THE GREAT TAIL SMELTER

Its Importance to the Mine Owners There.

IT SAVES TRANSPORTATION

Cost of Taking Ore to Tacoma is Now Over Five Dollars a Ton.

Something New About a Prospector's Outfit—Edison Makes Steel by Electricity—Decision as to Jumping Claims—Dr. Shumann Makes a Report on Sudbury Property—Lost Opportunities—A Bath Tub Placer Mine—General Mining News

The question of the construction of smelters in or near Trail Creek is fraught with tremendous importance to the mine owners of that region. At present most of the Rossland ores are sent to distant points like Tacoma, East Helena and Everett for treatment. The cost of the transportation of the ores to such distances is from five to six dollars a ton, and therefore with the present reduction facilities Rossland ore that does not average something like \$18 or \$20 to the ton does not pay.

Take the present freight to and treatment at Tacoma. The total is \$10, but \$5.50 of this is absorbed in transportation charges, the smelter getting the remaining \$4.50.

As is generally known the locating of the smelter plants must depend somewhat upon the convenience of fuel supplies and the accessibility of the complementary ores. As to the question of fuel one point in the west seems to be as well favored as any other, and this is the fact that the coal continues until such time as the construction of the Crow's Nest Railway and other lines makes the great coal beds more directly tributary to the Kootenays.

As to the accessibility, however, of complementary areas various points claim to stand first, and on these grounds several smelters are already projected. Spokane, it is said, is to have one, and Northport besides, while the plans for the construction of a plant on the Maid of Erin property right in Rossland camp are in course of being drawn up.

The projectors of the Northport smelter claim that they can treat the Rossland ores at the same cost as do the Tacoma and East Helena plants, and this will mean a saving in transportation of at least \$4 a ton.

The promoters of the Maid of Erin smelter say they will be able to treat the ore of the camp at \$7.50 per ton, which would mean that \$10 ore would be mined at a profit, and Rossland has already in eight millions of tons of \$12 and \$15 ore. If this saving is carried out Rossland will at once jump to the front as the greatest mining camp in the world.

ACTUAL PROSPECTOR'S OUTFIT.

Correspondent Corresponds to Mr. Herriott's List of Field Requirements.

Editor World: Re "Prospectors' Outfit" in Monday's issue (you again call attention to it in this morning's issue), you don't say where said prospector is going to search for gold, whether in South Africa or British Columbia. As I am not acquainted with the lay of the land in those places, I have not anything about them, but if one is going to prospect in Western Ontario, then I can say that the outfit he needs on the third day of packing the outfit he describes he would take out the pestle and mortar stone, mauling block and pan, "plant" the balance of the outfit and wish he had taken more flour and pork. I have in my outfit a dried apple, pepper, salt, matches, soap, twinning, tin cups, plates, knives and forks, frying pan, two knives, they have something else to bake bread, two or more tin pans, big knife, and a good supply of grit and muscle, a knowledge of mineralogy and a hide impervious to black flies and mosquitoes, may enable them to swear and tear up roots and moss and possibly find gold while out prospecting in Western Ontario, as did Quartz, Toronto, Jan. 6, 1897.

EDISON MAKES STEEL.

When Thomas A. Edison began experimenting with electricity as a means of extracting iron oxide from rock a shiver ran through the spinal column of iron mine owners. When the matter was forgotten and the public heard nothing more of magnetic separators until a few days ago when the news came out that the method was not only perfected, but that by it 5000 tons of bessemer steel were being turned out every day at Edison, N.J. Mr. Edison has been developing his news, and works quietly, and now his smelting works and their appurtenant buildings cover many acres among the Jersey mountains. The rock is blasted out and carried to the enormous electric cranes to rollers which crush the largest pieces of magnetic separators into a series of these rollers the fine rock falls past 70 magnets, which extract the iron, sending it along to the furnaces almost free of extraneous matter. From the furnaces the ore issues in nuggets of bessemer steel ready for the mills.

JUMPING CLAIMS.


