OTTAWA, April 23.—(Special)—An important Alberta deputation consisting of Premier Rutherford, L. P. Freau, ing of Premier Rutherford, L. P. Freau, secretary of the United Farmers' Association; L. P. Strong, general manager of the Alberta Pacific Elevator Company; and George Harcourt, deputy minister of agriculture, will hold a conference with Sir Richard Cartwright and the trade and commerce department officials on Monday in regard to the shipping of wheat and other Alberta products by the Pacific Coast.

It is understood that they will urge

It is understood that they will urge upon the government a number of changes in the Manitoba Grain Act, a statute which Alberta claims at present makes shipment west very difficult. They will ask for a grain inspector for the provinces of Alberta and British Columbia, and will also urge the erection of a government elevator

One of the most important changes asked in the Manitoba Grain Act is a provision so that any farmer or farmers wishing to put their grain thru the elevators by sale or otherwise can be enabled to get cars in the same proportion as the they leaded from the platforms.
