CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

Province of Quebec Rifle Association.

CONSTITUTION

As Revised 5th May, 1881.

1. That this Association be called the "*Province of Quebec Rifle Association*," and shall have for its object the encouragement of rifle shooting in the Province.
2. Any person subscribing two dollars to the funds of the Association shall be a member thereof for the year in which such subscription shall be made.
3. A donation of twenty dollars in cash, at any one time, for that express purpose, or of a prize of not less value than forty dollars, to be competed for at the annual prize meeting, shall make the donor eligible for election as a life member at next annual meeting of Council.
4. Any regularly constituted Rifle Association or Corps subscribing ten dollars or upwards, per annum, to the funds of the Association shall be considered as being in connection with it, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships, for competition only, in the proportion of one for every dollar so subscribed. The Association thus affiliating is to select from its members the persons to hold such memberships.
5. There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons named by the Council. (The Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Que-

bec, for the time being, shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron.")

6. There shall be a President to be elected at the annual business meeting of the Association.

7. There shall be four Vice-Presidents — one for each Brigade Major's Division—to be elected in the same manner as the President.

8. There shall be a Council composed as follows, viz :

1st. Two members from each Brigade Major's Division to be elected annually at the business meeting.

2nd. One representative member from each affiliated Association or Corps in this Province.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, the District Deputy Adjutants-General of Militia and Brigade Majors, for Province of Quebec, shall be members "ex-officio" of the Council. Five members of Council shall form a quorum, and in the event of vacancies occurring in the elective members, from any cause whatever, the remaining members of the Council shall have the power of filling such vacancies. All members of Council, excepting representatives of affiliated Associations, must be individual members of the Association.

10. Representatives to the Council shall be chosen by the Associations they represent, and the names of delegates when changed shall be sent to the Secretary at least one month prior to the annual meeting.

11. The Council shall, at its first meeting, choose from its members a chairman.

12. There shall be a Secretary and a Treasurer, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.

13. The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously

audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts or deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.

14. The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such By-laws as may from time to time be enacted by them; no By-law being in any case altered or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.

15. The Annual Prize Meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the Council, and the prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such regulations as may be passed from time to time by the Council.

16. An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council) be published as soon after the prize meeting as may be found practicable.

17. An Annual Business Meeting of the members of the Association, for the election of Officers and Council, who shall assume office on first day of succeeding January, and the transaction of other business, shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the by-laws.

16. No alteration in the Constitution shall be made, except by a resolution duly passed at the annual business meeting or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month at least previous to the annual business meeting, at which the same is to be proposed, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all members of the Association of such proposed amendments, and also to post them on the bulletin board at the opening of the annual matches.

BY-LAWS

As Revised 5th May 1881.

1. The Annual Business Meeting of the Association shall be held on the second day of the annual matches.

2. There shall be two ordinary meetings of Council, the first of which shall be held immediately after the annual business meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time as the Council may then determine upon.

3. Extraordinary meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required, by any six members of the Council; notification being sent to each member of the Council at least ten days previous to such meeting, and the requisition for the meeting and the notices to the members must state the object or objects of such extraordinary meetings.

4. The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at all meetings, which shall be entered in a book, kept for that purpose, by the Secretary, open to the inspection of all members of the Council, and published with the annual report.

5. There shall be a Finance Committee consisting of three members of the Council, to be chosen at their first meeting.

6. The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time in such Chartered Bank as the Finance Committee may direct, all sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association.

7. All expenditure for current expenses, which may be required by the Secretary, must be authorized by the signature of a member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner. Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

8. A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer.

OF THE

HELD IN THE MILITIA OFFICE, MONTREAL,
THURSDAY, MAY 5TH, 1881.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary-Treasurer's Report, and the Financial Statement, were read, the Statement shewing a balance on hand of \$680.75 on 21st December, 1880.

Moved by Capt. Balfour, seconded by Major Nott, "That the Secretary-Treasurer's Report, and Financial Statement, as audited, be adopted." Carried.

The Committee appointed at the last annual meeting to consider whether or not a revision of the Constitution and By-laws of the Association could be made tending to its advantage, reported that they had prepared a new Constitution and By-laws. It was decided by the meeting that the Report of the Committee be read, and action taken thereon, previous to the election of office-bearers.

Capt. Balfour then read the Report comprising the Constitution and By-laws, clause by clause, which, with some amendments, were finally adopted as the Constitution and By-laws of the Association. A motion to that effect was made by Lieut.-Col. Martin, seconded by Capt. Blaiklock, and carried.

The election of office-bearers in accordance with the new Constitution was then proceeded with.

The Hon. A. P. Caron, M.P., Minister of Militia, was elected President.

Four Vice-Presidents were elected,—one for each of the Brigade Majors' Divisions in the Province, viz., Lieut.-Col. McEachern, C.M.G., Lieut.-Col. Mattice, Lieut.-Col. Ouimet, Major Stewart.

It was resolved, "That all the former Vice-Presidents not now elected, be placed on the list of Vice-Patrons."

Moved by Major Bond, seconded by Lieut.-Col. Martin, "That Major Mudge be Secretary of the Association." Carried.

Moved by Major Hughes, seconded by Major Nott, "That Lieut.-Col. Martin be Treasurer of the Association." Carried.

Moved by Lieut.-Col. Martin, seconded by Major Bond, "That Lieut.-Col. Fletcher, Lieut.-Col. Worsley, and Lieut.-Col. Lamontagne be the Executive Officers." Carried.

Lieut.-Col. McEachern, Major Bond, and Capt. Balfour were re-appointed Auditors.

Moved by Lieut.-Col. Fraser, seconded by Lieut. Whitman, "That the Annual Prize Meeting be held on Tuesday, the 9th August, and following days, and that the Executive Committee be authorized to prepare a programme and carry out the Matches." Carried.

Moved by Lieut.-Col. Martin, seconded by Lieut.-Col. Fraser, "That a summary of all meetings of Council and Executive Committee be published with the Annual Report." Carried.

Capt. Balfour brought before the meeting the subject of a claim made by him on the 13th August, 1880, relative to his score on the grand aggregate being better than that of Sergt. Holtby, M.G.A., who was published in the prize list as being before him. On referring to the Minute Book, it was found that a meeting of the Executive Committee was held on the 27th August to consider Capt. Balfour's claim, and that after considerable discussion it was resolved, "That the aggregate scores remain as published."

It was then moved by Major Bond, seconded by Lieut. Lyman, "That the Secretary be directed to write to Lieut.-Col. Bacon, late Secretary, and request an explanation as to the minutes of the Executive Committee in the case of Capt. Balfour's *protest*, and that the matter be referred to the first meeting of the New Council." Carried.

Moved by Lieut.-Col. Martin, seconded by Capt. Balfour, "That the Secretary be instructed to convey to the Hon. L. R. Masson, late President, Messrs. Dolan & Co., and the Accident Insurance Company of Canada, the thanks of the Association for their very liberal donations of last year." Carried.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

11th JUNE, 1880.

To arrange programme for annual matches: the following was added to the regulations respecting penalties:—"Any competitor failing to hand in his firing ticket without unnecessary delay to the Register-keeper at the firing point for which he is squadded, shall be ruled out of the match and forfeit his entrance fee."

The Secretary was ordered to apply for the loan of one hundred Martini-Henry rifles.

A vote of thanks was passed to the Lieut.-Colonel Hon. L. R. Masson, also to L. F. Dolan, Esq., for handsome donations.

It was resolved "That it is the opinion of this meeting that the Department should, on requisition of Commanding officers, issue one Martini-Henry rifle per company for the use of marksmen, the Commanding officers becoming security for their absolute safety."

The programme of matches, as printed, was arranged.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

AUGUST 27th, 1880.

A meeting of the Executive Committee was held this day, to consider a claim preferred by Captain Balfour, dated August 13th, 1880. Present: Lt.-Col. Fletcher (presiding), Lt.-Col. D'Orsonnens, Lt.-Col. Whitehead, Lt.-Col. Bacon, Lt.-Col. Martin and Major Bond.

The claim was read by the Secretary, which was as follows:

"The Secretary, Province of Quebec Rifle Association.

"SIR,—I claim to be on the grand aggregate before Sergt. Holtby, M. G. A. Our scores are each 199, and by the Rule 13, governing ties for the aggregate, my 199 is a better one than his, as I beat him on scores at each match in inverse. Our scores are each 48 in match 6, and mine is 36 in match 5, against his 31.

After considerable discussion, it was resolved, "That the aggregate scores remain as published."

MEETING OF THE COUNCIL.

MONTREAL, Dec. 23rd, 1880.

A meeting of the Council was held this day in the Brigade Office. Present: Lt.-Col. McEachern, Lt.-Col. Fletcher, Lt.-Col. Bacon, Lt.-Col. Fraser, Lt.-Col. Martin, Lt.-Col. Harwood, Major Johnson, Major Morehouse and Lieutenant Trotter. Lieut.-Col. McEachern, C.M.G., in the chair.

Lieut.-Colonel Bacon, Secretary-Treasurer, stated that he was about to remove to Ottawa, and he had called the meeting of Council for the purpose of tendering his resignation of the office of Secretary-Treasurer, and of delivering over his books and accounts.

The Report and accounts were then submitted to the Auditors for examination, who having examined them, reported them correct.

It was then moved by Lt.-Col. Fraser, seconded by Lt.-Col. Martin, "That the Secretary-Treasurer's audited report and accounts be approved and received, and handed over to his successor in office." Carried.

Moved by Lt.-Col. Martin, seconded by Major Morehouse, "That the resignation of the Secretary-Treasurer be accepted, and that this meeting desires to express the thanks of the Quebec Rifle Association to Lt.-Col. Bacon for his invaluable services to the Association, and desires to mark their regret at the severance of the close ties that have for so many years connected Lt.-Col. Bacon with all the members, and to tender him their warmest wishes for his continued health and happiness." Carried unanimously.

Moved by Lt.-Col. Martin, seconded by Major Johnson, "That in view of the Secretary-Treasurer's work for the year being practically finished, he is authorized by this meeting to draw the usual grant of one hundred dollars, and this meeting undertakes to have this ratified at the next annual meeting." Carried.

Moved by Major Johnson, seconded by Major Morehouse, "That Lt.-Col. Fletcher be appointed Secretary-Treasurer until the annual meeting." Carried.

Moved by Lt.-Col. Fraser, seconded by Major Morehouse, "That the President be requested to wait upon the Minister of Militia and Defence, with a view to securing the long-range field in rear of present range and belonging to the ladies of the Congregational Nunnery, as this is necessary to insure the use of the seven western targets at 500, 600, 800, 900 and 1,000 yards." Carried.

TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Province of Quebec Rifle Association.

Though a very considerable increase was last year made to the prize list competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting (about six hundred dollars), it is to be regretted that the number of competitors was no larger than in preceding years; and one great reason for this, it is believed, was the inability of the Executive to obtain Martini-Henry rifles from the Department, as heretofore, thus causing a very serious change in the programme at the last moment. It is to be hoped, however, that the Association may reap the benefit of this increase in future years, and to insure this, perhaps it would be well to consider if the time for holding the Annual Prize Meeting is the most convenient for competitors from all parts of the Province, and whether it might be another inducement to riflemen to add a match for young shots.

At the last annual business meeting of the Association a resolution was passed and a committee named for the purpose of considering whether or not a revision of the Constitution and By-Laws could be made, tending to its advantage. A report on this subject will, doubtless, be submitted by that committee, which should receive the serious consideration of the meeting.

It is hoped that it will be in the power of the Executive to announce to the meeting about to be held, that the long-range field, or such portion of it as is necessary for shooting purposes, has been leased by the Militia Department for a term of

years, and its use to the Force and Association assured for some time to come. Your President's energetic action in this regard may be thanked for this happy consummation.

An addition of two second-class targets was made by the Executive to the shooting capacity of the ranges last year, making thirteen targets in all in possession of the Association.

The competitors from the Province of Quebec at the D. of C. R. A. Annual Prize Meeting did credit to their province, winning more than their share of the prize money offered, and the magnificent shooting of Captain Balfour, of the 8th Royal Rifles, in the match for the prizes given by His Excellency the Governor-General and Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, was the most brilliant of the meeting, making 132 out of a possible 150, at the ranges of 200, 500 and 600 yards.

In view of the inability of the Association to obtain Martini-Henry rifles from the Militia Department for use at the Annual Prize Meetings, it becomes necessary to consider whether it is possible to obtain them by some other means, as the use of that arm in the competitions at Wimbledon increases year by year, and our team becomes seriously handicapped by having a rifle put into their hands, to the use of which they are unaccustomed. The action of the Association of the year before last might be repeated, and the Executive authorized to purchase a certain number to be offered for prizes, or sold at cost to those who desire to purchase.

The Association have again to thank the Dominion Government for their continued encouragement by its annual grant of \$1,700, as also to the Local Government for their annual subsidy of \$500. The liberal subscription of the Bank of Montreal of \$100, and that of the President for a like amount, deserve the thanks of the Association, and it is to be hoped that other institutions and the Corporation of the city and its merchants will liberally contribute to enable the Association to make its prize lists more attractive.

The handsome silver cup, presented for competition by the Accident Insurance Company, produced a keen competition

The Association, in a financial point of view, stands better than for some years past, as although a sum of about \$600 was added to the prize list, the balance on hand at the end of the year's work was some two hundred dollars in excess of the year previous.

REGULATIONS.

1. There will be "1880" Wimbledon Targets and Scoring.
2. Firing shall commence each day at 9 o'clock precisely.
3. All firing shall be conducted under officers or persons appointed for the duty by the Executive Officers, and all competitors shall be under their authority. When a competitor has joined a squad he shall not leave it until he has retired or completed his firing, without leave from the register keeper; any competitor losing his turn, or being absent without leave, or who does not hand his scoring ticket to the register keeper within a reasonable time at the firing point to which he is squadded, will be disqualified for the Match and lose his entrance fee.
4. In Snider Matches, competitors will fire the whole number of rounds alternately in files (at each distance) as far as practicable.
5. No competitor to cap, or with Breach Loader to load, before he steps to the front to fire.
6. Any position, with head to target, in Snider and Martini Matches, not involving artificial rests; and in small bore any position not involving artificial rests; slings may be used. Government pattern.
7. Competitors must provide their own ammunition, which may be purchased on the ground at 20 cents for ten rounds Snider; 30 cents for ten rounds Martini.
8. In competitions open to any rifle, all sights will be allowed, except telescopic and those disallowed at Wimbledon. (*Vide* N. R. Rules, 1880.) Maximum weight, 10 lbs., exclusive of ramrod; minimum pull of trigger 3 lbs.
9. In matches for Snider and Martini Rifles, none but Government pattern will be allowed. Minimum pull of trigger 6 lbs.
10. Competitors shall, if required, submit their rifles for inspection by the armorer or other officers, before, during, and after a match, and any one found guilty of plugging, or other unfair behaviour, will be disqualified from further shooting, and forfeit entrance fees and prizes, and will be liable to be debarred from competing in any future match of the Association.

11. In the Battalion and Skirmishing Matches, competitors to be in uniform, full or undress, of their respective corps.

12. Two sighting shots at each distance shall be allowed each competitor, on payment of ten cents per shot before the commencement of the competition of each squad. These shots may be fired in any position. In matches where the firing is alternate, the sighting shots will be before each man's commencement not before that of squads. No "blowing-off" shall be allowed, except at the pits provided for that purpose, where competitors may do so on presentation of a ticket, price five cents.

13. Ties will be decided—*In individual competitions*: 1st, if at more than one distance, by the range totals, in inverse order; 2nd, by the fewest outers; 3rd, by fewest magpies; 4th, by fewest inners; 5th by value of each shot in inverse order; 6th, by firing single shots at the longest distance in the competition until decided. *In team competitions*: 1st, if at more than one distance, by aggregate range totals, in inverse order; 2nd by fewest outers; 3rd, by fewest magpies; 4th, by fewest inners; 5th, by the highest scorer in each team firing single shots at longest distance. *For the aggregate*: 1st, by score at each match, in inverse order; 2nd, by following the rules for *individual* ties.

14. After delivering each shot the competitor must pay attention to the score called out by the register keeper. Any objection to the scoring of a hit must be made before another shot is fired; otherwise the shot must stand as signalled. When only one competitor is present at a firing point, a witness to the score must be provided by the Executive.

15. Misses cannot be signalled, even in sighting shots.

16. No person will be allowed to practice on the range during the week of the meeting, unless it be necessary to drill the markers previous to commencement of the meeting.

17. Entries must be made at the Secretary's Office, at least one match a-head, or will be charged 25 cents extra as Post Entries. Every competitor shall enter and shoot not oftener than once for any prize; except in the Optional or Extra Series Matches, where two or more entries are allowed, one score only to count.

18. Any competitor firing at the wrong target, or during the time the danger flag is up, or the disc is shown on the target, will be debarred from all further competition, at the discretion of the Executive Officers.

19. The Executive Officers will decide disputes on the ground. Appeal from their decision may be made in writing to the Executive Committee,

20. Any competitor refusing to obey the instructions of the Executive Officers, or their deputies, will be immediately ruled out of all further competition.

21. The ranges being, for the period of the Matches of the Association, handed over to the charge of the Executive Committee, any person, not a competitor, interfering with any of the firing squads, or annoying them in any way, will at once be expelled from the ground.

22. All orders on the ground will be given by the Executive Officers, Lieut.-Col. Hon. M. Aylmer and Lieut.-Col. d'Orsonnens.

23. Any competitor infringing any of the preceding regulations, being guilty of unruly or disorderly conduct, or being intoxicated, shall be ruled out, and forfeit any entrance fee he may have paid.

24. PENALTIES.—*Disqualification.*

Any competitor—

1st, who shall offer money, or a bribe of any kind, to a register keeper, or any other employee of the Association, under any pretence whatever; or,

2nd, who shall intentionally discharge his rifle at the wrong target; or,

3rd, who shall be guilty of any conduct, which the Executive Committee may consider to be discreditable; or,

4th, who shall be reported to the Executive Committee as having elsewhere been guilty of the aforesaid offences—
shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, forfeit all his entrance fees and be forever disqualified from competing at any Prize Meeting of the Association.

DISALLOWANCE OF SCORES.

Any competitor—

1st, who shall fail to comply with the conditions laid down for any particular Match; or,

2nd, who shall infringe any of the instructions or Regulations of the Meeting—

shall, on the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, have his score disallowed.

25. Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the Regulations, as the plea of ignorance cannot under any circumstances be entertained.
