## SANTIAGO STANDS YET Americans are All Ready But are Hesitating For Some Reason.

### GEN. SHAFTER HAS REMOVED TO THE LAND

Some Quarters It is Reported That the Grand Attack  
Has Been Deferred Till Monday—A Spanish Report Says  
They Have Been Defeated—British Consul Gollan  
Charged With Being Pro-Spanish—War News Generally.

**WAR NEWS PARAGRAPHED.**

It is stated that Captain-General Augusti has renewed his request for permission to promise the Philippine insurgents extended reforms. The threatened bombardment of Spanish ports by the American national character.

It is stated that there are 100 German subjects in Manila. Major-General Shafter has decided to establish his headquarters in the field, occupying a tent with Gen. Wheeler until a permanent location is decided upon.

The second Manila expedition was sighted on June 23, by the steamer Alameda, 45 miles this side of Honolulu.

The Spanish fleet at Port Said has not yet sailed, and it is reported that Admiral Camara is awaiting the arrival of transports with coal.

Three Spanish trans-Atlantic steamers have left Cadiz for Porto Rico, on an "important mission," carrying large quantities of stores, coal and ammunition.

London Despatches to the effect that the United States has purchased five vessels from the Wilson's and Furness-Leighton lines are denied at Washington.

The Navy Department as yet has received no word in reference to the sinking of the Brooklyn.

General Wheeler has sent to Major-General Shafter his official report of the battle of Siboney.

An American cruiser is continuously firing upon the Spanish steamer Antonio Lopez, stranded at Porto Rico.

A Madrid despatch says: Serious resistance must be expected by an American fleet at Ferrol, Cádiz, Corunna, Algeciras, Ceuta, Barcelona and Cartagena, both from fortifications and mines. Torpedoes have been prepared and carefully planted at these points in the last two months. Spain has also about twenty torpedo boats manned by trained crews.

## PEACE PROPOSALS

Uncle Sam Has Been Approached,  
But Will Treat Only With  
Spain.

New York, June 30.—(Special to the Toronto World.)—A Washington special to the World says the Government has been approached in an unofficial way with regard to terms of peace with Spain, by the emissaries of France and Austria, and sounded in other ways, with a view to learning what demands the United States might make. But Secretary Day has absolutely refused to deal with all such questions, and emphatically declines to treat, except with Spain. The President insists that no proposition will be considered unless made directly by the Madrid Government. A Continental Ambassador to the World correspondent that, according to diplomatic usage and precedent, the United States is already virtually in possession of Cuba and Porto Rico, and the Philippines, and would be so considered in effecting a settlement.

## Soreness in Regard to Gollan.

New York, June 30.—(Special to the Toronto World.)—A Key West special to the Journal says further evidence of the strong pro-Spanish feeling of British Consul-General Gollan of Havana are forthcoming. Charles Todd, an English resident of Cuba, and a member of a well-known Havana banking house, who has arrived here, states that Gollan gave passage to a Spanish vessel, the British warship Talbot, under former Mendez, private secretary to Blanco, former prime minister. Mendez was passed off as a British refugee. He carried important despatches for Madrid, and such a measure for deposit in Kingston. ## BRITAIN SYMPATHIZES WITH UNCLE SAM.

United States Actuated in the Present War by "Elevated  
Philanthropy"—German Emperor Determined to Have a  
Finger in the Pie—Only Held Back From Trouble by the  
Imperial Chancellor and Baron Von Buelow.

London, June 30.—Though on casual reading the Marquis of Salisbury's speech at the United Club last night seems to have been an attempt to carry water on both shoulders, the diplomatic body here construes it as a pronouncement of Great Britain's partiality.

There is no doubt the Premier intended his remarks as a hint to the powers that Great Britain is in sympathy with the United States, and the intimation to that effect was called forth by Germany's alleged attitude in the question of the Philippine Islands. The declaration that the United States is animated in the present war by the highest philanthropy is the passage upon which stress is laid, and many people find a connection between the Premier's speech and the recent visit of Col. John Hay, the United States Ambassador, who again conferred with the Marquis of Salisbury yesterday.

In the course of another visit to-day, Col. Hay officially informed the Marquis of Salisbury of the blockade of the southern coast of Cuba.

### NEWFOUNDLAND MATTERS.

#### First Train Over the Transatlantic Railway—Tri-Weekly Connection With the Continent.

St. John's, Nfld., June 30.—The Newfoundland Transatlantic Railway is completed and the first through train across the continent left St. John's for the eastern terminus last night, arriving at Port Aux Basques, the western terminus, covering the distance of 543 miles in 24 hours. At Port Aux Basques the fast ferry steamer Bruce, with a speed of 17 knots, takes passengers aboard for Sydney, C.B., landing there in six hours and connecting with the railway systems of Canada and the United States. This service gives Newfoundland a direct weekly connection with the American continent.

ward of the army is getting its way. Engineers are at work leveling the track and filling pits while a large force of regulars and volunteers with axes, aided by Cubans with machetes, are hacking down trees and clearing out the brush. A few light guns have already reached this port, but the siege guns are not yet within five miles of the vanguard.

### Shafter With Wheeler.

General Shafter left his ship to-day and took up his quarters with General Wheeler at the front. His appearance there gave rise to the rumor that an attack on Santiago would occur to-morrow, but the staff officers to-night say it is impossible to get the army in shape to strike a blow for several days.

About 2000 troops are camped four miles east of the besieged city, and the remainder of the forces stretch along the road from there to Juraguá and Baiquiri. The advance forces are in a semi-circle, the left flank resting about two miles from the sea, under the command of General Chaffee, with the extreme right, under the command of Col. Miles, about a mile to the northwest. Beginning with the 12th Infantry, at the extreme left, the 7th, 17th, 4th, 23d and 10th Infantry extend to the right in the order named. Beyond them picket lines are established three-quarters of a mile nearer, Santiago City being in plain sight of General Chaffee's and Col. Miles' troops.

Much amusement has been caused among the officers by the large number of Red Cross flags flying from buildings in Santiago. Seven such flags could be counted from the largest and most prominent buildings, and other officers say the Spanish soldiers evidently intend to protect every place in the city offering a good mark for the American artillery.

### Word was received by Rear Admiral Sampson to-day that the Spanish supply boat, Pausimma Concepcion, which escaped from Zamataa recently, has arrived safely at Tunas, the port of Sancti Spiritus, on the southern coast of the Province of Santa Clara. The naval officers here are much chagrined at the fact that the steamer got away.

### OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT.

#### Camara Must Stop Coaling and Get Away From Port Said at Once.

Cairo, June 30.—The following official announcement was sent this afternoon: The Spanish warships at Port Said began coaling from their own coaling, which arrived from Spain. The Egyptian Government have notified them that they could not allow this, and that they must stop coaling at once. The Spanish ships at Port Said, as the 24 hours' limit had been greatly exceeded, the Spaniards then stated that their ships wanted repairs, and began discharging coal and other material in order to repair.

### The Lopez is Past Recovery.

Madrid, June 30.—(2 p.m.)—The Governor-General of Porto Rico cables that it will be difficult to save the cargo of the Spanish steamer Antonio Lopez, which was run ashore at San Juan, near the entrance of the harbor of San Juan de Porto Rico, to the coast of the United States auxiliary cruiser St. Louis and St. Paul, which prevented her from landing a cargo of provisions and war material. He explained his inability to save the steamer's cargo by the fact, as alleged, that an American cruiser is continuously firing upon the stranded vessel.

### Germany's Interest in the Philippine Islands.

New York, June 30.—A despatch to The World from Berlin says: The World correspondent reports, on the best authority, that Admiral Diederichs, in command of the German fleet in Asiatic waters, will not act alone at Manila. His instructions are to do nothing without the consent of Admiral Dewey and the concurrence of other foreign commanders. Yet private despatches from Madrid report that the Spanish authorities and the populace at Manila place their whole hope on Admiral Diederichs. They confidently believe that he will permit a bombardment.

### Alarm at Madrid.

New York, June 30.—A despatch to The World from Madrid says: The rumored coming of an American fleet to the Peninsula has caused alarm, although the authorities try to conceal the fact. The peace party is gaining ground daily in the middle and working classes, particularly in the provinces. The authorities at Barcelona report imposing demonstrations and manifestoes by the Chamber of Commerce, Economical Societies, trades unions, employers of labor, wine growers and even the shipping and banking interests. The same sentiment is strong in Andalusia, Biscay, Arragon and Castile.

### A PROSPEROUS INSTITUTION.

Sisters of St. Joseph at London Purchase More Property.

London, June 30.—It is understood that the late at the corner of Waterloo and Piccadilly-streets was purchased by Mr. P. Mulken on behalf of the Sisters of St. Joseph. At present the Sisters of St. Joseph reside at Mt. Hope, but owing to the growth of that institution, it has been decided to build a convent for them on the site purchased and devote the Mt. Hope buildings entirely to an orphanage and shelter.

### MISTRUST THE AMERICANS.

### The Feeling in Germany and France Decidedly Hostile

But in England the Sentiment is Most Friendly—Anglo-American Alliance Dreaded by Continental Europe—Mr. Dewey Intervened After His Return From Abroad.

New York, June 30.—Dr. Chauncy M. Dewey arrived from Europe on the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse to-day. He looked the picture of health and was welcomed home by a tug load of prominent men.

During his absence, Dr. Dewey spent considerable time in France. He said the sentiment there was more bitter against this country. Every paper in the city of Paris, except three important ones, published articles right along, showing the greatest hostility. It is believed there that the object of the United States in beginning the war was extension of her territory, or imperial extension. The same opinion, he declared, seems to prevail in Germany. In England there is a complete reverse of sentiment. Six weeks time has changed the feelings of 60 years and all animosities have been buried by the tide of sympathy and universal approval and feeling of relationship which is binding against the world.

### Dr. Dewey further said that in England everywhere, classes and masses, rich and poor, are with us; on the Continent, in bitter hostility or indifference. The French newspapers are all with Spain, except three. Every morning the Quaker who has been the Regent president, who held to-day. The ministers decline to furnish any information beyond saying that they discussed the war.

### Anglo-American Alliance Dreaded.

"The rest of Europe is anxiously watching the apprehended entrance of the United States in their circle in the east. Their position is one of distrust. The other powers are trying to solve the problem of influence upon their interests of that Anglo-American alliance, which they think either exists or is inevitable. Even if restrained by the belief that any movement in the direction would participate an alliance with England. Their newspapers discuss our unpreparedness for war, the impossibility of our becoming a military power until we have a large standing army and universal compulsory military service."

### English statesmen whom I have met all said: Keep the Philippines, share with us China and open ports in the east. One said: You must join the concert of European nations. It is expensive, but you cannot be an eastern power unless you belong to the band. Our interests will always be identical and the mutual benefit incalculable. They quit us good-naturedly on our pretensions of pure sentiment in this war, and say: 'Yes, that is the way we always get it, you know, and we give the beggars liberty, law, order and justice, which they never had before. It's in your blood. You have come by it honestly. You have aroused the appetite of earth hunger and you cannot stop.'"

Paris, June 30.—After announcing the Cabinet's firm intention to carry out the Democratic desire that the people have expressed during the recent elections, M. Brisson said the Government proposed two principal reforms, fiscal and social, the

### GUILLEMAIN SCORES A POINT

His Confession Not Allowed to be Submitted as Evidence.

### Theory of Defence, That La Plante Was Killed by a Blow From a Carriage Shaft Knocked Out—Prisoner's Suspicious Actions on the Night of the Murder.

St. Hyacinthe, Que., June 30.—Jean Baptiste Guillemain gained a signal advantage yesterday when Judge Toller, on a point raised by the defence, rejected the attempt of the Crown to submit as evidence the alleged confession made at St. L'Abbe. The court held that the police had offered what is known in legal parlance as an "inducement" before getting a quasi-prisoner to compromise himself. The alleged undue influence was comprised in the Crown Attorney's instructions to Chief of Police Chennette to treat him well. Guillemain's triumph may be short-lived. Before the court adjourned yesterday afternoon Mr. J. B. Blanchette, the Crown prosecutor, gave notice of an appeal. The motion was argued to-day. If the judge grants it, the appeal will be referred to the Court of Appeals, Montreal. If the judge decides in the negative the matter ends there, and no further possibility for the confession can arise.

### Mrs. La Plante Recalled.

Madame La Plante was recalled and said she had been unable to find the letter written by her brother-in-law, Louis La Plante, in Fall River, to her late husband, asking him to collect a \$1200 debt in St. Hyacinthe. The letter in question was read in the presence of Guillemain the day before yesterday. Her husband on his way to St. Hyacinthe, had called on Touche, the party who owed the money to the Fall River broker.

Mr. Bourque then cross-examined the witness respecting the happenings of the La Plante house on the afternoon and evening of the tragedy. Shortly before 6 o'clock her husband called to the second time, and Madame La Plante had made repeated unsuccessful attempts to get Guillemain to go for the horses. Finally Guillemain went and returned about a quarter to 7 o'clock. He said he could not find the animals. It was soon afterwards that Guillemain lighting her husband's pipe, a second time, Guillemain got back to the house on the last train before 7 o'clock; her little boy entering the house said the horses were in the stable. Madame La Plante, who had been lying on her bed, rose about 7 o'clock and raising the curtain watched for a sign of her husband. Mr. Pierre came with the news that a man was lying on the road outside. In cross-examination she admitted that in the statement after the murder she may have made statements that she would not now consider absolutely correct. The witness said Guillemain left for Biddeford before 12 o'clock. Mr. St. Jean had told Guillemain before his departure not to leave. She admitted having, under all the circumstances, asked Guillemain to remain at her house. The fatal night La Pierre called and asked for a lantern she had a very faint notion that her husband had not yet returned. She swore that she then asked Guillemain to go out and see what was the matter, but he refused to budge. It was her little son who rushed back to the house with the news that her husband was dead.

### Law Firm Reorganized.

The lamented death of the late D'Alton McCarthy has caused a re-organization in the influential firm of which he was the head. The change, however, consists only in the addition of Mr. Charles S. MacLachlan and Mr. F. B. Osler, two old members of the office staff, to the firm, and the personal management of the firm, and his son, John H. McCarthy, D'Alton McCarthy, Charles S. MacLachlan and F. B. Osler. The firm was reorganized yesterday.

### General Moore Honored.

Quebec, June 30.—General Montgomery Moore, who sailed for England by the Albatross Line steamer California to-night, was entertained last evening at dinner at the Citadel by the commandant and officers of the R.C.A. and R.A.

### Rapid Postal Delivery To-Day.

Dominion Day, 1898, will see a novelty introduced in the postoffice delivery of Canada. The new idea is for an immediate delivery of letters on which a test-cent postage stamp will be attached, so that when it arrives at the city postoffice it will be forwarded to its destination. The city postoffice officials have appointed a man for this work, who will be equipped with a bicycle and will start to work to-day. None of these stamps have been put on sale in the city as yet, but in other places the sale commenced yesterday. If occasion requires, more bicycle liveries will be added.

### Additional House Doctor.

The Board of the Sick Children's Hospital have decided to have a staff of house doctors of three instead of only two as formerly. Yesterday Dr. Ashton of Bradford, arrived, and two more will come to-day.

### Suspicious Actions of Guillemain.

Vivante Berthelme, the 19-year-old niece of La Plante, followed. She said she lived a short distance away. Late in the afternoon she visited her aunt. After dark Madame La Plante asked Guillemain to go for the animals in the field. For some reason she was accused of delayed. He was accompanied by Donat La Plante. The witness thought nothing at the time of Guillemain's tardiness, but subsequently, in view of certain rumors, the circumstances made a bad impression on her mind. Miss Berthelme also testified that Guillemain refused the request of his aunt to go and find out who was lying on the road near the house. When the identity of the dead man was established, Guillemain started off with Hornidas La Pierre to notify the Berthelmes.

### The Doctor's Testimony.

Dr. Dillon Berthelme of St. L'Abbe, said he was hastily summoned by George Nadeau, who brought news that J. B. La Plante had been found on the roadway near the La Plante dwelling. The body was in the same spot when he reached the scene. Blood covered the features so as to make them almost unrecognizable. The doctor examined the roadway, but failed to find any fresh carriage tracks near the body. He at once came to the conclusion that a murder had been committed. Continuing examination for the purpose of securing evidence submitted the result of a medical examination. The skull at the back of the head was fractured. In his opinion, caused death. In addition there were bruises on the face. When he arrived La Plante's body was still warm. In searching the clothing he struck by the pole shaft of the Bloueuwe or the blow of a carriage shaft.
