ANOTHER VICTORY FOR CANADA

The victory of the Canadian fishermen at Sea Girt, N.J., on Wednesday, is more notable than any cause for exultation that either the yachting victory at Chicago or the rowing victories at Philadelphia this year. It has demonstrated, what has been in doubt for some time, that the British Lee-Fielders are equal to the United States crew-Johnson, which has often been written as the greatest rifle in existence. Another thing demonstrated is that the Canadians can shoot at least as well as their United States cousins. The gentlemen who went from Canada are fairly representative of the best shots in the country, yet probably a dozen more "rights" of equal skill could be picked from the ranks of our volunteers.

All honor is due to Major Mason and those associated with him for taking up the gauntlet thrown down in a friendly way by the gentlemen in the States, and that they bring to Canada the coveted Paines trophy in a most gratifying manner. Another thing demonstrated is that the fact that members of the Irish team, who are taking part in the Sea Girt matches, coached their fellow Britons to victory.

While Lieut. Lestear of Washington carries off the honor of making the highest individual score, Capt. B. J. Davidson of Quebec was only one point behind, and the lowest score made by a Canadian was ten points ahead of the bottom man on the other side.

The World takes credit to itself for having had a good deal to do in bringing about the contest. The secretary of the Sea Girt Rifle Association wrote to this paper a year or so ago, requesting us to place the matter before the military men of this country. The letter was given prominence, and while it was not at the time deemed practicable to set up a national team to compete with the proposed members of military bodies interested themselves, and the gentlemen who have brought honor to our country undertook the competition on their own account and at their own expense.

A number of our men, who were sent out on route from Montreal, and only would not be equal to the very best of 800,000 other men, and it is safe to say that even the riflemen themselves were not sanguine of "beating the enemy on his own ground" in the first match, yet this has been done, and it is the privilege of all Canadians to rejoice.

J. of Quebec, carry credit to the Ancient Capital, while Pte. Paubst of the 7th Westmount, Pte. A. Fleming of British Columbia, and Capt. Stuart made up the rest of the team.

Works Committee Yesterday Considered and Accepted Offer of Toronto Railway Company.

METROPOLITAN'S WISH DEFERRED

Local Improvements Recommended By the Engineer and Adopted -Notes From the Hall.

The Works Committee yesterday considered the offer of the Toronto Railway Company to establish a car service on Arthur-street to connect the northwestern to the central section of the city, and accepted it. Ald. Lamb wanted a new service of a similar kind for the East End, and Ald. Graham advocated a line in the West End to connect Lansdowne-avenue in the north with Queen-street. The City Engineer will be asked to report on both these requests.

Action was deferred in regard to the Metropolitan Railway's request for a temporary connection with the C.P.R. tracks.

In reference to the proposed bridge at the foot of Yonge-street, a definite estimate as to the cost, etc., will be made by the City Engineer before the Railway Committee of the Privy Council. Corporation Council Fallerton advised that the Grand Trunk Railway had in the Eglinton agreement waived its claim to exemption from liability for bridge building.

The Works Committee refused to sanction any expenditure for repairing sidewalks, near Government House, in view of the approaching royal visit. At the last meeting of the Council Ald. Cox said that the present condition of the sidewalks, as expressed by the City Engineer, was such that if the government visit should be held in the city, the sidewalks of the city can not be used.

A recommendation that \$1200 more be voted for the dredging of Berkeley-street wharf was adopted.

Persons may erect stands on vacant lots for people to witness the royal procession, but the Works Committee will not give anyone permission to erect stands on any of the streets.

The waterworks appropriation was cut down from \$28,000 to \$18,000 by the City Engineer before the Railway Committee of the Privy Council. Corporation Council Fallerton advised that the Grand Trunk Railway had in the Eglinton agreement waived its claim to exemption from liability for bridge building.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Successful Test Made of the Expanded Metal Co.'s Floor.

The new market building was the scene of a very interesting test yesterday on the floor constructed by the Expanded Metal and Flooring Company, Limited.

The test was made by placing a weight of over 20,000 lbs. on an area 12 feet x 4 feet, or 48 sq. ft. The floor was found to be able to carry a load of 420 lbs. per square foot of area.

The test was made with the slightest sign of failure in the floor. The contractors were willing to put on even a greater weight.

To understand the nature of such a test, this load, if distributed over the entire floor in the same place, would make up a total load of over 20,000,000 lbs., or over 10,000 tons of a superimposed load.

All present-day buildings are built on a foundation of concrete, and are usually saturated with the carrying capacity of the floor.

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METHODISTS RAISE A STORM.

The War in South Africa Discussed in Fiery Speeches.

London, Sept. 6.-A stormy meeting of the Ecumenical Methodist Conference resulted this morning from the reading, by the Rev. C. W. Smith of Pittsburgh, Pa., of a paper on "The Influence of Methodism in the Promotion of International Peace."

The five-minute rule was adopted, and the pastors made fiery speeches for and against the war in South Africa.

The Rev. R. J. Cooke of Chattanooga, Tenn., defended the necessity of hostilities to vindicate a principle.

Robert W. Peris, a member of Parliament, a prominent contractor and vice-president of the Liberal Imperial Committee, defended the usefulness of clerical ministrations. He believed that some wars were necessary, but that growing tendency to the influence of church, unaltered.

The Rev. E. B. Ross of Nashville, Tenn., said it would be impertinent for the conference to tell Great Britain what to do in South Africa.

The delegates during the afternoon devoted themselves to the discussion of the question of Christian unity.

The Rev. F. M. North of New York explained at length the system employed in New York to promote unity.

W. W. ASTOR SORRE.

London, Sept. 6.-To a friend closely connected with the English press, who was recently a guest at Clivedon, William Walford Astor gave his reasons for having become a British citizen.

The loss to America, if such it was, of Mr. Astor's renunciation of his native country, he charges to the American press. Mr. Astor's friend brought out the secret by alluding to his reported offer to purchase Osborne House, which report the host vehemently denied.

A certain section of the American press, said Mr. Astor, "hope to annoy me by constant insinuations and to irritate me by constant sneers at my English citizenship. I regard such journalists in the light of insects. As any time it is possible for me to purchase the offending journals and reduce their snarls to apocryphals and snuff."

"American journalism to-day is a mixture of the greatest possible enterprise and the lowest possible pretensions. It is the cheapest of all professions. It is sought citizenship in England because I lost my love for the country of my birth."

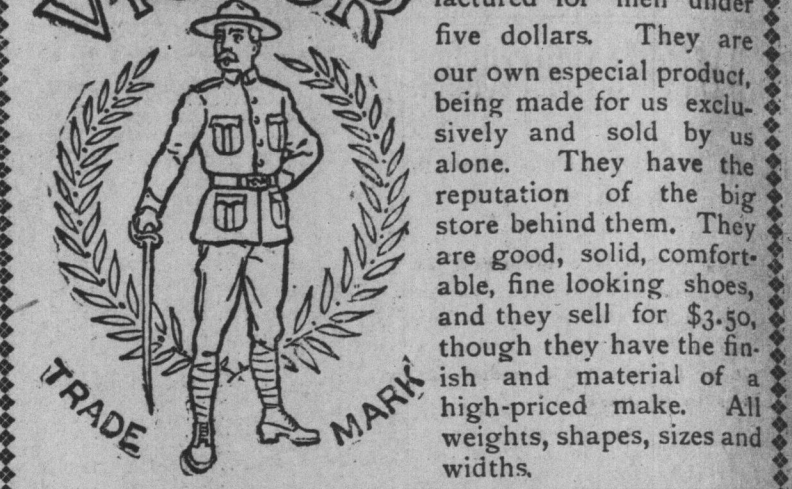
