ANOTHER WHITE ELEPHANT ON OUR HANDS.

In the face of the City Hall White Elephant, the St. Lawrence Market, the Council and other similar blunders, the Council yesterday deliberately committed the city to another deal which bids fair to eclipse even these enterprises in extravagance and jobbery. If the Council had learned the lesson of the City Hall and St. Lawrence Market blunders, it would never have consented to the expenditure of a dollar toward the erection of a Technical School until it had received trustworthy information as to the ultimate cost. As it stands now the Council has agreed to purchase the Athletic Club building without having any definite and reliable knowledge as to what sum it will cost to transform the building into a suitable for the Technical School. It may cost twenty dollars, it may cost one hundred thousand or two or three times that sum. No one knows. There is no assurance that the building can be remodelled at all. All is uncertainty, except the fact that the city is committing itself to \$20,000 in the acquisition of a sum to start and that it is bound to go through with the undertaking, cost what it may. Our course in regard to the erection of a Technical School was plain. The Council should have had plans prepared of the building that was required. Tenders should have been called for. First for the conversion of the Athletic Club into such a building, and (2) for the erection of an entirely new structure. With this information before it the Council would have had something tangible before it. By its action of yesterday the Council has saddled upon its successor what a monstrous burden it is now in our minds that any sane man would accept. There is no excuse whatever for the indecency with which the Council has rushed this deal, or rather job, the building of a technical school is not a matter of urgency. We could well afford to proceed leisurely and with good results in the erection of the school. The purchase of a job, and the worst feature about the deal, is that we now pay for the building, but what we will have to pay before the building is transformed into a technical school. With the St. Lawrence Market improvement concurrently, this building remodeling is a matter of some importance. The St. Lawrence Market is a simple matter, yet it has been tied up for several months now, and the Council is in absolute confusion as to how to proceed. It is in the remodeling of the market, where the facts are simple, where there will be when the more difficult problem of remodeling the Athletic Club is undertaken? It is too bad that the ratepayers are helpless while their money is thus being squandered by men whose lack of business ability is only equalled by their irresponsibility.

THE SYNOD LEASERS.

We think that Mr. Bennett Jones, in his recent communications to the press, has made out a good case in favor of a reduction of rents on the property on King and Colborne streets, owned by the Church of England Synod. The property has depreciated greatly in value since the leases were renewed.
