Believe Turks Lost Two Thirds Of Their

Bonar Law's Announcement in Commons—London Sees in Fa'l of Bagdad Dissipation of German Vision of an **Eastern Empire**

London, Mar. 12-After announcing the fall of Bagdad in the House of Commons today, Andrew Bonar Law said there was every reason to believe that two-thirds of the Turks' artillery had fallen into the hands of the British or had been thrown into the Tigris.

London, Mar. 12-The fall of Bagdad, in the opini is of even greater significance for the effect it is expected to have on German aims, than for its value in restoring British prestige in the eyes of the Mo-

nammedan world and the East generally. While it is recognized that the British misfortunes in Mesopotamia have had a serious influence on the prestige of the ruling power in India and Egypt and while it is contended that the capture of Bagdad will restore the balance, the chief gratification expressed is that the success of General Maude's expedition "has shattered the dream that Germans have indulged in for more than twenty

As one typical comment puts it:-"The Germans' proud vision of an eastern empire is dissipated before their eyes, the German route to the east is blocked and the existing terminus of the Berlin to Bagdad railway has passed into British hands. To Orientals it will seem to sound the knell of German aspirations."

Paris, March 12.—The morning papers comment at length upon the fall of Bagdad and dwell upon the political importance of the British success. The

importance of the British success. The Figaro says:

"In respect to the European war as a whole perhaps it does not matter much that the Turkish army has undertaken a serious check in faraway territory. Nevertheless the political effect of the event will be deeply felt in Germany. The Hamburg-Bagdad line, the last of the dreams cherished by German megalomania must remain a dream in the face of the realities. It is certain that hopes of its fulfillment were fostered by the government and contributed largely to keeping up the spirits of the public."

The Petit Parisien says: "The Turks were thrown into the war forcibly by the committee of union and progress, which only maintained itself in power by terrorism. Will its prestige survive the Mesopotamia disaster?"

Amsterdam via London, March 11—
The Kolnische Volks Zeitung admits that the arming of American merchantmen will make Germany's position more difficult. It expresses the belief that the Americans will not find it easy to provide guns and gun crews, and says it does not believe the danger to German submarines will be increased.

"We have always maintained," says the newspaper, "that a victory over England would be impossible unless we also determined to face America. The moment has now come. If an American declaration of war arrives, the German people will accept it with the same determination and confidence that they have accepted all previous declarations."

Amsterdam via London, March 11—
The Molnische Volks Zeitung admits them up to the last possible moment.

The men tell terrible suffering undergone during a period of severe cold weather in Germany, due partly to lack of fuel, but more to the absence of the shoes and clothing which they had lost. Since their entrance into Switzerland, at Rorschach, they say they have been royally treated by the Swiss.

The difficulty experienced in buying bread freely, coupled with the fear of a permanent shortage prompted working people to leave their places of employment and gather in various parts of the city in peaceable protest against the situation. Since the Boy Scouts movement was organized eight years ago, Boy Scouts in the United Kingdom have earned 1,5885 medals for acts of gallantry and thirty-four certificates of merit. Of the medals 175 were awarded during the last year, according to the annual report of the executive committee of the council, which is just to hand.

Seventy-eight of the medals awarded during the last year were for life saving, practically double the average number of medals awarded in this connection in any previous year.

Much attention has been paid to public services lately and the boys have been encouraged by the offer of war service badges. For instance, 38,392 war service badges were awarded to scouts who put in twenty-eight days of voluntary service in a similar way. This war work includes all kinds of public services, such as assisting the police and fire brigades, etc. Constwatching is another form of service which has grown in popularity among the scouts of England. The arrangement with the admiraity for the supply of boy scouts watching still continues and numbers, varying from 1,300 to 1,300 have been employed in this way. They have won the cordial appreciation of the admiral in charge of coastguards. Badges for eighty-four days of coast watching were awarded to 2,020 scouts.

Vocational training is receiving merited consideration from educationists, not only in Canada, but throughout the allied countries. At this point mention may be made of the training which boy scouts receive, leading up to this line of endeavor in the technical schools. Badges are awarded to boy scouts who show proficiency to'a certain standard in carpentering, basket making, engineering, plumbing, printing and other useful trades.
