

### AMERICAN SENATORS CRITIZE THE EMBARGO

Say Britain is Doing a Great Violence to the United States

New York, Feb. 5-An Associated Press despatch from Washington today says: Democrats and Republicans in the senate today joined in criticizing the new British embargo on imports and calling attention to the effect it would have on American industry.

During the discussion that followed, Senator Reed, of Missouri, Democrat, attacked the Carnegie peace foundation's activities abroad, questioned its loyalty and declared it should be dissolved. Senators Knox, of Pennsylvania, Republican, and Ashurst, of Arizona, Democrat, joined in the attack. Senator Weeks, of Massachusetts, Re-

ocrat, joined in the attack.

Senator Weeks, of Massachusetts, Republican, and Senator Lewis, of Illinois, Smith, of Georgia, and Reed, of Missouri, Democrats, led in protests against the British embargo.

Approving the view expressed in a pending resolution by Senator Weeks, asking the state department whether any steps have been taken looking to securing a modification that the embargo violates the third of President Wilson's peace points, against economic barriers, Senator Lewis added:

"Britain does this country a great violence at this time in pressing this embargo. It will awaken sentiment that will make it difficult for the president to succeed in his efforts and awaken hostility, create a war of protest and lead to retaliatory legislation by the United States. And before we know it we will have trade hostility. Instead of having the calm peace we wish with our allies, we will have enmity instead of the peace we strive for.

"I pray the British-official set to beware and not unnecessarily re-awaken the old spirit of 1812."

Senator Weeks said that the embargo's purpose was to build up British industry to its pre-war normal condition.

"This building up, however," said Mr. Weeks, "has directly the reverse effect on our own industry. The time has come when we must give attention to our own domestic affairs and protect our own commerce."



# Land and Loans—to Help Soldiers Become Farmers

IT is anticipated that a great many soldiers who have served with the Canadian, British or Allied forces may want to become farmers in Canada. The vital need to-day is to increase production and the acreage under cultivation. It is thus in Canada's best interests to give these soldiers every assistance. The Government has therefore been developing a programme that includes the providing of land, the granting of loans and the training and supervision of those inexperienced in farming.

### The Present Plan.

Under the Soldier Settlement Act, 1917, an eligible returned soldier is entitled, in addition to his ordinary homestead right, to a free grant of one quarter-section of Dominion Lands on homestead conditions.

For this purpose the Government has suspended homestead entry by others than soldiers on all remaining homestead lands in the Western provinces within fifteen miles of railway transportation, pending enquiry into their suitability.

As soon as a soldier goes on the land, the Board has power to grant him a loan up to the maximum of

This loan is granted to settlers to help them acquire land for farming, discharge incumbrances, undertake improvements, erect buildings and secure necessary livestock, machinery and equipment.

cash, but in the form of payment for expenditures. In this way the settlers' transactions are carefully supervised. The loan is made at the low interest

It is not given as an actual advance of

rate of five per cent. It is to be repaid in twenty annual instalments. The first two payments may be deferred by the Board when desirable.

### The New Proposal.

The Government have found it necessary to broaden these original plans for the following reasons:

(a) It has been found that only a limited amount of suitable homestead land is available for soldier settlement. (b) Some Crown lands are held by the

Provinces. (c) Homesteading may not suit all the

returned soldiers. It is now proposed that the Provincial Governments co-operate with the Soldier Settlement Board in acquiring suitable lands at present held uncultivated by private owners. The Dominion Government has announced its intention of introducing necessary legislation along these lines at the opening of the next

The lands so bought will be re-sold to the soldier at cost price. It is suggested that the purchaser be required to make a cash payment of one-tenth of the purchase price. The balance will be payable in equal annual instalments extended over twenty years or longer.

The amount of the land purchased by this plan, if it is approved by Parliament, will be limited in value to \$5,000. Interest will be charged at a low rate of five When these new proposals for land purchase become effective the Board will be able to loan the soldier settler up to a total of \$1.500 for the purchase of livestock and equipment in addition to the loan for the purchase of his land. It will be granted on practically the same terms as the loans now allowed.

As the soldier improves his farm the Board may advance him a further

### Who May Apply

The Act applies to any one who has served with an honourable record in the Canadian or Imperial forces in the present war, or to any Canadian who was on active service with the Allied forces, or the widow of any such person who died on active service.

The Board will loan money only to those who have had sufficient experience or training in farming. Each applicant may be required to appear in person before the Qualification Committee in his district.

### Training

Those soldiers who have had insufficient experience in farming will be helped by the Board to secure the necessary training to qualify them for the loans.

Special instructional courses are being arranged with the agricultural schools and experimental farms.

\* Farmers will be asked to co-operate in giving the soldier practical training and knowledge.

### Expert Assistance


The work of the Soldier Settlement Board is carried out by Supervisors in each of the provinces.

These supervisors have under them a staff of land appraisers to valuate the land, and farming advisors or practical farmers in the community to advise the soldier after he has definitely settled on

Qualification Committees are being appointed in each Province to advise the Board as to the qualifications of each applicant.

Loans, amounting to over 17 million dollars, have already been granted to over one thousand returned soldiers.

Since the regulations were completed last July, over eight hundred soldiers have made entries on Dominion Crown Lands under the Soldier Settlement



### SMALL NATIONS SHOW A DISPOSITION TO REVOLT

The deputation presented resolutions from close on to 1,500 out of the 1,900 existing labor unions of the Dominion of Canada. This of itself, is proof, the delegation urged, "that the active minority who are preaching total prohibition do not represent the thoughts and desires of the great masses of workers of this country."

The request to the government was for the removal of the present unnecessary restrictions relative to the manufacture and sale of beer. This order-incouncil, it is claimed, was placed on the statute books as a war measure, and not on its merits as social legislation. The war is now over, claim the labor men, and there is no further need of this measure of restriction if ever such need existed.

Other features specially emphasized were the throwing out of work of thousands engaged in the brewing and allied industries in the dominion at the present time and in view of the impossibility of the employers assimilating those at present unemployed that care should be taken before the labor market is further dislocated.

The smaller nations are beginning to show a disposition to revolt against any plan that does not recognize their full equality in a society of nations with greater powers. Thus, a situation similar to that at the second peace conference at the Hague at which the plan of Elihu Root, an American delegate for a supreme court of nations was frustrated, threatens to develop. The great powers, it is supposed, would not consent to the admission to the court of a member for each state regardless of its size and importance, fearing that they might be found in the minority, notwithstanding their greater interest in every great issue. It is hoped that the experts, profiting from the experience at the Hague conference, will find a way to secure the adhesion of the small states to the plan which is being perfected rapidly.


