereby authorized to take eharge of the new Registry Office and keep a moderate fire therein, for which he shall be paid the sum of two dollars per week until the said Inspector accepts of the building. Carried.

Mr. Wolfe moved, seconded by Mr. Millar, that the Clerk prepare a By-law relieving the special committee appointed under By-law No. 370, passed 23rd June, 1871, to superintend the alterations to the Gaol and building new Registry Office. Carried.

Mr. Whelan moved, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that all the members of the Council who are present this day be allowed pay for yesterday, the Council having adjourned in consequence of its being a holiday by proclamation. Carried.

Mr. Cornett moved, seconded by Mr. Read, that the non-commissioned officers and men of the volunteer companies who performed their annual drill at Prescott in June last, consisting of the following companies, that is, the Gananoque Rifles and Artillery, Lansdowne, Frankville, Merrickville, North Augusta, Burritt's Rapids, Kemptville and Spencerville companies shall be paid by these United Counties twenty-five cents per day each man, additional pay for their time while performing said drill, on certificate of the captains of each company that they performed said drill Lost.

Mr. Sheffield moved, seconded by Mr. Rathwell, that a special committee be appointed to purchase a site for a new Registry Office for the County of Grenville, to be approved of by the Lieut.-Governor, said committee to be composed of Messrs. Millar, Keeler and Wilson. Carried.

The Warden laid on the table letter of D. Wylie, asking \$50 on account of his contract for advertising and printing.

Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. Rathwell, that Messrs. J. K. Read and Charles Cornwall be allowed pay for the first day of this session, having been delayed by the G. T. train. Carried.

Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. Millar, that John Goldon,

caretaker of the new Registry Office, be allowed to take wood from the stock provided for the use of the Court House and Gaol to make fires in the new Registry Office during the coming winter. Carried.

Mr. Wolfe moved, seconded by Mr. McBratney, that the special committee appointed to select a site for the new Registry Office for County of Grenville be authorized to procure plans and specifications from Government for the same, and to report to this Oouncil at the next session. Carried.

Mr. Sheffield moved, seconded by Mr. Cornett, that Mr. Legge be allowed pay for Tuesday, he being delayed through the irregularity of the Grand Trunk. Carried.

Mr. McBratney moved, seconded by Mr. Legge, that a committee be appointed to investigate the appeal or complaint of David Mullen and Archibald Cole against a certain By-law passed by the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Kitley on the twenty-fourth day of December, A.D. 1861, for the purpose of dissolving the union between school section number twenty, in the Towhship of Kitley, and No. 26, in the Township of Elizabethtown, and for removing the rateable property of the inhabitants of said school section number twenty and annexing the same to school section number thirteen, in the Township of Kitley, and to confirm or disallow the said By-law pursuant to the sixteenth section of the Act 34 Vic., chapter 33, of the Legislature of this Province, and that the said committee consist of Richard Farmar Steele, Judge of the County Court of these Counties, William R. Bigg, County Inspector, and William Stafford. Carried.

Mr. McBratney moved, seconded by Mr. McNish, that leave be given to introduce a By-law to appoint a special committee for the purposes therein mentioned. Carried.

The By-law was read a first time.

The By-law was passed and signed by the Warden and Clerk.

Mr. Legge moved, seconded by Mr. Stafford, that the thanks of this Council are due and are hereby accorded to Richard Preston, Esq., the Warden of these United Counties, for the efficient and courteous manner he has presided over the Council for the past year. Carried.

Mr. McBratney moved, seconded by Mr. Legge, that the Conncil do hereby return their unanimous thanks to Mr. Jessup, Counties' Clerk, for the very efficient manner in which he has always discharged his duties, and for the very courtcous manner in which he treats Councillors and others having intercourse with him. Carried.

Mr. Cornett moved, seconded by Mr. Stafford, that the proceedings of this day's meeting be now read, and if found correct be approved of. Carried.

The minutes were read and approved.

Mr. Stafford moved, seconded by Mr. Rathwell, that the Council do now adjourn. Carried. The Council adjourned.

# APPENDIX

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# NOVEMBER MEETING, 1872.

The special committee appointed by the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville under By-law No. 370, dated the 23rd June, 1871, to superintend the building of an addition to the Gaol at Brockville and the crection of a Registry Office for the County of Leeds, beg leave to make this their fourth report.

#### ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO THE GAOL.

The work on this building is now completed according to contract, to the satisfaction of your committee and also of the Inspector of Prisons, and the balance due to the contractor of \$500 has been paid, making in all the sum of \$5500, as agreed.

By some oversight the amount of \$320 for extra work done and recommended for payment in the committee's last report has not been paid, and the contractor complains of the delay.

#### REGISTRY OFFICE FOR LEEDS.

This building is now completed, and your committee advised the Hon. S. Smith, the Inspector of Registry Offices, of the fact, and requesting him to name a time when it would be convenient for him to inspect the building previous to its acceptance from the contractor, according to the condition of the Government's printed specification.

The reply received thereto accompanies this report, wherein the committee were informed that Mr. Smith was then in England, but expected to return shortly if his health would permit.

The drain ordered by the Inspector on his visit in June last, and sanctioned by the Council at their last meeting, to be made on the East end and Sonth side of the building has been done, and your committee recommend the payment of the contract price for the work of \$300.

Your committee have had before them an account of John Gordon for extra work done, amounting to the sum of \$170, which they recommend should be paid.

The first item of \$150 is for additional footings to the foundation walls, arising from the position of the ground where the building is erected, it being necessary to raise the wall sufficiently high above the ground to avoid damp. The other items of \$20 is for four additional iron frames to strengthen inside doors, and ordered by the Inspector, S. Smith, Esq.

The amount paid to the contractor up to date of the report

upon the contract for Registry Office is \$5,750, leaving a balance due on the work done of \$250.

Your committee request instructions from the Council as to what party they should hand over the custody of the building when approved of by the Inspector.

In said communication reference is made to a circular issued by the Inspector of Asylums and Prisons, which your committee would recommend to each member of the Council to circulate the information therein contained throughout the various municipalities which they represent, so that the very liberal offer of the Government may be taken advantage of as much as possible. The Government circular is as follows :—

"The Government having had under consideration the desirability of reducing the rate of all pupils sent by various municipalities to the Ontario Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, have pleasure in informing you that from the opening of the ensuing session, Municipal Corporations will only be charged one dollar per week for the board of pupils whose parents or guardians are unable to pay for the same.

"This reduction in the rate of board is authorized by the Government for the purpose of enabling the institution to accomplish to the fullest extent the object for which it was founded, viz., that every deaf mute of school age in the Province might be placed under instruction. It is most sincerely hoped that all municipalities having deaft mute children within their limits will heartily co-operate with the Government in endeavoring to bring about this most desired result, and that the greatest promptitude and liberality will be shown by them in seeking out and sending forward pupils at the opening of the next session, on the 4th September, 1872."

## To His Excellency the Honourable William P. Howland, C. B., Lieut.-Governor of the Province of Ontario, in Council:

The petition of the Council of the Corporation of the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville humbly sheweth,

That the Eastern section of this Province is sadly in need of a Normal School, and that your Excellency's advisers being convinced thereof, have decided in recommending the erection of the necessary buildings.

That your petitioners request that Brockville may be selected for the site of the said Normal School, for the following reasons :

1. The Eastern section of Ontario may be assumed as lying to the East of the County of Hastings, and Brockville is almost exactly central between Prince Edward and Glengarry Counties, the Western and Eastern Counties respectively, while Renfrew, Lanark, and Carleton radiate around it from North-west to North-East.

2. If population be a test Brockville is also the centre, thus, on the West we have Prince Edward, Lennox, Addington, and Frontenac with a population of 65,378, and on the East, Russell, Prescott, Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry with a population of 66,975, while the Northern Counties of Renfrew, Lanark and Carleton furnish 72,186, and at the same time the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, in which Brockville is situated, contains a population of nearly 60,000.

3. Brockville is the only town in the Eastern section accessible from all parts by a single line of railway, being connected to the East and West by the Grand Trunk, and to the North by the Brockville and Ottawa and Canada Central.

4. In a sanitary point of view Brockville has no competers, a great desideratum to students, who can there breathe pure air and find plenty of exercise in rowing among the Thousand Isles of the St. Lawrence.

5. A site could be procured in Brockville at less expense than at

Kingston or Ottawa, while board or lodging for students would also be procured at less cost.

6. The large school population of the town would also afford every facility for furnishing an ample supply of pupils for the Model School Department of the Normal Institution.

That for the foregoing reasons we trust that your Excellency's advisers will decide on recommending Brockville as the most suitable locality for the site of the *I* istern Normal School.

And your petitioners, as in duty bound, ill ever pray.

T' it your petitioners are of opinion that such persons should be required to keep the road so purchased by them in the same state of repair as the Joint Stock Company would have been obliged to do while tolls were being taken upon the said Roads, had such sale and purchase not have been made, and be subject to the same restrictions, obligations and liabilities as the Company would have been if such road had not been sold, and that the obligations of such eompany and of such person or persons should be further extended.

Your petitionors therefore pray that your Excellency may be pleased to cause an Act to be passed by the Legislature of this Province, amending the said Acts in such manner as to provide that when any such company or any person or persons so purchasing such road as aforesaid, neglect to keep the same in good and sufficient repair, such company or such person or persons shall, after the lapse of such reasonable time as may be fixed upon, and after due enquiry made under the direction of the County Judge, forfeit such road and all claims thereto, and all claim for any moneys therefore expended therefor or thereon, and that such road shall become the property of the local Municipality or Municipalities within which it or part of it is situace.
